

Local and Other Items.

The cholera has reached Paris. Hon. A. J. McDonald is in the city. The population of Picton Island is estimated at 400. The best place to buy underclothing is at J. B. Macdonald's. In the boy is father of the man, the man's father is frequently a nuisance. The French in New York are raising money for the cholera sufferers in France. Another lot of Hoop Skirts and Corsets, received to day, at J. B. Macdonald's. The S. S. Bonavista arrived at St. John's, Nfld., at 5.30 a. m., to-day—the best passage this season. Macdonald's Boot Store. Complaint is made that the Dominion offices are closed to-day—though notice was not given that they would be closed. The Rev. Canon Omeara, L. L. D., Rector of Port Hope Ontario, is in the city visiting his son the Rev. Mr. Omeara of St. Pauls. Box Tons, the celebrated French Polish for ladies boots—the very best—for sale at J. B. Macdonald's boot store. Halibut, from six to eight inches in diameter, fell in Eau Claire Co., Wisconsin, the other day, doing \$20,000 damages to the crops. The police have seized a quantity of arms and ammunition near Tallamore, Ire., and have arrested four men in connection with the seizure. Sir William Robinson, of Barbados, formerly Governor of P. E. Island, and Lady Robinson were in New York on Friday en route for England. During the winter a colony of French agriculturists will be brought over to instruct the French Canadians in the culture of the beet for the manufacture of sugar. The new French divorce law was gazetted on the 29th inst. Three thousand suits for divorce have already been begun, many noble and prominent families being involved in some of them. At a meeting of Prime Minister Ferry and Li Fong Pao, the Chinese ambassador, it was arranged that China should pay France an indemnity of 20,000,000. A Pacific solution of the trouble is now certain. W. H. Lynch will lecture at St. Peter's Road School House, on Monday night next, Montague Bridge on Tuesday, Kensington on Wednesday, and organize branches of the P. E. Island Dairyman's Association. Forty English agricultural laborers arrived in St. John on the 29th inst. The Sun says: Mr. S. Gardner, Immigration Agent, has already supplied several of them with places, and will be pleased to locate the balance as fast as applications come in. A serious accident occurred at St. Pierre, Mig., on the 28th inst. A steamboat owned by Fabissol & Co., while lying at the wharf bust her boiler, killing the fireman and shattering the steamer to pieces. Portions of the wreck were projected 600 yards. Harry Gilmore defeated Paul Patullo for the light-weight championship of Canada, Marquis of Queensbury rules, at Toronto, on the 28th inst. Ill feeling having previously existed between them the fight was a bitter one. This is Gilmore's sixth successful contest this season. In St. John, N. B., on Monday evening, a horse and carriage driven by an unknown man ran over a young woman named Ida Hayes, at the foot of King street, and inflicted injuries from which she died in a few minutes. The person driving the horse did not stop and all attempts to discover his identity have failed. Major Tilton attributes the success of the Wimbledon team this year to the fact that the Canadians and English had met on equal terms. This is the first year the Canadians have used the Martini-Henri rifle since the rifles were sent them from England for practice. The St. John Sun says: "On the first of July there were 475 farms in blast in Great Britain and 421 in Ireland. That is, nearly one-half the crude iron manufacturing establishments in the country were unlighted, and the workmen who had formerly manned them were idle. This, too, in Free Trade Britain, where no N. P. exists to blight and destroy. The Guy Family, which gave a successful entertainment in Market Hall last week, have returned to the city, and will appear again in the same Hall to-night. They have with them Still B. Call, who will give an exhibition of his wonderful trap 23, saved wire, and club swinging performance. Reserved seats tickets can be procured at Reddin's Drug Store. We are pleased to learn that our friend Mr. Robt. A. Anderson, late of Southport, and now of Maple, B. C., has been successful in obtaining a first-class license at the annual examination for teachers in Victoria, B. C. He made an average of seventy per cent on all subjects, the highest ever made there in that class. He can now take the highest place as a teacher should an opening occur. For the present he will continue at Maple Bay. The Circus—Frank Robbins' Circus which appears here on the 11th and 12th of August is highly spoken of in Nova Scotia. The Standard, Conn., Advocate says: "Frank A. Robbins' New show gave two entertainments in our city on Tuesday last and fully maintained its reputation, which preceded the company. The grand show came with the most flattering credentials and sustained well the reputation. From the grand free street parade to the close of the performances there were no false statements, no objectionable features, and the entertainments were worthy of the liberal patronage bestowed. The arena and aerial performances were presented in an artistic manner, introducing many new, novel and startling features. In the menagerie department were found rare specimens of the animal kingdom. The show is one of the best that has ever paid us a visit, and was appreciated by those who attended it."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Cholera. Marseilles, July 30. The sale of melons has been prohibited. Cholera is gaining in intensity. The disease has made its appearance in several villages which had previously been exempt. Paris, July 30. There were twelve deaths from cholera at Marseilles last night, and 10 at Toulon. The force of the epidemic in the two places continues to decrease. Marseilles, July 30. One death only from cholera since nine o'clock. Prize Fight. New York, July 30. The prize fight between Dempsey and Fulljames, was won by Dempsey in 21 rounds, lasting 35 minutes. After ten rounds the betting was one hundred dollars to five. France and China. Paris, July 30. Prime Minister Ferry has refused to extend the time for China to reply to France's demands beyond present limit of August. A Denial. Cairo, July 30. It is officially denied that Osman Digna has been killed. Florence Nightingale, the eminent philanthropist, now sixty-four years of age, has written a letter from Paris to the New York Herald, giving practical advice in the view of the rapid spread of cholera. The gist of her letter is contained in one passage:—"Vigorously enforce sanitary measures, but with judgment—i. e., scavenge, scavenge, scavenge; wash, cleanse and linewash; remove all putrid human refuse from privies and cess pits, and cess-pools and dustbins; look to stables and cowsheds and pigsties; look to common lodging houses and crowded places, dirty houses and yards. 'Set your house in order' in all ways sanitary and hygienic, according to the conditions of the place, and all will be well." It is not often a lady conducts an important law suit in court, but Mrs. Weldon, who did so in London the other day, was very successful. She brought an action for damages against a Mr. Temple, a medical man who had signed a certificate for her seclusion as "a person of un sound mind and a fit subject for care and treatment," under which the attempt was made to take her to a lunatic asylum, was concluded on the 28th inst. A verdict in favor of Mrs. Weldon for £1,000 was rendered. The trial took place before Justice Hawkins, of the Court of Queen's Bench, and a common jury. The defendant was represented by able counsel, but Mrs. Weldon conducted her own case. The trial attracted much attention, and the court was thronged with people during its progress. Julius Halwage, a despondent German, committed suicide in New York Friday, after making elaborate preparations. Placing a looking glass on a table he fixed in front of it a gun, loaded and cocked the trigger, to which he attached a string. Seating himself in a chair in front of the table he placed the muzzle of the gun against his breast and with each hand placed against his temple a loaded revolver. The string from the gun was fastened to the back of the chair and the plan evidently was to discharge all three weapons at the same time. The gun was not discharged, but the revolvers were, and the suicide was found dead in the chair. 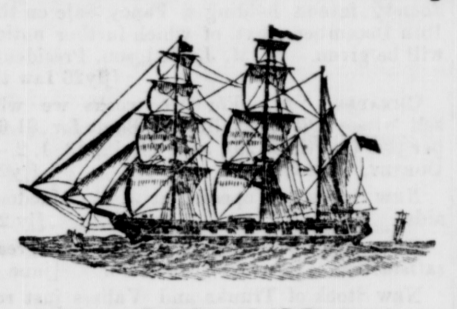

