Broilers Are Economy Buy

OTTAWA (CP) - Broiler chickens will continue to be an economical food buy in Canada this month according to the monthly food bulletin issued monthly by the federal agriculture department.

The bulletin also says that good and choice grades (blue and red brands) of beef still are plentiful throughout the country. Beef prices are expected to remain at present levels during the month.

Here are the bulletin's predictions for other staple foods this month:

Veal: Supplies will be seasonally plentiful for the next few weeks and prices may be slightly lower than last year.

Chicken: Large seasonal gains in chise production in May will supply the market with the needed variety of chickens to keep prices stable.

Eggs: Higher use of coffee and tea in May is usually associated with a larger May consumption of evaporated milk, says the bulletin. Production of evaporated milk up and supplies are plentiful.

Eggs: egg production continues to run about 10 per cent ahead of last year. Prices are expected to remain near present levels.

Turkeys: Turkeys 10 pounds and over remain in short supply and prices will remain high.

Apples: Good quality apples are plentiful.

Potatoes: Maritime potatoes still are plentiful. Prices are expected to advance with the season.
