## CANADA AND WEST INDIES.

### Tenders for Steamship Lines.

TENDERS will be received at the Finance De-  
partment, Ottawa, up to and including the 1st  
day of May next, from persons or companies, for  
the performance of the following steamship  
services, viz:—

1st. A line of mail steamers sailing from Halifax  
to Havana, thence to Kingston, thence to San-  
t Domingo de Cuba, thence to Canada; and (2nd)  
a line of mail steamers between Canada and Porto  
Rico and adjacent islands. Tenders to be made by  
each line fortnightly. Steamers to be of a size  
sufficient to carry 2,000 tons of cargo and to be  
able to steam twelve knots an hour, averaging  
not less than eleven knots an hour. The con-  
tract in either case to be for a period of five  
years. Tenders will be received for the above  
services either separately or together. Tenders to  
be marked on the outside "Tenders for Steam-  
ship Service to West Indies." The Government  
of Canada do not bind themselves to accept any  
tender.

## Declaration Day in Summerside.

(Summerside Journal.)

Tuesday last was Declaration Day, and  
though the roads were very bad, the occasion  
was marked by a large attendance of people  
from the country. As some of the ballot  
boxes from the eastern end of the county had  
not arrived at the hour for opening the court  
it was adjourned until four o'clock. The  
train arrived about three, and when the court  
re-opened, the court room was packed by an  
expectant and eager crowd. Quite a number  
of lawyers were present, and it was under-  
stood that there were serious legal difficulties  
to be solved before the Sheriff made a declara-  
tion of the candidates returned. Mr. W. A.  
O. Morson was Sheriff Strong's legal adviser,  
Mr. E. J. Hodgson appeared on behalf of Mr.  
Hackett, and Mr. F. Peters was retained by  
Mr. Perry.

The returns from the different polling divi-  
sions having been added up, it was found that  
the result was: Hackett, 2733; Lafargey,  
2600; Yeo, 3184; and Perry, 2988. As the  
Sheriff rose to make a declaration of the  
candidates returned, Mr. Hodgson arose  
and said that it was his duty to call  
attention to certain facts before the Sheriff  
acted on the above figures. He then proceed-  
ed, very clearly, ably and eloquently, to show  
that only legally qualified candidates could  
be returned, and that Mr. Perry was not a  
legally qualified candidate. He quoted from  
the Dominion statutes, proving his contention  
that Mr. Perry, as a member elect of the  
Provincial legislature, had no power to resign,  
that between the general election and the first  
meeting of the legislature his seat could only  
become vacant by death or acceptance of  
office. He produced a certified copy of the  
writ of June 5th last, and the return of the  
same, showing that Mr. Perry was a member-  
elect. There had since been no meeting of the  
House, and Mr. Perry was neither dead, nor  
had he accepted office, consequently he had  
no power to resign, and every vote for him  
was thrown away. He then referred to the  
position of Mr. Perry in 1874 and 1878, of  
Mr. Welsh in 1876, and Dr. Robertson in  
1882, all of which were similar to Mr. Perry's  
present position, and were decided  
against those gentlemen in every  
case, except that Mr. Welsh had  
been defeated at the polls. He contended  
that the Returning Officer's duty was clearly  
laid down in the Dominion Statutes and Elec-  
tion Laws, to return, in case a candidate had  
a majority of votes was disqualified, the  
next highest candidate, and he believed the  
Returning Officer would do his duty, regard-  
less of consequences, and return Mr. Hackett.  
Should he return Mr. Perry, a disqualified  
candidate, he would be liable to a penalty of  
\$500 and costs of suit.

Mr. Peters contended, first, that Mr. Perry  
had power to resign to two members of the  
Local House, and that he had done so; second,  
that, lest this course might be objected to, he  
had purchased a share in a government con-  
tract, thereby vacating his seat. He pro-  
duced, as evidence, Mr. Perry's resignation to  
Messrs. John Yeo and James Richard's, two  
members-elect, and the Lieutenant-Governor's  
notification of receipt of same; also an agree-  
ment between Mr. Perry and one Crossman,  
ferry-man at Grand River, by which, in con-  
sideration of \$75 paid to said Crossman, Mr. Perry  
secured a controlling interest in that ferry.  
This, Mr. Peters contended, voided Mr.  
Perry's seat, and left him free to contest the  
county in the Dominion election. He argued  
these points at great length, quoting from a  
number of authorities in support of his con-  
tention, and made out as strong a case for Mr.  
Perry as it was possible to do.

Mr. Hodgson replied at length to Mr.  
Peters. He read Mr. Davies' opinion as to  
the power of a member in Mr. Perry's position  
to resign, and easily disposed of the first point  
raised by Mr. Peters. Touching the second,  
he read certificates from Mr. DeBlois, Provincial  
Auditor, and Mr. J. W. Morrison, Secretary  
Public Works, both stating that Mr. Perry had  
no contract with the Government. He con-  
tended that the government contract meant  
such work as the construction of the  
public buildings, or wharves, &c., while the  
appointment of a ferryman was in the nature  
of a license between the Government and the  
individual, and that neither Crossman nor any  
other ferryman had any power to assign such  
license. There was no evidence that Mr.  
Perry had any government contract, or that  
the Government had accepted him as a ferry-  
man at Grand River. Crossman having abso-  
lutely no power to assign his license, Mr.  
Peters' second contention, he argued, fell to  
the ground.

