

Saint John Beavers Trample Millionaires 8-2 In Game At Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 28 (CP)—Saint John Beavers administered one of the worst if not the worst defeat in the history of Sydney hockey as they trampled the fifth-place Millionaires 8-2 before 1,819 zealous fans.

The Maritime Major League leaders accomplished the run-way with ease, shooting two un-natched goals in the first period despite Sydney's early pressure. Beavers unbalanced Sydney's attack completely in the second period and sped away for two more goals. Millionaires were loose and helpless for the final 20-minute onslaught.

Trampled 6-1 by Moncton Hawks the night previously, Millionaires could offer only token opposition after a willing first period charge. The evidence by shooting was far from indicative of the actual play. Millionaires carried a 35-20 edge here but at least 60 per cent of the shots were assistance efforts. Big Phil Hughes was the master on the close

plunges, most of which came in the first period.

Beavers, in their best all-round display here, cut the Sydney defence to shreds. They opened all ears thrust at them and found no problem in goalkeeper Nick Pidsodny.

Offensively, Beavers won the game on the efforts of one line alone. Tom Smelle, Johnny Ubrico and Jake Meldrum teamed up to accumulate 15 of the 19 scoring points rung up by the visitors.

Millionaires didn't register until halfway through the final period when Ed (Whitey) Prokop planted a 20-foot by then and added two more in quick succession before Bill Cupolo capped it banning Earl Frezell's chess pass at 14:28.

Rangers Defeat Chicago 6-3

NEW YORK, Nov. 28 (CP)—New York Rangers burst out with their biggest scoring spree of the season tonight as they defeated Chicago Black Hawks 6-3 at Madison Square Garden to move into a three-way tie for third place in the National Hockey League.

The defeat dumped the Black Hawks into last place, a single point behind the Rangers, Boston Bruins and Montreal Canadiens.

Tonight's high-scoring game was watched by 8,135 fans.

Zone Rate Hearing Set For December 17

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 (CP)—The Board of Transport Commissioners will hear on Dec. 17 an application for an appeal from a decision setting up a single freight-rate zone in Prince Edward Island. The hearing will be held here.

The appeal is being sought by the Canadian National Railways. It will be opposed by the Maritime Transportation Commission, on whose application the Board recently wiped out the island's two zones and created a single one instead.

Sponsors will be sought for minor teams in the paperweight, peewee, bantam, midget and juvenile divisions. At least two teams will be formed for each group. Registration of players for the different groups will take place at the High School some time next week. It is planned to have a coach for each team. The meeting adjourned to await secretary Hogan's report of his interview with the proprietors of the new open-air rink on Notre Dame Street.

Fox And Skunk Bounties Continued

The resumption of the bounty on skunks and foxes which was announced this week by Premier I. Walter Jones will be effective starting December 1. The bounty is \$1 for skunks and \$2 for red and patch foxes.

Although no figures are available on the number of animals on which a bounty was paid last year, the total amount paid out from last November until the end of February was approximately \$7,700.

OTTAWA, Nov. 28 (CP)—Parliament will be asked at this session to provide salary increases for the registrars of the Supreme Court of Canada and of the Exchequer Court, it was learned today. Sport yesterday received another black eye in the United States when Drake University announced it was quitting its 43 year old membership in the Missouri Valley Conference. Its reason for quitting and it was a good one, was that the conference would not investigate an incident in which Drake's great football back John Bright suffered a fractured jaw. Drake University charged that Bright was the object of three vicious and premeditated attacks by an opposing player. Bright had pictures to prove it. We saw those pictures in a national magazine recently and saw where the opposing player definitely punched and elbowed Bright on the jaw even when the player was not carrying the ball.

This is just another incident of a sport philosophy which says Win at any cost, but win. "It is one which crops up a little too often in present day athletic circles and in other circles as well. In sport it is a case of the rotten apple spoiling the rest of the barrel for we know that for every case of deliberate dirt and undercover work you can find a 100 cases of sportsmanship of the highest calibre. However, it is the one case which will attract the publicity because it is news and it is different.

There have also been cases of such incidents in Canada as well as the U. S. A. Several weeks ago an Ottawa football player, Pete Karpuk sprang from the sidelines to stop an almost sure scoring play by an opposing team. For days his feat was given teams of publicity but actually all it amounted to was a cheap piece of football strategy to win at any cost.

