

Saints Rack Up Fourth Straight Win With 58-18 Victory Over Airmen

The Saint Dunstan's University basketball team has been pronounced fit and ready to meet the University of New Brunswick in the opening game of the Maritime Intercollegiate basketball series here on Saturday night.

The basketball physician's diagnosis was given last night following the Saints-Summerside R. C. A. F. Island League hoop game at the College Gym. The score of the game was 58-18 in favor of the Saints.

The 40-point spread between the two teams was the greatest that the Saints have manufactured this season, an indication that the boys are fast rounding into top condition.

Deadey Jack Reardon led the Saints to their fourth straight Island League victory with a 21 point effort. Jack shot 10 field goals and one free throw for his 21 points.

Gus Dorais and Earl MacKinnon shared runner-up honors with 8 points each. Dorais sank four field goals while MacKinnon had three field goals and two free throws.

McNaughton of the Air Force led the losers with six points. Richmond had four.

An oddity of last night's game was the fact that the Saints held

the Airmen down to three points in each of the first, second and fourth quarters.

The Collegians jumped into an 18-3 lead in the first quarter. They led 29-6 at the end of the half and 39-15 upon the completion of the third quarter. In the last ten minutes Saints outscored their rivals 19-3.

The Airmen showed their best form in the third quarter. In that time they scored nine points against 10 for their opponents.

Ban Lifted On Halifax Games At Local Forum

HALIFAX, Jan. 28 — (CP) — President J. E. Hudson of the Maritime Major Hockey League tonight lifted his ban on games between Charlottetown Islanders and Halifax Atlantics at the Charlottetown Forum.

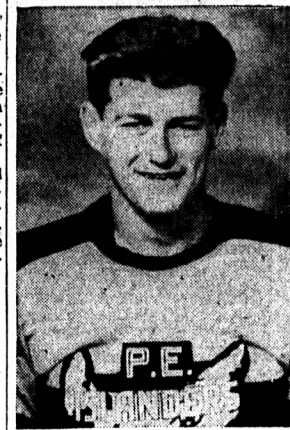
The ban, imposed after objects were tossed onto the ice and the referees complained they had no dressing room privacy, was lifted after the Forum management said steps will be taken to prevent such incidents in the future.

No games between the two clubs were actually missed during the ban.

Mr. Hudson said the Forum management has promised that "there will be adequate police protection... and that the referee and linesmen will have the exclusive use of a dressing room."

The league president also said he has turned down a Halifax request for a league meeting to discuss the refereeing situation. Mr. Hudson said he told Atlantics he would call such a meeting if requested by two or more clubs.

Gray Sidelined For Three Weeks



High scoring Bob Gray (above) will be sidelined from at least two to three weeks with a fractured bone in his left wrist, it was revealed yesterday by x-rays.

The big right winger suffered the injury in Tuesday night's game against the Sydney Millionaires in Sydney. He had the wrist encased in a cast yesterday and will return to hospital in two weeks time for a further examination.

At the time of the injury Gray was riding high in the scoring columns. He had 26 goals and 32 assists for a total of 58 points and held a firm grip on fourth place in the point-parade.

Seven of those points were picked up last week as Bob connected for seven goals in three games. These points made him the highest scoring right winger in the league.

Mangrum Favored To Take Tucson Open

TUCSON, Ariz., Jan. 28 — (AP) — Lloyd Mangrum of Niles, Ill., is the strong favorite to win the \$10,000 Tucson Open Golf Tournament which starts here tomorrow. He will be seeking his fourth victory in six starts during the winter swing.

A flock of the 135 pros and amateurs starting the four-day, 72-hole scramble believe they can take first prize money of \$2,000 if they can best Mangrum.

The 6,402-yard, par 35-70 El Rio Golf and Country Club layout is one of the easiest courses the pros play all year.

Yet few expect the 72-hole total of 283 Mangrum shot in winning the 1948 event here to be broken or equaled.

