Business at Govt Moving to Business

Uneasiness is being expressed in business circles that government agents are moving too deep into private fields and are undertaking activities which government feels, it can do better.

Howard D. Graham, president of the Toronto Stock Exchange, was among those expressing concern last week. Mr. Graham, who as Lt.-Gen. Graham was chief of the Canadian general staff from 1958 to 1962, referred particularly to similar proposals in the National Development and Loan Fund and a National Development Corporation.

He said it is a great pity that the financial industry has not itself taken steps to ensure a greater flow of public money. He said the same time government proposals could result in a tendency to lavish spending with government help, in inefficient and unproductive management in the private field; and to political pressures in financing.

Somewhat similar apprehension was expressed about Ontario's Economic Development Guaranteed Loans Act by the Subury Chamber of Commerce at the Ontario Chamber's annual meeting.

Saturday, suggesting further study of the matter, asked if the Ontario legislation might result in government and inefficient business competing with efficient business; and if it was a very real hazard of political influence leading to abuse in the operation of the

W. C. Burrows, publisher of the St. Catharines Standard and newly-elected president of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, said he felt the big job for the coming year will be "communications."

"It is not enough for our organizations to process views," he stated. "These views must be stated and understood, and understood by the public. It is not enough for our experts but by the individual community citizens as well."

At another address at the Ontario Chamber's meeting, W. J. Adams, president and secretary of Canada Life Assurance Company, and the Chamber's outgoing president, said the cost in taxes of providing a pension under a government plan is as much as double the cost of providing the same pension under an employer plan.

He urged filling the gaps in present welfare legislation by methods recommended in Ontario and other provinces rather than those suggested in federal circles.

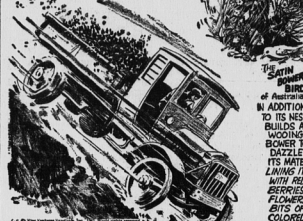