To the Electors of Queen's County.

GENTLEMEN,—Mr. Brecken's acceptance of the office of Postmaster vacates his seat as representative of Queen's County. I take the earliest opportunity of offering myself as a candidate in the interest of the Liberal Conservative Party for your suffrages. I must preface the brief address which, only on this occasion I deem it requisite to trouble you with by a few remarks on a subject that has been a good deal discussed since the election has been talked of. Certain parties have urged the necessity of calling a Convention, and assumed that I am opposed to such a step. This is not correct. I shall be ever ready to accept the decision of a Convention when the voice of the County demands one; but I wish it to be understood that while I am willing, unhesitatingly, to defer to the voice of the electors, I distinctly decline to submit to the dictation of a self-appointed clique of wire-pullers, who imagine that they are the Liberal Conservative Party. The unanimous and hearty endorsement which my nomination received to-day at the large representative meeting of gentlemen from all parts of the County, including the delegates to the convention held at the last Election, is, I think, sufficient to justify the course I have pursued. Having been so lately before you, my views on political subjects are known to you; suffice it to say, no change has taken place in my opinions since that time. The subject of reciprocity has, however, become prominent of late, and as it is a question of the deepest interest to our people, I cannot pass it over in silence. There are serious difficulties in the way of our obtaining this very desirable change in our trade regulations; we have to deal with a shrewd and clear-headed people, who are renowned for the astuteness for which they look after their own interests. When we had free trade they laughed at the delegation we sent to them with the view of obtaining a renewal of the treaty. "We have already made it," they said, "and where will be the advantage to us of opening our ports to you?" This was, in effect, the reply to the delegation. Under the National Policy they are deprived of our trade, and begin to find that it was of some value to them, and now there is a feeling arising in the States for more unrestricted trade with the countries of North and South America. If indiscreet and babbling politicians would only have the wisdom to act upon the excellent adage, "Silence is golden," we should be more likely to succeed in securing an advantageous treaty. The present Government fully appreciate the benefits which would accrue from a free interchange of natural products of the two countries, and will make every effort to bring about this desirable object, but the attempt must be made wisely and judiciously; rapidly proclaiming to all the world that reciprocity is a vital necessity to us; and that we cannot do without it, is not only untrue, but is likely to defeat our aim. You may rest assured that my best endeavors will be used to aid in bringing about this beneficial change, as I am fully aware of the special benefits it will bring to this Province. That the policy of Sir John Macdonald's Government in opening up and settling the great territory of the North West, by means of the Canada Pacific Railway, is wise and statesmanlike, has been proved by its success, and the converting of an unknown wilderness into a fertile, food-producing country, shows far-sighted administrative ability, and demands the gratitude not only of Canada but of the world. While heartily endorsing the policy of the Government in the North West, I consider our little Province has been somewhat overlooked. For this the Government is not wholly to blame; all governments are prone to defer action in any matter that is not persistently urged upon them. I think our people have been backward in asserting their claims, and I trust in future to find them making energetic and untiring efforts to secure their rights. Should I have the honor of being elected to represent this intelligent and independent constituency, of which there is little doubt, my most earnest endeavors will be used to obtain for Prince Edward Island a full recognition of her just claims under Confederation.
