MISSING A SLAM

South abandoned slam possibilities in the following deal because he did not see how he could "lock" the precise sort of help he needed from partner.

12-4 A
 North dealer.
 Both sides vulnerable.
 ♠ K Q 10
 ♥ K J 8
 ♦ A 9 8
 ♣ K 7 5 4
 ♠ 5 3
 ♥ 10 7
 ♦ Q 10 8 5
 ♣ 4
 ♠ 10 6 3
 ♥ 7 4
 ♦ 9 8 5 3
 ♣ K J 7 2
 ♠ A J 9 8 6 2
 ♥ Q 4 2
 ♦ 3
 ♣ A Q 2

The bidding:
 North East South West
 1♣ Pass 1♠ Pass
 2♣ Pass 4♠ Pass
 Pass Pass

Obviously, North-South failed to reach the laydown slam in spades. From South's point of view, it was difficult to discover whether North had high cards in the one suit, hearts, where South so urgently required support, but, certainly, South could have made a better effort than he did make. The partnership's fortunes would have been more ably served by North's opening the bidding with one notrump, rather than the bid he chose, but even after the club opening, an expert pair would reach the slam by developing the auction in this fashion:

12-4 B
 North South
 1♣ 1♠
 2♣ 3♠
 3♣ 4♠

Now, over South's four spades, the future of the hand would be up to North—but any good player in his position would find the proper answer. The fact that South, in this sequence, had stopped off to raise clubs, would change the entire complexion of North's hand! Now, the weakness of the club suit would no longer be a menace, and with South later jumping from three diamonds to four spades, North would have a perfect four-notrump bid—and he would not have to care whether South read this as a conventional four notrump, or merely as showing strength in the unbid heart suit. From that point on, the partnership could scarcely stop short of six spades!