The speeches of Messrs. Hodgson and  
Peters were acknowledged to be the ablest and  
most eloquent that have been heard here for a  
long time, and were both received with hearty  
applause.

After some consultation with his attorney,  
Sheriff Strong declared Mr. James Yeo elected  
as one of the representatives for Prince County,  
in the Dominion House of Commons, he hav-  
ing received the highest number of votes. He  
reserved his decision as to the second repre-  
sentative until next morning at 11 o'clock.

Court adjourned.

When the Sheriff's Court opened, as per  
adjournment, on Wednesday morning, the  
room was again filled. Sheriff Strong, the  
Returning Officer, delivered a lengthy de-  
cision, and concluded by declaring Mr. S. F.  
Perry elected as the second representa-  
tive for Prince County in the House of Com-  
mons, he having received the second highest  
number of votes. In closing his address, the  
Sheriff thanked the audience for their good  
order and attention, and also his legal adviser,  
with whom, he said, he differed in opinion on  
this important matter.

## Settling the Northwest.

ENTERPRISE OF A LONDON CAPITALIST—AR-  
RANGEMENTS WITH CANADA.

It is reported that Sir John Lister Kaye,  
a London capitalist and land owner in  
England, who purchased three years ago,  
20,000 acres of land in the Northwest from  
the government, and brought out skilled  
farmers from his estates in Yorkshire to  
manage it, and stocked it with the finest  
breeds of British horses, cattle, sheep and  
swine, as well as raised a large quantity of  
wheat and other grain, found the result so  
successful that he determined to extend his  
operations. After visiting the Northwest a  
year ago and being satisfied with the vast  
field that section offered for settlement,  
raising of stock, etc., he organized a com-  
pany of English and Scotch capitalists, of  
which he was appointed president, that has  
subscribed six millions and a half of dollars  
as capital to invest in the Northwest on a  
gigantic scale. He has just left here for  
London after a visit of two months to  
Canada, during which he has completed  
negotiations with the federal government  
and Canadian Pacific railway directors for  
twenty blocks of land of an area of 20,000  
acres each along the line of railway com-  
mencing at Rush Lake, 400 miles from  
Winnipeg, Man., and stretching to the  
base of the Rocky Mountains. Next spring  
he will return with ample help to commence  
operations, and in the meantime will ar-  
range for importing all kinds of live stock  
to begin farming. Immigration of English  
and Scotch farmers will be promoted, and  
homesteads with stock will be provided for  
them if required.

### Irish Eviction Schemes.

The people of Dingle, County Kerry,  
were made aware of the arrival there a few  
days ago of an eviction party by the blowing  
of horns and ringing of the chapel bell.  
A crowd of 2,000 persons quickly collected.  
Father Egan, acting on behalf of the ten-  
ants, had a long conference with the  
sheriffs, at the conclusion of which he an-  
nounced that a settlement had been ar-  
ranged, under which each tenant was to pay one  
year's rent, Father Egan himself paying the  
sheriff's costs.

While a force of 200 police-  
men was making a seizure on the Nolan  
Farrell estate, at Bally Hansis,  
County Mayo, they were attacked by 200  
men and women armed with sticks and  
stones. Several policemen were injured in  
the affray. Finally Rev. Mr. Warlow in-  
tervened and prevented further violence.  
Another disturbance occurred at New Ross.  
One hundred policemen went to the work  
house there and arrested refractory paupers,  
but at the sessions court charges of assault  
against the prisoners were withdrawn and  
they were allowed to return to the work  
house. A Nationalist band which cele-  
brated the result by parading through the  
streets came into collision with the police.  
In the fight that followed the musicians in-  
struments were broken and many of the  
men injured.

### Stanton and the President.

We quote the following anecdote from "Re-  
collections of Secretary Stanton," by a clerk  
of the War Department, in the March  
Century:—

"When Mr. Stanley, of North Carolina,  
was appointed Military Governor of his State,  
the Secretary of War caused to be filled out  
one of the blank forms used for notifying  
military nominees of their appointment to  
office by the President, and when he had  
signed it and caused the seal of the Depart-  
ment of War to be attached to it, he concluded  
that it would be well to have the sign-manual  
of the President affixed to the instrument.  
He sent the commission to the White House,  
with the request that the President would  
sign and return it immediately. Mr. Lincoln  
took the document and read it over carefully,  
and then began turning and twisting it about,  
as though in search of something. At last he  
handed it to the bearer and said, ironically:

"Did Mr. Stanton say where I was to put  
my signature?"

"No, sir," replied the astonished clerk.

"Can you tell me," asked the President,  
"whereabouts on this paper I am to put my  
signature?"

The clerk looked at the commission and saw  
the ample signature of Mr. Stanton immedi-  
ately at the foot of the body of the instru-  
ment, with the counter-signature of the Ad-  
jutant-General to the left. He saw also a neat,  
snug-looking white space beneath the sign-  
manual of the Secretary of War which Mr.  
Lincoln might have occupied to advantage had  
he seen fit, but the clerk was polite and re-  
plied:

"I don't see any place provided for your  
signature, Mr. President," and was proceeding  
to explain how the omission obviously came  
about when the President interrupted him  
and said in a dignified tone:

"Take the paper back to the Secretary of  
War, with my compliments, and say that  
the President will promptly sign any proper  
commission that may be sent to him for Governor  
Stanley or anybody else."
