No guest will be allowed to enter Government House Grounds without an official permit.

Guests driving their own cars will enter the grounds at the main entrance and park their cars in the field north of the Residence.

Guests arriving by taxi or other car not to remain on the grounds will alight on Government Pond road and the car will proceed north to Euston Street then west to Ambrose Street and then turn north.

To avoid congestion, guests arriving by motor will be permitted to pass barriers on Pownall Street from 1:45 p. m. until 2:45 p. m.

Only cars with red sticker showing will be allowed on Pownall Street. Barriers will be closed at 2:45 p. m.

Owing to the limited time available for entering Government House Grounds, guests who can do so will find it more convenient to arrive on foot.

Island Farm Statistics

The following figures relative to Prince Edward Island agriculture are from the last Dominion census, 1931: Total number of farms, 12,865. Occupied by owners, 12,091. (This is a percentage of 93.98 of the total farms, the highest in all Canada.) Total land area, 1,397,760 acres. Area of occupied farms, 1,191,202, or 85.2 per cent of the total land area, again the highest in all Canada. Saskatchewan's percentage, the next highest, is only 37.2. Average acreage per farm, 92.6 acres. Acreage improved, 765,773. Acreage owned, 1,151,386, a percentage of 96.7. Total farm value, \$58,332,029, made up as follows: Land, \$23,333,900; Buildings, \$19,686,500; Implements and machinery, \$8,115,900; Livestock, 7,295,729. Average farm land value, \$1,806, as against \$976 for Nova Scotia and \$1,128 for New Brunswick. Average value of farm buildings, \$1,530 as against \$1,113 for Nova Scotia, and \$1,137 for New Brunswick. Average implement and machinery value per farm, \$631, as against \$286 for Nova Scotia and \$335 for New Brunswick. Average livestock value per farm, \$567, as against \$325 for Nova Scotia and \$388 for New Brunswick.

Order of Royal Procedure at Court

Soon after King George and Queen Elizabeth ascended the Throne a curious position arose with regard to the succession. While most people accepted Princess Elizabeth as heir presumptive to the Throne, certain important legal authorities held that her sister, Princess Margaret Rose, was co-equal heir with her. It was suggested that a special Act of Parliament might be necessary to establish the elder Princess's prior right. Doubt was not cleared up until the Home Secretary announced that the Government had decided to support the legal position, which showed that Princess Elizabeth was indeed sole heir. Should a son be born to their Majesties, he would of course be heir apparent and present the order of succession to the Throne is as follows: 1. Princess Elizabeth 2. Princess Margaret Rose 3. Duke of Gloucester 4. Duke of Kent 5. Prince Edward (Duke of Kent's son) 6. Princess Royal 7. Lord Lascelles 8. Lord Gerald Lascelles (Sons of Princess Royal) 9. Prince of Wales 10. Duke of York 11. Duke of Gloucester had a son, this child would succeed before his uncle, the Duke of Kent. Next in line would be the two little Princesses, followed by their aunt, the Princess Royal. The Duchesses of Gloucester and Kent come sixth and seventh, while the infant Princess Alexandra of Kent is now eighth in the line. L-397

It compels one to remember Scott's lines "Is there a man with soul so dead Who did ever to himself hath said, 'This is my own, my native tongue'."

City Takes On Gala Appearance

This Gracie of Confederation took on a gala appearance yesterday as decorations were completed along the royal route. Thousands of flags and miles of bunting combined to give the city a festive air it never has attained before in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. Centre of the display is the historic Provincial Building where King George and Queen Elizabeth will be presented with welcome by "Thane A. Campbell and Mayor E. A. Foster. At the top of the balcony above the main entrance, two large Union Jacks form the background for a six-foot golden crown of plaster composition built in relief. Rex, white and blue rosettes and bunting outline the general contours of the building. Directly below, the balcony is draped with heavy blue cloth and golden rope and tassels. The letters "G. R." are in the center. The entire balcony is with blue and gold cloth and over the doorway on either side are English and Scotch shields with grouped flags. At night the facade is floodlighted and outlined with neon tubes. Colored lights in the bed of the fountain in front of the building play on the spraying jets of water. Decorations for this building were constructed so they could be erected again for the Confederation celebration next month. At the rear of the building, Edward Island coat of arms is the theme of the decorations. Four large shields representing the English, Irish, Scotch and French nationalities of the Island population are placed above the balcony. The palace of Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Charlottetown is also outstanding. Red, white and blue bunting is draped from the eaves of the building to the lower floor windows. At regular intervals white shields punctuate the bunting. Each shield bears the name of a parish on the Island. Above the main entrance is the coat of arms of the province with the Royal coat of arms with the Union Jack and Scottish flags on either side. The City Building is also gay with flags, bunting and shields. Freely, no matter how large or small has been decorated for the Royal visit. Streets which are a part of the royal route are a mass of flags strung high overhead. Arches straddle the streets through which the Royal procession will pass.

Timely Tips For The 14th.

On Euston Street from Longworth Avenue to the end of Brighton Road there will be one-way traffic to the west only from early morning till after 5 p. m. Weymouth will also be a one way street, traffic to the east only from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. The route from Longworth Avenue thence to Euston Street and Victoria Park for cars going that way.

