New Railway Strike Looms In France

PARIS (AP)—More than half of France's rail workers were ordered Monday night to strike at once for higher wages and to protest government economy decrees. The new strike call came less than 24 hours after harried France began to emerge from a paralyzing general walkout.

It was ordered to support striking postal, telegraph and telephone workers. The strike call was issued by the Communist-led National Federation of Railways and was set to last "until further notice."

The union urged its membership to make the strike general among France's 440,000 rail workers through persuasion and argument. The Communist-led union controls only 270,000 of the workers directly.

All the three big union federations—Socialist, Roman Catholic and Communist-dominated—met during the day to study the texts of new decrees published by the government. The decrees were prepared by the cabinet as a first step in straightening out the nation's jumbled financial and economic situation.

The six-day-old strike of post office workers still had delivery of mail, long distance telephone calls and telegrams almost completely strangled.

In some provincial towns, police and soldiers aided in sorting or making partial deliveries of mail. But in Paris, postal activity still was at an almost complete standstill.

S. C. Organizer Is Defeated
EDMONTON (CP)—Ovets Kennedy, national organizer of the Social Credit party, was defeated in the new federal seat of Edmonton-Strathcona on Monday's federal election. Mr. Kennedy lost out to Liberal candidate L. L. Hanna, former Edmonton alderman.

ARROWSMITH DENVER (AP)—President Eisenhower and State Secretary Dulles discussed plans Monday for American retaliatory steps against the Communists in Korea if they refuse to release all U.S. prisoners of war. Dulles told a press conference at the president's vacation headquarters here that the United States "presumably will adopt reciprocal measures" if the Reds withhold American prisoners in violation of the armistice terms. Asked whether "reciprocal measures" meant that Communist prisoners would be withheld, Dulles said: "That would seem to be a normal procedure."

Dulles arrived here early this morning from South Korea where he negotiated and initiated a mutual security pact with President Syngman Rhee. After the 70-minute session in Eisenhower's summer White House office, Dulles repeated that Rhee had given "unqualified and categorical assurance" that South Korea won't upset the armistice. The secretary also said he had informed Japanese Prime Minister Yoshida in Tokyo that the United States feels Japan must assume a "larger responsibility" for defence of its home islands. "We don't expect Japan to assume responsibilities for areas other than Japan," Dulles said. "But Japan is not doing all we could hope for, for its own security."

Dulles said the U.S. government is greatly concerned over "the risk that some prisoners of war may be withheld and not exchanged," by the Communists.

1941, had the biggest majority in the country in Quebec East—about 20,000. It was the second time he had out-pollled all other candidates as he led his Liberals to victory for the second straight time since taking over the leadership from Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in 1948. Mr. Drew, who moved into his party's leadership at about the same time as Mr. St. Laurent did, again was elected comfortably in Carleton on the outskirts of Ottawa. CCF leader M. J. Coldwell coasted back in Rosetown-Biggar on the CCF tide in Saskatchewan, and Solon Low, Social Credit leader, held to his old Alberta stronghold of Peace River on the fringe of the north.

Gardiner Had Stiff Scrap
Most cabinet members had fairly easy going, but Agriculture Minister J. G. Gardiner came through in Melville only after a stiff scrap with Percy Wright, the CCF's chief farm expert in the last Parliament. Mr. Wright shifted over to battle the minister on Mr. Gardiner's home ground after the last Commons redistribution wiped out his Melfort, Sask., riding. A Progressive Conservative national figure—John Diefenbaker, runner-up for the party leadership in 1948—also was squeezed out of his old riding of Lake Centre, Sask., but shifted over to Prince Albert and won out. He was his party's only winner in Saskatchewan.

Three Women Elected
Three women were elected, all from Ontario, to give the Commons the greatest representation ever from their sex. Mrs. Ellen Fairclough, Hamilton West Progressive Conservative in the last House, was joined by Mrs. Ann Shipley of Timiskaming, a Liberal, and Miss Sybil Bennett, a Progressive Conservative in Halton. They were the only survivors among 48 women who tried for office. In his popular vote, the Liberals were running ahead of 50 per cent with 24,659 of 39,797 polls tabulated by The Canadian Press. The total at that stage was: Total, 4,275,526; Liberal, 2,194,453; Progressive Conservative, 1,413,858; CCF, 410,660; others 256,554. The 71-year-old prime minister was comfortably re-elected in Quebec East, one of the first cabinet members to be returned. The first was his post-master-general, Alcide Coe in St. Jean-Iberville-Naperville. Other ministers returned early included Finance Minister Abbott in Montreal-St. Antoine-Westmount, Labor Minister Gregg in York-Sunbury, and Resources Minister Winters in Queens-Lunenburger. J. W. Pickersgill, new secretary of state, was elected in his first bid for office in the Newfoundland riding of Bonavista-Twillingate. Nationally-known Progressive Conservatives elected in the early returns included George C. Nowlan, president of the Progressive Conservative Association, in Nova Scotia's Digby-Annapolis-Kings, and Leola Balcer, head of the Young Progressive Conservatives, in Trois-Rivieres, Que. Mrs. Therese Casgrain, Quebec president of the CCF and Guy Caron, head of the Labor-Progressive party in that province, both were defeated. Tim Buck, Canadian leader of the Communists, was defeated in Toronto Trinity. In Monday's balloting, 263 Commons seats were at stake, additions to two settled earlier by acclamation. The two were given to Quebec Liberals.

1,050 Non-Korean Prisoners Died During Captivity

TOKYO (AP)—The Communist Peiping radio said Monday 1,050 non-Korean prisoners have died in Red captivity. The Red broadcast account, monitored in Tokyo by The Associated Press, was far short of the 8,705 Americans listed by the U.S. defence department last Wednesday as missing in Korea. Peiping said the Reds added 481 deaths to the 569 non-Korean prisoner deaths they had reported when Allied and Red prisoner lists were exchanged in December 1951. The additional list was handed to the Allies Aug. 6, in accordance with the armistice agreement.

Plan Voyage In Aluminum Boat

OSLO, Norway. (Reuters)—Four men—only a Canadian—left here today in a 26-foot aluminum lifeboat which they intend sailing across the North Sea to London. They figure the voyage will take them eight or 10 days, using 800 lbs. of the metal. Skipper of the 26-foot, 2½-ton boat is Leif Larsen, 47, a Norwegian war hero who made 52 trips between the Shetland Islands, off Scotland, to Norway to take supplies to the underground movement and to rescue refugees. Crew members are John Helston, 21, of Winnipeg, and two Britons, Harold Nicolaisen, 39, and Frederick Philpott, 41.

Novel Method For Reducing

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mrs. Helen Fedorowicz, 42, lost 110 pounds in four months, but her reducing method probably won't become popular. The five-foot tall woman weighed 265 pounds last April when her spouse, John, 59, a roofer, said to her: "Let's take a walk." They did. They started at Fresno and trudged 350 miles to the Mexican border. Then they turned eastward, over mountains and desert, camping at night and braving all kinds of weather. Two thousand miles later Mrs. Fedorowicz weighed 155. She plans to stay home and soak her feet awhile.
