WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(Special).—At the Conference this morning between representatives of the strikers and the mine owners President Roosevelt told the mine owners and President Mitchell's party that he was speaking on the behalf of the public and he did not want to hear their respective contentions.

URGED THEM TO SINK CLAIMS.

He earnestly urged them on grounds of public necessity sink their respective claims and endeavor to bring about without any unnecessary delay a resumption of work.

APPEALS TO PATRIOTISM.

He appealed to their patriotism to sink their personal considerations and make individual sacrifices for the public good.

PARTIES HOLD CONFERENCES.

Both parties left soon after he had finished speaking to hold conferences and will return this afternoon.

ENDING OF STRIKE EXPECTED.

Secretary R. O. says that the prospects are good for a termination and a settlement upon amicable terms.

MARCONI STARTS FOR CAPE BRETON

Workmen Engaged in Adding to the Towers

TRIALS IN MID OCEAN.

Persons Connected With this Station Confident of Success of the System.

GLACE BAY, Oct. 2.—Reports concerning the sending and receiving of wireless messages at Table Head, have caused considerable amusement to those who are a little behind the scenes. To begin with, workmen engaged in adding eight feet to the height of the tower will not complete the work before Saturday evening at the earliest. Meanwhile the wires are disconnected and there is no communication with the operating room. I have it on excellent authority that the station here is not equipped for receiving, but a large receiver with many improvements is expected shortly from England. Marconi leaves here to-morrow and will carry on experiments in mid-ocean, receiving messages from Table Head, and also communicating with the Poldhu station in Cornwall. Hence before he reaches Cape Breton the success or the failure for the time being of wireless telegraphy will be settled.

The persons connected with the station here seem at the present time unusually confident of the success of wireless telegraphy and there is little doubt that previous to the additions to the towers the messages have been sent from here. A number of electricians working at the towers were making great efforts yesterday to obtain stock.

FAILED TO LOWER THE RECORD

The World's Champion Trotter Cresceus Attempts

PACED BY TWO RUNNERS.

The Mile is Covered in 2.08—The Fastest Time Ever Made on the Track.

CINCINNATI, October 2.—Cresceus, George H. Ketchum's champion trotter, made an attempt to lower the world's record at the opening of the grand circuit meeting today, but failed on account of a bad track. He covered a mile in 2.08, which is the fastest time ever hung out on the Oakley track, where the races were held. The condition of the track prevented fast time, but the sport was very exciting and the betting good. The best contest of the day was the 2.10 trot, which was won by Charley Mac. In each one of the five heats the field crossed the wire in a close bunch, and the winner had nothing to spare. In his exhibition Cresceus was paced by two runners. He was driven by his owner. The first quarter was made by Cresceus in 32; the half in 1.04; the three quarters in 1.36; and the mile in 2.08 flat.

THREE GREAT NATIONS IN GRIP OF THE AMERICAN BEEF TRUST

In Short Time Trust will Announce Plans Which Mean Absolute Control of Meat Trade in United States, Canada and Britain.

CHICAGO, October 1.—The exposure of the reasons which have temporarily suspended the public consumption of the organization of the great beef trust are outlined here by unquestionable authority. "The postponement will not hurt the plans of the packers materially," said a representative of an interest very close to the packing industry. "It is within bounds to say that the very threats of the politicians, by whom the plans were held up, will result in even a bigger combination that was originally intended."

"It is true enough that the promoters of the new company were warned that if the trust went through as planned, the outcome might be a removal of the tariff on dressed meats. "By next winter the packers will be in position where they can afford to laugh at such threats, thereafter."

NAVIES QUARREL.

ELKHORN, Man., Oct. 1.—A dispute occurred between two Italian navvies at Kirkella, about seven o'clock last evening, when one of them drew a revolver and shot the other in the back of the neck, and the ball passing through. The injured man was brought to the hospital here, where the wound was dressed. His assailant has not yet been captured.

BIG ORDERS GIVEN FOR MORE COAL

BIG FIRE IN WHITECHAPEL.

A Large Contract Awarded to American Company for Generating Station.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—(Special).—A great fire this morning in the Whitechapel district threw many of the Jewish residents into confusion and has caused great damage to much property in that portion of the City.

Very large orders for Lancashire and North Wales coal continue to arrive from America and the prices have advanced one dollar during the past week.

Two and a half million contract has been given to an American company for the equipment of two generating stations in the Clyde Valley that will supply the electrical power over 755 square miles of country.
