

Mount Allison Expects Busiest Summer Session

SAKVILLE, N.B. The busiest summer in the history of Mount Allison University will get underway tomorrow, when almost 300 students are expected to crowd into the new Physics Building to register for the 34th Annual Maritime Summer School.

For those studying toward a university degree or improving their teaching license, there will be some 40 credit courses in 10 departments from which to choose. Many informal programmes will be provided for those who wish to pursue an interest without writing examinations or gaining credits.

Students will be studying under several distinguished teachers who will be supplementing the regular staff of 20 Mount Allison faculty members.

Among the visitors will be Dr. W. Menzies Whitlaw, retired professor of history at the American International College in Springfield, Mass., and author of "The Maritimes and Canada before Confederation," who will be giving a course in Canadian history from 1812 to the present.

Heading up the new Summer School of French, begun this year for the benefit of teachers of French and others interested in learning the language, will be the head of Mount Allison's French department, Prof. Allan MacBeth.

Assisting him in the best equipped French laboratory in Eastern Canada will be Dr. Hilliard Trethewey, chairman of the French department in Victoria College, University of Toronto.

MATHEMATICAL CONGRESS

More than 60 students are expected to attend the Canadian Mathematical Congress Summer School which will also be held at Mount Allison for the first time this year. It will be under the direction of Dr. W. S. H. Crawford, head of the department of mathematics and dean of sciences at Mount Allison. Assisting him will be Dr. K. D. C. Haley, head of the mathematics department at Acadia University, and Dr. L. F. S. Ritchey and Dr. W. L. G. Williams, both visiting professors from the Canadian Mathematical Congress headquarters in Montreal.

Besides six or eight credits earning university courses in mathematics, this summer school will be offering a number of four-week refresher courses for teachers of mathematics in primary and secondary schools.

The first of the informal programs to get underway will be the handicraft courses in leatherwork, metalwork, jewellery and weaving, which can be taken for any length of time between July 2 and Aug. 13. Instruction will again be given by the Rouleston brothers, Ellis and Max, who have established a solid reputation as outstanding teachers in this field.

Instruction in drawing and painting, with the emphasis on landscape and figure work, will again be offered at the Mount Allison Summer Art Workshop to be held August 3-12, under the direction of Prof. E. B. Pulford, of the Mount Allison Art Gallery. Assisting him as guest instructor will be the distinguished Montreal artist Louis Mapplebeck.

The biggest of the non-credit programs will begin next Monday when 150 high school boys and girls from all over the Atlantic Provinces and Maine will gather at Mount Allison for the sixth annual United Nations Summer School.

An impressive list of instructors and special guests at this popular and important school will include the Hon. Milton F. Gregg,

Canadian delegate to the International Labor Organization and former federal minister of labor; John G. Hadwen, first secretary of the Permanent Mission of Canada to the United Nations; Miss Aida Gindy, social welfare officer with the United Nations department of social and economic affairs in New York; Dr. Alex. Laflair, national secretary of the Co-operative Union of Canada; Vladimir Peoutine, counsellor of the U.S.S.R. Embassy in Ottawa; Heath Macquarrie, M.P., for Queens, P.E.I., and Robert Mc Cleave, M.P. for Halifax.

BAND MUSIC CAMP

Another program designed mainly for high school students is the instrumental music camp to be held July 11-19, and organized for the first time this year by Prof. Stanley Saunders, of the Mount Allison Conservatory.

So far 35 boys and girls have indicated that they will be in attendance to discover or rediscover the joy of playing together in an orchestra. They will also receive individual instruction in the instruments of their choice.

Prof. Saunders is looking forward to the establishment of a permanent Maritime youth orchestra of which these students may form the core.

The summer's activities will be brought to a flourishing close with the fifth annual Mount Allison Institute, Aug. 13-15.

Open to the public, this important event will focus on the theme "Canadian Politics" and will feature lectures and panel discussions by leading Canadian scholars, statesmen and journalists.

Trout Conservation Is Under Discussion

MONTAGUE—Dr. W. McDonald and Spurgeon Jenkins of Charlottetown and Reg. McDonald of Souris, were welcomed guests at the monthly meeting of the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association held at the parish hall in Cardigan last night.

During the business session it was decided to order 25,000 pine trees to be distributed to the school districts in the area; work is to be started immediately on Lewis Dam at Cardigan and a committee was appointed to inspect the Russel McAulay Dam.

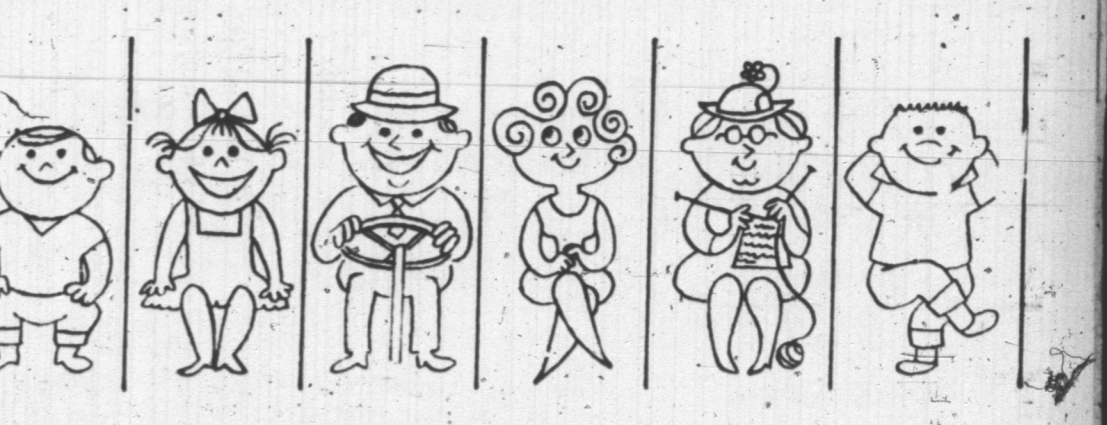
