HARD TIMES IN THE STATES.—A most distressing case was brought to the attention of the authorities at New Bedford, Mass., a few days ago. Napoleon J. Stone, who was a weaver, but has been unable to obtain work, was found dying of acute starvation. Two of his children have already starved to death. With the usual economy so characteristic of New England, the officers have allowed him \$1.50 a week.

Nearly 600 families have been evicted from their houses or apartments in New York since August 1. Many of them were ousted for defaulting in a single month's rent, in sums ranging from \$3 to \$40, and the wheels of justice in the district courts were kept busy grinding out dispossession processes.

THE TRY.—In the races at Augusta, on Wednesday last, the 2.31 class was won by Mr. Lamson's Hess, ch m in a green, 8074, 2.27, in 2.24, 2.30. This was her second race. Last year in a green she won on the same track, she made a record of 2.37. In a recent letter from the owner to Dr. Strickland, the owner of her sire, he stated that the mare was in excellent condition, and that he could put her into the list this season without any trouble.

A telephone message from Souris at half-past two this afternoon reports that the weather was fine and goodly. Number of persons had gone out to the park to witness the races.

Harold, aged 29, sire of Maid S, died at Woodbury farm, Ky., on Tuesday. He was owned by A. J. Alexander.

Monroe Salisbury has matched the black colt Directum, 7051, against the pacer Mascot, 204, holder of the world's pacing record, in a race. The match is for \$5,000 a side, and will be trotted at Columbus, Ohio, over the Fleetwood track.

Latest reports show that about 2,200 trotters and pacers have reached standard speed, which is 2.30 for trotters and 2.25 for pacers, this season. The average is nearly 50 per cent longer than at a corresponding period last year, when about 2,500 came in all told. Many horses were found a reduction for standard purposes to 2.25 for trotters and 2.20 for pacers.
