## Hunting Season Opens This Morning In P.E.I.

Hunters from many parts of Canada and United States have been arriving steadily in the province this past few days in order to be on hand for the opening shoot which got underway this morning.

Geese and ducks are expected to bear the brunt of the heaviest fire today. Because of the large decrease in duck population in Canada—estimated as high as 40 per cent—the bag limit this year in Prince Edward Island has been reduced to six from eight in force previously. The bag limit on geese still stands at five.

Frank Acorn, president of the Fish and Game Association, thinks prospects for hunting this year are fairly good. However, Mr. Acorn believes that the heavy foliage and the large amount of grain still standing may present the nimrods with some difficulties particularly at the outset of the season.

Bag limits on Hungarian partridge is five per day, on pheasants, three per day, including not more than one hen pheasant in the counties of Kings and Queens, and the area of Prince east of Summerside. So far as West Prince is concerned the season on pheasants remains closed.

The 1959 season for shooting wilson's snipe and woodcock also opens tomorrow with bag limits on each set at eight per day.

On the Island the brant season does not open until October 29.

## Island Board Of Trade Idea Will Be Discussed At S'side

The proposal has been made by the Alberton Board of Trade and suggests that representatives of the various local trade boards meet to consider the proposition.

A highlight of the meeting will be the showing of a film made by the National Film Board, depicting the various events of this year's Lobster Carnival. The film presents an interesting picture of the various events.

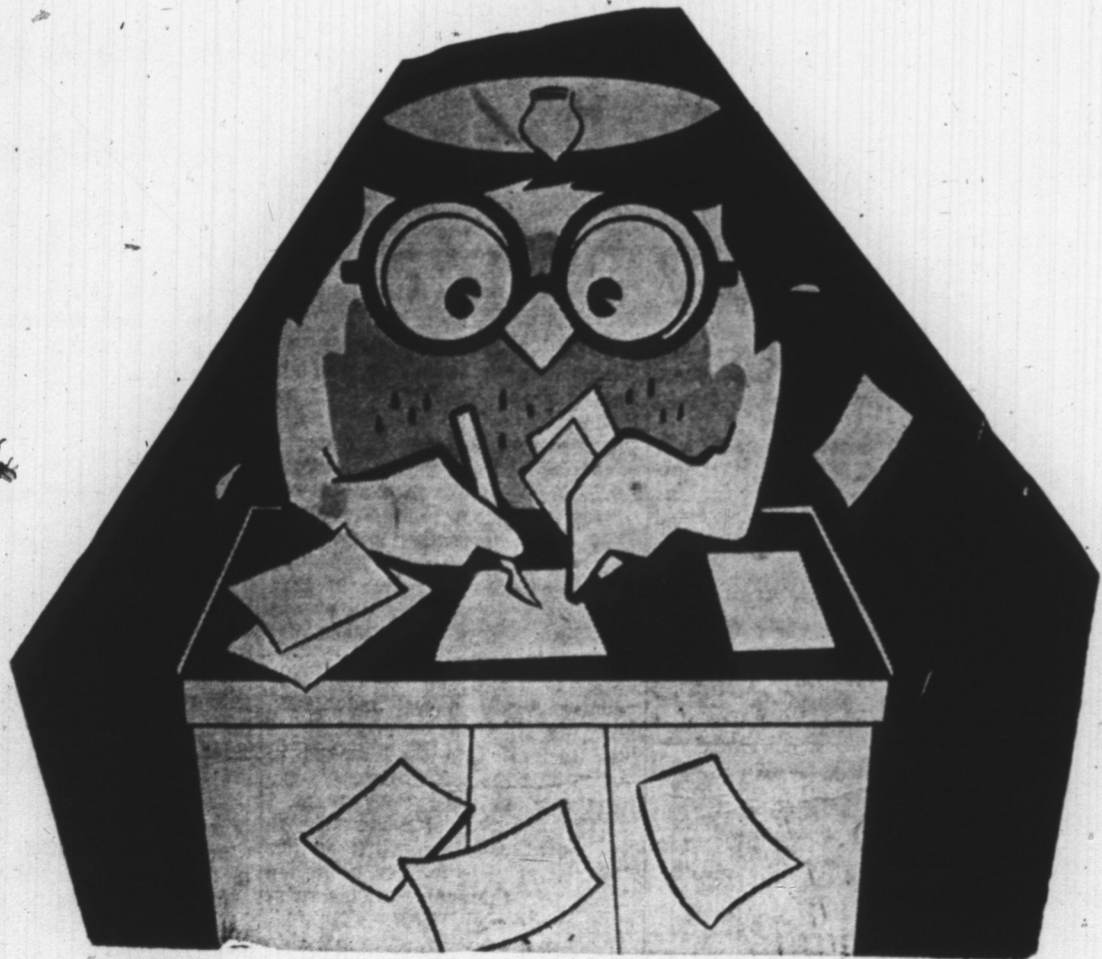
