Begin Drafting Legislation As Progress Made At Highway Traffic Conference

OTTAWA, (CP)—The federal-provincial highway conference Tuesday began putting together draft legislation whereby the central government would give the provinces authority over road traffic crossing provincial borders. Informants from the private meetings emphasized that the legislation is tentative and will need approval of 11 governments, but they said there appeared general agreement among the delegates that the provinces can take over the jurisdiction now vested in the Ottawa government.
