A CORRESPONDENT writes: If a private citizen were responsible for the temporary platforms laid on Kent Street, in front of the new city building, the City Surveyor would have compelled him to put it in a safe condition ere this, but as it is city property and under the control of the Surveyor alone, he will probably attend to it just when it suits himself. OUR new Fish Market was fairly opened for business this morning. Quite a lot of fish was exposed for sale, and many persons were to be seen resorting thither for the purpose of procuring a supply. The city authorities should at once lay down a plank roadway to the Market, so that the public may get there without having to walk round and over large heaps of stone and rubbish, as was the case this morning. THE Charlottetown Rifle Club held its third spoon competition with Snider Rifles at Kensington Range yesterday afternoon. The match was well contested, and resulted in a tie between Lieut. John A. Longworth and Mr. H. Anderson, with 57 points each; and in firing off for first place Lieut. Longworth made the highest score, and became the winner of the silver spoon. Ranges: 400 and 600 yds., seven shots at each. THE steamer Carroll, Captain Brown, sailed for Boston at six o'clock last evening. An important case of poaching in the Moresick River, involving an assault on Warden Patrick McCullough, is being heard as we go to press. From appearances it looks as though it will go hard with the offender if the charge is proven, as the Inspector appears bound to protect his Wardens. THE Douteys had another good house last night. The story of Mr. Dourney's life, as told by himself, is a sad one, and full of terrible warnings. His denunciation of the liquor traffic and those engaged in it is very forcible. His stock of anecdotes is apparently inexhaustible, and his method of telling and illustrating them clever as well as comical. His meetings will be continued every evening until Tuesday next, and on that evening his benefit concert will take place. Those who can enjoy a good hearty laugh, as well as stand some wholesome counsel, should attend his meetings. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) News About Stanley. LONDON, July 21. A despatch from St. Thomas, West Africa, says: "The West African Company has received a report that Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, has been shot dead by natives with whom his expedition had been fighting in order to obtain supplies." Another account says that the steamer on which Stanley was proceeding to the relief of Emin Bey, was sunk and that the explorer was drowned. The report of Mr. Stanley's death emanated from a missionary at Matadi, who received it from the natives up country. No direct message has been received from the Expedition. Sir Henry Thurston Holland, Secretary of State for the Colonies, stated in the Commons this afternoon that the Government had no information about the reported death of Stanley. The rumor regarding his death is utterly discredited here. King Leopold, of Belgium, of the Congo Free State, telegraphs that Stanley, with his expedition, left Aruwimi for Wadelai July 3rd. No illness at all, so far as His Majesty knew. News from Wimbledon. LONDON, July 21. The Kolapore Cup was won yesterday (Wednesday) by the Englishmen, with 710 points, the Canadians being second, with 663, and taking a prize of eighty pounds. The rifle contest for the Elcho Challenge Shield at Wimbledon, took place to-day. The English team won it by a score of 1,570. The Scotch team made 1,553, and the Irish team 1,556. Struck by Lightning. STREATOR, Ill., July 21. A powder house owned by the C. W. & W. Coal Co., was struck by lightning this morning, causing a terrible explosion, killing one man and severely wounding several. The number of minor casualties reaches 100, all dwelling houses near being made completely inhabitable. Activity at Metz. BERLIN, July 21. Much military activity is reported at Metz. The enlarging efforts and evolutions of troops are proceeding constantly. The work is conducted at night by the aid of electric light. The balloon department is expecting to see the destructive effect of dynamite hurled upon forts from a balloon. Acquitted. MONCTON, July 21. In the Thomas purjury case, concluded at Dorchester to-day, the defendant was acquitted—the Attorney-General consenting to a verdict of acquittal. The case awakened a good deal of interest. A Bloody Fight. CAIRO, July 21. A report has been received that a tribe friendly to Egypt attacked the Madhi's forces under Osman Digma near Kassallas. Two thousand men were killed. The Thistle Sails. GLASGOW, July 21. The Thistle sailed for New York to-day. She takes a crew of forty men. Weather Bulletin. It appears that the circus bill posters, for a consideration, obtained liberty to post their bills on a barn adjacent to the road, and as the plaintiff and his wife were driving by their horse took fright. Both occupants were thrown from the wagon and the latter demolished. Charles Watson, the distinguished and beautiful reader, will give one of her unique entertainments at the Lyceum, on Monday, the 25th inst. We give a short sketch, taken from the New York Tribune, of Mrs. Watson:— Leila Morlet de Museau was born in the County of Surrey, in England. Her father, of good old French family, emigrated to England during political disturbances, and became one of the most respected merchants of the old school, in the city of London. His name was proverbial on 'Change for integrity; and his death was the subject of honorable mention and regret in the country of his adoption. Her mother was of noble Portuguese family. Strange, therefore, that the child of foreign parents should have become one of the purest speakers of the English language of our day, and successful interpreters of England's authors and poets. Mrs. Watson is married to Major T. Charles Watson, of the 56th Regiment. During a sojourn of four years in Quebec, Mrs. T. Charles Watson frequently used her talent for acting and reading to assist the charities of that city, and it was from the warm admiration of her friends, and their flattering opinion of her capabilities, that she ventured upon the life of a public reader. It was but too evident that in keeping so great a gift secluded from the world the eloquist was depriving the public of pleasure and delight. From her earliest childhood Mrs. Watson showed this love and aptitude for declamation, this great power of imitation and genius for acting. "When little over two years, a baby just able to speak, I remember," says Mrs. Watson, "receiving at one of my father's large business dinner parties, La Fontaine's Fables, in French. How vividly it remains in my memory. My father, holding me, a little child in white frock and blue sash upon the old fashioned polished mahogany table, where my small image was reflected among the fruit, flowers and wine, the attentive faces of all the gentlemen and the rounds of applause, which (vain little puns) I appreciated as much then as in a few years I have been thrilled by the sympathy and gratified by the appreciation of the audiences to whom I have read. "I remember my mother remonstrating with my father for encouraging me in this love of acting, but it has through all my life been what the French call plus fort que moi and I know no greater happiness than forgetting time, place and self in my word pictures."
