Monday was another very warm, dry day throughout the Maritime and Eastern Quebec. Mid-afternoon temperatures reached 80 in several regions and the maximum of 81 degrees at Sydney was the highest ever recorded on May 29th. Sea breezes kept temperature near 60 at a few coastal spots.
