Ince started the first week in January.
Only about half the usual amount
was planted because of the interruption
to the heating system caused by the fire
on January 31st. The following is a summary
of the results:

Number healthy tubers returned to growers 5,600
Number diseased tubers discarded 1,115
Total sets planted 6,775

Bacterial Ring Rot Survey
No bacterial ring rot infection was found
in Island seed potatoes during the crop year 1950.
We did, however, find five cases in
tablestock in the Albany-Carleton district.
Mr. McLaren said, "These cases were
uncovered following the discovery of the disease
in a crop in British Columbia which had
originated in Prince Edward Island in 1949.
Investigation proved the same stock had not
been entered for inspection during 1950,
which was the reason why the infection
escaped our attention. It is suspected
that the ring rot originated from the use
of secondhand sacks brought here from one
of the other provinces by one of the growers
involved."

Inspection of 1951 Crop
Due to over-production and low prices
for previous crop years, growers were advised
through various sources and the press to cut
their acreage by 30% this year. The following
figures were quoted in this connection:

Applications received 1950 1951
Acres entered for inspection 5,394 4,130
Inspection 35,581 21,771

Inspection Summary
The following is a summary of the acres
by varieties which passed inspection and the
estimated yield (graded stock) for each; and
the number of acres rejected for the various
reasons:

Table with 4 columns: Variety, Acres, Estimated Yield, and Rejected Acres. Includes varieties like Irish Cobbler, Mountain, Katahdin, Sebago, etc.

Reasons for Rejections: Mosaic, Leaf Roll, Black Leg, Wilts, Spindle tuber, Foreign varieties, (mixture), Adjacent, Misc. (weeds, lack of vigour, etc.)

Shipments to Dec. 31, 1951
Although prices were low at the beginning
of the season, shipments started earlier
in the fall than last year. The first ship
was loaded October 30th and by the end
of December a total of sixteen ships
left Island ports with 465,000 bushels
of seed potatoes. During this same
period approximately 170,000 bushels
were exported from Saint John and
Halifax, the balance of 180,000 bushels
leaving by rail. Total shipments to the
end of December amounted to 815,000 bushels.
In comparison, shipments to the end
of December 1950 amounted to 1,250,000 bushels.
