Dr. Ernest Weeks Outlines Necessary Steps For Park

The step necessary for the establishment of an industrial park in Charlottetown were outlined Wednesday by Dr. Ernest P. Weeks, executive director of the Atlantic Development Board, who addressed the Industrial Development committee of the Charlottetown Board of Trade at the Confederation Centre. Dr. Weeks pointed out the first step would be to determine the specific types of industry that would be suitable for the area and then the selection of the site which should have a minimum of 40 acres in land and be located so as to lend itself to necessary services such as power, water and sewage. The type of soil and the accessibility of transportation by rail and highway would also be important factors in selecting a park site.

The meeting agreed to form a committee of nine to consist of three from Parkdale, three from Sherwood and three from Charlottetown to explore and investigate the availability of land suitable for the establishment of an industrial park. The committee is to work in conjunction with the provincial government in an effort to compile a list of available sites following which application could be made to the ADB for consideration. Dr. Weeks explained ADB was authorized to contribute through provincial government funds up to one-third of the costs of developing an industrial park.

ENGAGE CONSULTANTS - Should ADB accept the findings of this committee it would engage independent consultants to make a complete survey of the site and the relating costs of the required services. It is expected that the three parties concerned will make appointments to the committee at the next regular council meeting. Dr. Weeks is returning to Ottawa. Charles W. Moffatt, manager of the Charlottetown Board

of Trade, thanked Dr. Weeks for his visit to Charlottetown and his contributions to a better understanding of the work of the Atlantic Development Board and expressed the view that on his (Weeks) next visit to Charlottetown there would be concrete proposals regarding the development of the metropolitan area of Charlottetown. The meeting was attended by: members of the committee, commissioners from Parkdale and Sherwood, the director of Industrial Enterprises Inc.; the president and executive of the Charlottetown Board of Trade; Charlottetown's Mayor Walter Cox; Hon. Leo Rossiter, Minister of Fisheries; Dr. Weeks; and Col. Roy Brown of the ADB legal staff.

Reid Case Is Adjourned

The case of John Henry Reid and Elizabeth L. Reid versus the City of Charlottetown, Police Chief Sterna Webster and Sgt. Charles Ready of the city police force, was adjourned in Supreme Court yesterday to March 25 at 11 a.m.

The plaintiffs are suing the city and the co-defendants for damages in the amount of \$148,000.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided and told the court the reason for the adjournment was that counsel wished to have the evidence which has been heard extended and that the job is only a little more than half completed.

Allison M. Gillis is counsel for the plaintiffs and Gerald R. Foster, QC, is representing the city, while John P. Nicholson is appearing for the co-defendants Ready and Webster.

The plaintiffs' evidence has been completed and the defence have their evidence pretty well completed, but Mr. Foster told the court there is a possibility he will call one more witness.

Dept. Sponsors Design Contest

A contest for the design of a wall hanging or hooked rug which will measure seven feet wide and 18 feet long is being sponsored by the P.E.I. Department of Public Works. The rug will hang on the wall in the new Provincial Building.

The design must depict a historic event or development in Prince Edward Island. An original design from any person residing on P.E.I. may be entered in the contest.

Among designs that would be considered suitable are: Samuel Holland's vision of Charlottetown; landing of the Selkirk Settlers near Eldon; blessing of lobster boats; farm scene, fishing scene, industrial development scene; a scene from the Queen's visit to P.E.I.

The contest closes July 30 and there is no fee. All applications should be submitted with a Wo-

men's Institute form. The designs are to be submitted on paper and in color. First prize is \$100, second \$75 and third \$50.

The contest is to be judged by the minister of public works and a committee chosen by him.