The main parking places will be Victoria Park, the Kensington Rifle Range which is to the right of the Grafton Street approach for cars coming over the Hills, "Fill In" which is to the left of the Grafton Street approach for cars coming from the same section and the C. A. A. grounds at the end of Prince Street.

The Marine Wharf will be barred entirely to the public except those who have permits and aim at commencing Saturday, from the R. C. M. P. Superintendent.

No parking will be allowed on North River Road between midnight of the 13th and 14th and midnight of the 14th and 15th. The same regulation applies to Elm Avenue between Spring Park Square and Euston Street, and on Longworth Avenue from the railway tracks to Euston Street.

Barriers will be placed throughout the city one block away from the route of procession, and no cars allowed to pass through barriers except in emergency cases before 7 a. m. the morning of the 14th.

One must have a permit (from R. C. M. P.) to pass through restricted areas. It is strongly suggested that all cars crossing Hills to Bridge Range or the C. N. R. "Fill In" that would enable them to leave on return at any time they may desire.

All cars parking at Victoria Park must remain till after 5 o'clock, but they can enter the park at any time, as long as there is any parking space available, or up to the limit of 3000 cars.

Special constables will be stationed at the various approaches to the city, who will gladly supply information regarding parking immediately upon arrival.

Find Torso Of Slain Woman

LEEDS, England, June 12-(CP)-Crudely wrapped in a blood soaked dress the torso of 30-year-old Edith Whitham of Leeds was discovered today in a woods near Wellington Hill, about three miles from the spot where she was last seen. The torso was found near the village of Scholton, where her severed head, arm and right leg were found Saturday.

Her shoes, underclothes and a blood-stained cyclist's cap were found nearby with the torso. A policeman groping through the woods stumbled across the package. Police continued their search for the unknown murderer of the young half-blind woman. She disappeared from Leeds about eight days ago and apparently was killed 48 hours before the crime was discovered. Miss Evelyn Cates, a singer who identified Miss Whitham's severed body, told newspapermen she believed her severed head had been murdered by a band of counterfeiters. Miss Whitham, she said, had been duped by the band into passing counterfeit half-crown pieces.

Asked No Favors For Royal Sons

As each of the Royal Princes in turn entered one or other Service, King George V used to send for the commanding officer in question and impress upon him that he wished no favoritism shown to his son. These orders were carried out to the letter, so that our present King (like his brothers) served first as an ordinary, unprivileged junior officer in the Forces of which he is now supreme head. Even a visit from his father was not allowed to break the rule.

When, shortly after the outbreak of war, King George V paid a visit of inspection to his Fleet, Prince Albert was a midshipman in H. M. S. Collingwood. The King came aboard, but did not ask to see his son.

Following the inspection, there was the usual presentation of officers in order of seniority. Albert, most at the end of the line came Midshipman Prince Albert.

The Captain gravely introduced him like the rest, and with a click of his heels the young officer saluted his father and passed on without a word.

Decrease Shown In Communicants

(By The Canadian Press) MIDLAND, Ont., June 12-Dr. J. W. MacNamara, Clerk of the Assembly, told the 66th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada that for the third year in succession he was called upon to report a decrease in communicants.

He reported the Maritime Synod with an increase of 500 communicants made the best showing. The total communicant membership reported was 174,490, a decrease of 1,384 members.

Maritime and Manitoba Synods reported increased amounts paid by congregations for stipends, but other synods reported reduced contributions.

Policemen reported increases in the amount raised for all congregational purposes, the Montreal and Ottawa Synods, the Alberta, British Columbia and Maritime Synods, but the others reported decreases.

Asked No Favors For Royal Sons

As each of the Royal Princes in turn entered one or other Service, King George V used to send for the commanding officer in question and impress upon him that he wished no favoritism shown to his son. These orders were carried out to the letter, so that our present King (like his brothers) served first as an ordinary, unprivileged junior officer in the Forces of which he is now supreme head. Even a visit from his father was not allowed to break the rule.

When, shortly after the outbreak of war, King George V paid a visit of inspection to his Fleet, Prince Albert was a midshipman in H. M. S. Collingwood. The King came aboard, but did not ask to see his son.

Following the inspection, there was the usual presentation of officers in order of seniority. Albert, most at the end of the line came Midshipman Prince Albert.

The Captain gravely introduced him like the rest, and with a click of his heels the young officer saluted his father and passed on without a word.

Decrease Shown In Communicants

(By The Canadian Press) MIDLAND, Ont., June 12-Dr. J. W. MacNamara, Clerk of the Assembly, told the 66th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada that for the third year in succession he was called upon to report a decrease in communicants.

He reported the Maritime Synod with an increase of 500 communicants made the best showing. The total communicant membership reported was 174,490, a decrease of 1,384 members.

Maritime and Manitoba Synods reported increased amounts paid by congregations for stipends, but other synods reported reduced contributions.

Policemen reported increases in the amount raised for all congregational purposes, the Montreal and Ottawa Synods, the Alberta, British Columbia and Maritime Synods, but the others reported decreases.