The field includes six Canadians — Stan Home and Jack Kay, both of Montreal; John Hendrick of Ottawa; Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon; Rudy Horvath of Windsor, Ont.; and Bill Mawhinney of Vancouver.

Fred Saigh Gets Prison Term, \$15,000 Fine For Income Tax Evasion

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 28 — (AP) — Fred M. Saigh, owner of the St. Louis Cardinals, was sentenced to 15 months in prison and fined \$15,000 today for income tax evasion a few hours after he pleaded no defence to two counts of a federal indictment.

Judge Roy W. Harper sentenced him to 15 months in prison on each count, the sentence to run concurrently. He fined him \$10,000 on the first count and \$5,000 on the fifth.

The 48-year-old Saigh was grim as the sentence was pronounced. He rose to address the court.

"This means, of course," Saigh began, "I will have to dispose of the Cardinals. There is no way I can stay in baseball."

He told the court he had seen much lesser sentences given men for income tax evasion and then he added:

"I think you have been too tough with me."

Judge Harper gave him until May 4 to get his affairs in order. At that time the sentence is to be executed.

Meanwhile, Saigh is to remain free on \$10,000 bond.

The two counts of which Saigh pleaded no defence charged him with evading payment of \$19,299 in federal income taxes. The second count charged him with evasion of \$14,564 in taxes in 1947 and count five charged Saigh in a joint income return with his wife in 1949 evaded payment of \$4,748 in taxes.

R. H. McRoberts, Saigh's lawyer, said there could be no appeal since Saigh had thrown himself on the mercy of the court.

Chamberlain now is in a most enviable position as far as a coach is concerned. His team has left nothing but a pile of debris in its wake during the past month. In the last 18 games the Islanders have lost only two contests which is an amazing record. Out of those 18 games they have won 13 and tied three. At present they have run their unbeaten streak to seven games and they need but one more win to rack up their longest winning skien of the season.

However things weren't always as bright for the fast-talking Hardrock. A month ago Chamberlain's judgment was at stake when he traded off Jim MacKenzie and Connie Bonhomme to the Glace Bay Miners for Walter Pawlshyn. For several weeks Bonhomme and MacKenzie starred when they returned to Charlottetown to play against the Islanders. Each time they were given their due praise. However an analysis of the playing of the three men involved in the deal shows that the trade was one of the better moves made by the Islanders coach.

To begin with Pawlshyn has scored almost as many goals as Bonhomme and MacKenzie combined. Walter has blinked the red light 12 times while Bonhomme has come through with seven goals and MacKenzie six since they joined the Miners. Pawlshyn has amassed a total of 20 points against 15 each by MacKenzie and Bonhomme. However the extra assists of the two Glace Bay players could well be checked off against Pawlshyn's back checking.

Few goals are scored against Pawlshyn's wing while such is not always the case with MacKenzie.

The wisdom in Chamberlain's trade is to be found in an analysis of where and when and against whom the two ex-Islanders have scored their goals. Bonhomme scored five of his seven goals against the Islanders. MacKenzie potted four of his six against his former team-mates. Those four goals of MacKenzie's were scored in Charlottetown as were four of the five Bonhomme markers. Five of Bonhomme's eight assists were scored in Charlottetown and four of MacKenzie's nine assists were picked up on the same ice surface.

Altogether Bonhomme and MacKenzie scored 19 of their combined 30 points against the Islanders. Seventeen of those points were scored at Charlottetown which indicates that the two men are trying to play hockey only at Charlottetown. Further proof of this statement is to be found in a review of their efforts against the Millionaires and Atlantics. Since the first of January MacKenzie

The victory sent the Canadiens one point ahead of the defending champion Detroit Red Wings, who had kept the lead since Dec. 11.

Dick Gamble shared the hero's role with Curry as he slipped the left winger a pass in front of the goal. Gamble also started the attack on Ranger goalie Lorne Worsley, firing a shot from the left side which the goalie was able to block but couldn't clear.
