Convicted Persons Wait Turn To Serve Sentence

Asked yesterday why certain people convicted on the terms by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, were on the loose, Police Chief Stierias Webster said "they are walking the streets when they should be in jail, because there is no room in Queens County Jail."
