NEW STEERING APPARATUS FOR SHIPS.—There is now
on exhibition at the Museum of the improved apparatus for
steering ships, which of simplicity of construction and
apparent completeness of operation, has elicited much commendation
from persons familiar with the more improved apparatus
of shipmasters, owners and builders. It is altogether novel,
we believe, in its construction, and in the opinion of some good judges,
combines the desirable qualities of simplicity, without their
disadvantages. One of the features which commends it to the
approval of ship constructors is its complete separation
from the rudder-head. It is also so contrived, that it combines
the old method of the lever with the power of the screw. The
apparent ease and precision of its operation, and the simplicity
of its construction, are among its excellences, and cannot fail
to commend it to the favorable attention of all those who are
interested in commerce. We also learn that it can be afforded at a less price
than any other of the patent inventions now in use.

THE GREAT STORM OF 1703. The most violent storm ever
known to occur on the coast of Europe, was on the twenty-second
of November, 1703, one hundred and forty-eight years ago.—
This fearful tempest on the shore of Great Britain was
preceded by a strong west wind, which set in about the middle
of November, and every day and every hour increased in force,
till on the 27th, it raged so furiously, that every least was
appalled, and horror and confusion seized upon all, whether on
shore or at sea. To venture abroad was to rush into instant
danger, and to stay within afforded no other prospect than that
of being hurled into the ruins of a falling habitation. One
hundred and twenty-three persons were killed by the fall of
dwellings; amongst these were the Bishop of Bath and Wells
and his lady, the full part of the Episcopal Palace of Wells;
and Lady Keppel Nicholas, sister of the Bishop of London at
Horsley, in Sussex.

Those who perished in the waters, in the floods of the Severn
and the Thames, on the night of the 27th, were not less than
fourteen, and never heard of afterwards, are computed to have
amounted to eight thousand. All ranks and degrees were affected
by this amazing tempest, which did not only sweep away
land, but, sometimes, lakes, houses, churches, and trees, all
were destroyed or damaged by its fury. The damage in the city
of London alone was computed at near £300,000 sterling, and
all the river Thames, only four ships remained in London
and Limehouse, the rest being driven below, and lying
there miserably beating on the rocks. Five hundred
wharves, two hundred ships' boats, and one hundred lighthouses
and barges, were entirely lost, and a much greater number
received very considerable damage.

The Edystone Lighthouse, near Plymouth, was precipitated
into the surrounding ocean, and with it Mr. Winstanley, the
architect, by whom it was erected. In the life of one who
went with him.—Having been frequently told that the edifice was
too slight to withstand the fury of the winds and waves, he
was accustomed to reply, "I will not be troubled with it."
Some should have—unfortunately, his desire was gratified.
Signals of distress were made; but so tremendous a sea, no
one could live, or would venture to put off for their relief.
So awful a visitation produced the most serious impressions
on the Government, and a day of fasting and humiliation was
appointed by authority.

THE REWARD OF DILIGENCE.—"Seest thou a man diligent
in his business?" says Solomon, "he shall stand before kings."
We have a striking instance of this in the life of
Dr. Franklin, who, quoting the sentence himself, adds, "This
is true; I have stood in the presence of five kings, and once
before the honour of a crown was conferred on me, and I
having been diligent in business" from his earliest years.
What a lesson is this for our youth, and for us all!

The London "Weekly Times," has a forcible article upon
the demoralizing influence of public exhibitions on those
caused by the Great Exhibition and the Kosuth demonstration.
We give a few sentences.—"The love of pleasure grows upon
man, as it does upon other animals, and in proportion as it
obtains mastery over our reason, it debases the species to
the level of the mere animal. The conduct of the fair, and
the conduct of the exhibitors, that brought the street on Monday last,
is a proof of the fact. Not only was the most total indifference
shown to the convenience and even safety of the people, but
the fair attracted by the show, but there appeared to be at various
points a demonstration to insult them as much as possible. In
one instance a child was squeezed to death in its mother's
arms. In another, a young girl was crushed to death, and
herself shamefully insulted and bruised, and the laughter of a
crowd of men who enjoyed the joke exceedingly. It is the

where. The people want repose; and in the name of common
humanity, we say, let them have it."
