MORE POISONED CANDY.

The Results of Eating It

Sad Death of Mrs. Dr. McRae.

SEVERAL NARROW ESCAPES.

St. John, N. B. Oct. 3.

To-night the citizens were horrified to hear whispered about Mrs. Dr. McRae, who died suddenly yesterday, had met her death by being poisoned.

This evening it was discovered that similar packages were received by Rev. J. De Soyres, Rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, and Rev. J. T. Deinstadt, pastor of the Exmouth Street Methodist Church.

Mr. Dunstard opened his box and was about giving some to his children when his wife had a presentiment that something was wrong with it.

The box of confectionary, like the one sent to Rev. Mr. McRae, was then handed over to W. F. Best, and he has reported that there is enough strychnine in either box to poison a whole family.

It was late to-night when these facts leaked out sufficiently to be relied on, but the news soon spread through the city and has created great excitement.
