Confession Of Murder Sparks Search In B.C.

VANCOUVER (CP)—Police are searching for 39-year-old Charles M. Heathman who confessed to a newspaper the killing of a Vernon boy for whose murder he was twice sentenced to the gallows and finally freed by the B.C. Court of Appeal.

In Victoria Attorney-General Bonner, after hearing that Heathman had told the Vancouver Sun "I killed Donald Otley—I enjoyed killing him," said a course of official action already has begun.

Donald Otley, 10-year-old newsboy, was murdered in a Vernon hobo jungle on Labor Day, 1960. His body was found in the bush.

Vancouver police, after reading the Sun's account of Heathman's grisly confession of how he strangled the boy, put out an "all-points bulletin" for his apprehension. Police said a warrant under the Mental Hospital Act has been issued for his arrest—the exact charge not disclosed.

Reds Threaten Walkout If U.S. Resumes Tests

GENEVA (Reuters)—The Soviet Union has threatened to withdraw from nuclear test ban talks if the United States resumes atmospheric testing.

Disarmament delegate Valerian Zorin said the talks would be dealt an "irreparable blow" by resumption and added this meant "there will be no negotiations."

Zorin spoke at a press conference after Friday's session of the 17-nation disarmament conference.

Non-Communist diplomatic observers interpreted the Soviet delegate's remark to be a threat to withdraw from the three-power nuclear subcommittee of the disarmament conference—but not from the conference itself.

The subcommittee—composed of the United States, Britain and France—was set up to deal with

aligned countries could be a basis for further negotiations aimed at breaking the nuclear deadlock.

The plan calls for an international commission of scientists, possibly from non-aligned countries, to report any explosion or suspicious seismic event and to process all data from an agreed system of observation posts.

Dean said there were many ambiguous and vague portions in the neutralist plan but added that U.S. is prepared to study it.

Former 'King' Is Sentenced

LEOPOLDVILLE (Reuters)—Albert Kalonji, former "king" of the autonomous Congo state or South Kasai, has been sentenced to five years in prison for having ordered the arrest of a political rival.

Kalonji, who is a deputy in the Congo's Parliament, was charged with having arbitrarily ordered the arrest of M. Lufualabo at Bakwanga in South Kasai. Kalonji's lawyers gave notice of appeal.

Sealer Arrives With 24,000 Pelts

NEW HARBOR, N.S. (CP)—The Halifax-owned sealing ship North Star VI arrived at this South Shore community with about 24,000 seal pelts.

Capt. Karl Karlson, who operates a seal pelt processing plant here, said his catch was one of the best in recent years. The pelts bring about \$5 each.

The North Star VI was the first of eight ships operating in the Gulf of St. Lawrence seal hunting grounds this year to arrive in Nova Scotia. The season opened early last month.

The ship carries a crew of 50, mostly from Newfoundland. Capt. William Moss declined to comment on reports of seal thefts by helicopter in the gulf this year. The reports are being investigated by RCMP in Prince Edward Island.

One crew member said radio reports from ships still at the sealing grounds indicated that some skills were still being made, but that ice in the area was weakening.
