

Halifax Atlantics In 5-1 Win Over Islanders In Game Saturday Night

HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics had little trouble Saturday as they defeated Charlottetown Islanders 5-1 to hold their lead in the Maritime Major Hockey League.

Billy Ford led the Halifax attack, snipping home three goals and assisting on another. Other Halifax marksmen were Bob Bowness and Doug McPhee.

Paul Sandion scored the only Charlottetown goal at 8:22 of the second period. Rucko Trainor and Buck Whitlock were given assists. The win left Halifax still seven points ahead of Sydney Millionaires, who defeated Glace Bay Miners Saturday.

Two goals by Ford gave Atlantics the jump in the first period and he slammed home another in the second period before Sandion broke the ice for Islanders.

Bowness and McPhee added two more in the third for insurance as the short-handed Atlantics continued their hot winning streak.

St. F.X. Defeat Saint Dunstan's 72-39 In Hoop Game Here On Saturday

The Saint Francis Xavier University basketball team defeated Saint Dunstan's University 72-39 Saturday night in an exhibition game at the S. D. U. gymnasium.

The powerful Xavierians, giving a great all-round display of passing and shooting, controlled play in the last quarters after being outscored by the City Collegians during the first ten minutes.

The visitors gave an outstanding shooting exhibition, clicking on an unusually high number of their shots. Their passing and rebound work off the backboards also excelled.

Al Grassi, the elusive forward of the Xavierians, was high scorer with 27 points while Korbut was runner-up for the visitors with 18. Jack Reardon led the Saints' attack with a 19-point performance, followed by Gus Dorais with 12. Frank Slowey had seven.

The Saints got away to a strong start and led 15-14 at the end of the first quarter. The Xavierians then injected six-foot, four-inch Russ MacNeill into the game and the tide changed abruptly.

The Antigonish athletes scored 18 points in the second quarter to lead 32-19. At the three-quarter mark the Xavierians were ahead 55-29.

Bailey Requests Extra Time; Islanders Order LaChance, LeBlanc Return

The Saskatoon Quakers notified Islanders coach "Bucko" Trainor over the week-end that winger John Bailey had received his transportation money and had requested a couple of days to straighten out personal affairs before coming to Charlottetown.

Bailey, who played with Saskatoon this season, has been loaned to the Islanders for the remainder of the season through the Cleveland Barons and New York Rangers organizations. The deal was made last week.

Trainor expects that Bailey will be here early this week.

The Islanders coach also announced that he had been in touch with Punch Imlach of the Quebec Aces yesterday. Imlach told Trainor that he would protect the Islanders in their dealings with Mont Joll over LeBlanc and LaChance.

The Islanders have forwarded wires to LeBlanc and LaChance telling them to return to Charlottetown. Imlach stated that the players would be made return unless the Islanders concluded a satisfactory cash settlement with Mont Joll for the services of the two men.

The two players left here last Tuesday morning after being bought by the Islanders from Mont Joll.

Trainor had a telephone conversation with the Mont Joll officials on Saturday and put a cash figure on the players. He expects a reply today or tomorrow.

In the meantime the Islanders coach has been in touch with two Quebec League clubs and has lines out for a defenseman from Valleyfield and a centreman from another team.

He is still dealing for a defenseman from Ontario but will not conclude any deal until he is certain of the player's ability.

Decide Moers Field Too Small

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Two International League directors made an inspection Saturday of Moers Field, home of Richmond's entry in class B baseball, and decided it won't do as a home for the city's hoped-for club in International League baseball.

Both Joe Ziegler of Buffalo Bisons and Guy Moreau of Montreal Royals said the field owned by Eddie Moers, auto dealer who operates a Piedmont League team here, isn't big enough to accommodate a class AAA club. They added that the park does not offer possibilities for expansion.

The park has a seating capacity of 4,350. Moers had said he can enlarge it to seat 7,500 by erecting additional bleachers. Ziegler and Moreau agreed a capacity of 10,000 would be needed to make International League baseball here a paying proposition.

Tiger-Cats Defeat Blue Bombers 12-6 To Win Cup

TORONTO, (CP)—Hamilton Tiger-Cats parlayed a rock-ribbed defence and a great aerial attack Saturday into a 12-6 Grey Cup victory over Winnipeg Blue Bombers that probably was the best played final since western Canada first challenged for the trophy 32 years ago.

The tension-packed football spectacle offered its greatest thrills in the last few seconds, with Bombers, behind 12-6 and sniffing a possible tie on the precision passing of quarter Indian Jack Jacobs. The game ended with three Tiger-Cat players happily clutching the ball on the ground at their goal-line and 27,328 fans trying to decide just what happened.

Jacobs, a towering, gallant player in defeat, had sent Bombers winging on a 100-yard march that brought play to the Hamilton four. Then came the play that will be a conversation piece among fans for years.

Jacobs shot a bullet-like pass to half Tom Casey, parked on the Tiger-Cat two-yard line. The ball squirted out of his arms when he was hit by Lou Kusserow, a standard Hamilton defensive and offensive star all afternoon.
