Halfax Man Is Fined \$100

SUMMERSIDE — A resident of Halifax, LeRoy Wilson, here on a vacation was fined \$100 and costs by Judge Walter E. Darby in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday after his plea of guilty to the lesser charge of driving while his abilities were impaired was accepted.

He asked for time to obtain the money but the court said the request was not customarily granted in such cases. He was ordered detained but permitted to get in touch by telephone with relatives to obtain the necessary funds.

Residents of Miscouche and Summerside were each fined \$20 and costs on guilty pleas to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residences.

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Road Building Program Criticized By Shaw

KENSINGTON—"The province of Prince Edward Island needs good roads but these roads should not all be done in an election year," Walter R. Shaw, leader of the Progressive Party, told a large audience at Kensington last night.

Mr. Shaw went on to criticize the Liberal Party and its inefficient spending and emphasized the point that the Conservative Party are now holding big meetings all over the country.

Other speakers at the meeting, held in the High School Auditorium included Henry Wedge, 3rd, Prince; Keith Harrington, 3rd, Prince; Allison Profit, 4th Prince and Ernest Strong, 4th Prince.

Guest speakers at the meeting were Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P. for Prince; and Hon. J. Angus MacLean, minister of fisheries.

Mr. Shaw stated that among other promises broken by the Liberal Party was that of establishing a director of marketing.

"The Conservatives will extend markets and will increase the present trade with Newfoundland," he said.

He noted that the potato packaging on the Island was not up to standard and criticized tobacco experiments in that the Experimental Station should have carried out the experiments.

FEWER FARMS The leader of the Conservative party promised to extend the farm loan policy to the ages of 19 to 50 inclusive, noting that only about 9,000 farms are on the Island now compared with 14,000 a few years ago.

Mr. Wedge told the joint meeting of 3rd and 4th Prince that the federal party at Ottawa instituted the work on the cause-way and that the Liberals were indifferent to the need of such a causeway.

Mr. Profit spoke on Education, agriculture and citizenship in general and explained the payment of teachers supplies

ments from the Provincial Treasury as a scheme to lift the burden from the shoulders of the country people, and equalize the salaries between town and country.

In regard to agriculture he noted that the market for farm produce should be improved and that the subsidy on limestone should be increased.

WRONG WAY "It is not that this burden should be lifted off the people but that the Liberals went about it the wrong way, Mr. Strong said in speaking on hospitalization.

Keith Harrington noted that old age pensions should be increased and stated that the Conservatives were always alert to the transportation needs of the province.

Dr. Phillips speaking on the P.E.I. Trans Canada Highway and the Roads to Resources program, stated that the Island with a population of 100,000 people received exactly the same amount as Ontario with a much greater population.

The minister of fisheries noted that improvements have been made at airports and problems such as transportation solved emphasized the fact that the province should elect a vigorous government.

The meeting was presided over by Eric Jessome.

Winning the Maurice Mill Rose Bowl was no novelty to Mr. Bowness as he has only missed it two years in the eight years of the provincial show.

The show was officially opened by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Hyndman who was introduced to the packed hall by Mayor W.A. Currie, who in congratulating the Abegweit Chapter IODE, sponsors of the show, also gave a welcome to the large number of out of town exhibitors and guests.

The Lieutenant-Governor told the gathering that flowers "are the beauties of nature" as he complimented the town of Summerside on holding the Provincial Flower Show and declared the exhibition officially open.

Presiding on the stage last night was Miss Wanda Wyatt, regent of the Abegweit Chapter, who paid tribute to the work in past years of Mrs. Leslie Simmons, who for many years was convener of the show.

She noted that fewer entries were received this year but said "I know the blooms are just as lovely". 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Appeal Issued To Farmers

An appeal to farmers whose fields of potatoes are affected by blight has been issued by the marketing service of the fruit and vegetable division of the Dominion department of agriculture.

Farmers whose potato fields are affected are asked to refrain from digging until they are sure that no blight has reached the tubers, and more important still that all spores above ground are destroyed.

The department points out that on several occasions in past years, when blight was prevalent, a 10-day holding period was imposed by the fruit and vegetable division.

However, the department says, as only a very small percentage of lots examined by inspectors show blight damage in the potatoes, it does not feel justified in holding potatoes when so many growers are free from blight, especially at a time when prices are good.

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Liberal Policies Scored At Fourth Kings Meeting

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN A large enthusiastic crowd attended the Progressive Conservative reception of the Fourth District of Kings held last night at Murray Harbour to meet their representatives, Murdock MacGowan and Ewart Keeping.

Guest speakers included John A. Macdonald, M.P.; Heath Macquarrie, M.P.; and Bennett Carr of the Y.P.U., Charlottetown.

In addressing those present, Mr. Keeping expressed his appreciation of the large attendance and said that after 33 years as a civil servant, during which time he expressed no political opinions although there were times when he felt he should have, he now was in a position to do so and would.

Mr. Keeping spoke of the timing of the election, saying that the premier could not have been sure of re-election or he would have held it prior to the Royal Visit. He dealt at length on education, health, the returned soldier situation, and stated that if elected, he would see that bait holding units would be immediately established at Beach Point and other needy areas in Kings County.

In his address, the second candidate, Murdock MacGowan, outlined many of the promises made by the Matheson Government which has not been fulfilled, such as a reduction in truck licences, and paved highway to Wood Islands. He said that the Matheson government had thrown the province into debt and asked the question "should they be left in or run out?" He made mention of the fact that there were now several semi-millionaires - "friends of the Matheson Government."

SAVED EMBARRASSMENT He said the Diefenbaker gov-

ernment saved the province from embarrassment, as the cheques of the local government "were bouncing all over the place".

With reference to education, Mr. MacGowan said he felt that the best teachers went to the highest bidders, and mentioning the recent compulsory hospital insurance plan, he felt it was too much like Russian tactics when part of a cream cheque or any other income could be taken.

John A. Macdonald, M. P., dealt mainly with provincial issues pertaining to the policies of the federal government, which includes roads to resources. He said the present provincial government was "too solicitous" of their friends and too far away from the people. He spoke of his pleasure in seeing the high calibre of the representatives chosen by the party, saying they were worthy of their strongest support.

Heath Macquarrie, M. P., stated that his main point in being present, was the close association of many provincial and federal matters, and whereas 60 per cent of the provincial budget had to come from Ottawa, it was doubly necessary for federal M.P.'s from this province to participate in the local election. He said he was proud to have had a small part in arranging the Atlantic adjustment plan and the roads to resources project.

He spoke of the lack of co-operation on the part of the Matheson government with Ottawa, and in addition, stated that the few promises kept by the Matheson government, the majority of them had been fulfilled in the past two years, including the larger part