There have been cases too when hockey players have been sent onto the ice with the sole purpose of doing nothing but getting an opposing player out of the game. There have been rumors that it has happened in our own rink and has been done by an opposing team but we don't believe these rumors were true. There was a case last year between two N. H. L. teams when one player entered the penalty box for the sole purpose of starting a fight with another player and having that player thrown out of the game.

We have been talking to athletes who claim that you must get the opposing player before he gets you. Several years ago one of the players now wearing an Islanders uniform was the object of an attack in which his back was broken. We have also been talking to hundreds of athletes who have had no other object than that of scoring goals—try or getting strikeouts. It is on this latter note that we want to conclude this consideration of sport but it is on account of the odd sour note that uninformed people will claim "All sport is going to the dogs." Like Russian propaganda it is wrong but there is a slight element of truth in it.

Tuesday night's 6-1 win of the Moncton Hawks over the Sydney Millionaires doesn't make Bill Dinning's Millionaires look very good, especially since the Beavers had just defeated the Hawks 7-0 on the previous night. The hapless Millionaires, however, were beset with injuries and were playing without eight of their best men. Missing from the Sydney lineup were Cliff Roach, "Red" MacRae, Dunc MacIntyre, Alex Birukow, Eddie Marlene, Frank Bathgate, Laurie Petersen and "Skippy" Frezell. These players are out with injuries or sickness and all that Dinning had left was a skeleton crew. In last Saturday night's game between the Glace Bay Miners and Millionaires defenseman Ronnie Matthews played at centre.

A number of seat holders in the Sydney-Glace Bay area were faced with a problem last night. Quite a few fans had purchased holding tickets for both the Sydney and Glace Bay games and last night both teams were playing at home. Memorial Field Lighting Discussed At Meeting Of Abegweit Association

The lighting of Memorial Field for night sports was suggested and agreed upon as one of the most necessary projects for the development of amateur athletics in the City at an interesting and enthusiastic meeting of the Amateur Abegweit Athletic Association last night at Sandy's.

With President Gordon Bennett presiding over the close to 100 members in attendance the meeting heard reports of the past year's activities and of proposals for improvements in sporting conditions in the coming seasons.

But the proposal which drew the most attention was that of lighting Memorial Field. It was first suggested by Elmer Blanchard in his report as football chairman and later expounded by Brigadier W. W. Reid, Department of Physical Fitness and other speakers.

Brigadier Reid estimated that it would cost \$18,000 for a complete lighting system to be installed. The poles, which the Department has, cost \$1,000. The lighting equipment cost about \$11,000 and the installation between \$6,000-\$7,000.

He told the members that he had seen the City Council about the matter some months ago and was waiting to hear an answer from them. He expected a definite yes or no from them shortly, he added.

"The lighting equipment can be installed one month after it is ordered but we must have \$11,000 to put on the line for it as soon as we get it," he continued. He suggested that the money could be raised by a club on a five or ten year plan.

Athletes from the present and earlier generations gathered together last night under the colors of the red and black for their annual meeting. It was a meeting which showed that the association

was in a healthy and vigorous condition and one which is determined to sprout into large fields of activities.

Guest speakers at the meeting other than Brigadier Reid were Walter Lawlor, President of the M.A.H.A., Arthur Gaudet and James Coyle.

Reports for the year's work were presented by the various committee chairmen. Following are the chairmen of the committees: Hockey, Jack Kane; baseball, Danny MacCormack; track and field, George Walters; football, Elmer Blanchard.

Resignation Accepted

The resignation of Col. W. J. MacDonald from the executive was accepted with regret. He was congratulated and thanked for his 30 years of unstinted aid to the club. Jack Kane and George Walters were re-elected to their term while Walter LePage and James Coyle, Jr., were elected as executive members for the first time. They will also serve three years.

Guest speaker Walter Lawlor recalled that it was 22 years since he had first played with an Abegweit team. He stated that he would aid the Abegweit hockey program in every way possible and suggested that each member try to recruit as many people for the club as possible.

In his remarks Brigadier Reid paid tribute to the work of George Francis in baseball circles. He regretted that Mr. Francis or "Mr. Baseball" was unable to attend the meeting on account of illness. He stated that Abegweit teams had been promised one night a week at the Forum this winter. This time will be used for conducting leagues in various brackets.
