rocks and stained by fuel oil from the liner's ripped tanks, have been recovered. Observers on the beach estimated 30 were killed—10 from the overturned lifeboat and 20 among the swimmers.

Harbor craft and surf boats co-operated in the rescue.

Two Canadians were among the passengers who spent the night-mare hours aboard the Champollion. They are Mrs. Almee Boucher, wife of Dr. Romeo Boucher of St. Luc Hospital, Montreal, and Rev. Lucien Dulong of the Clercs of St. Viateur, Montreal.

They were taking part in a pilgrimage to the Holy Land as were most of those aboard the ship.

Raised Spirits With Prayer

Mrs. Boucher told how Father Dulong raised the spirits of the passengers with prayers. It is presumed the priest is safe although no definite word was available.

A Beirut motor launch made the final trip at 5 p.m. to the Champollion, which snapped in two behind her single screw after gales grounded her. She broke on sand and rock four miles south of this city at 2 a.m. Monday with 328 persons aboard.

The launch took off 40 persons including the liner's master, Capt. Henri Bourde, through waves that hammered across a rocky shoal and smashed white upon a beach less than a quarter mile away. The Royal Navy minesweeper, the Kenya, took the liner's crew and took four miles south of this city at 2 a.m. Monday with 328 persons aboard.

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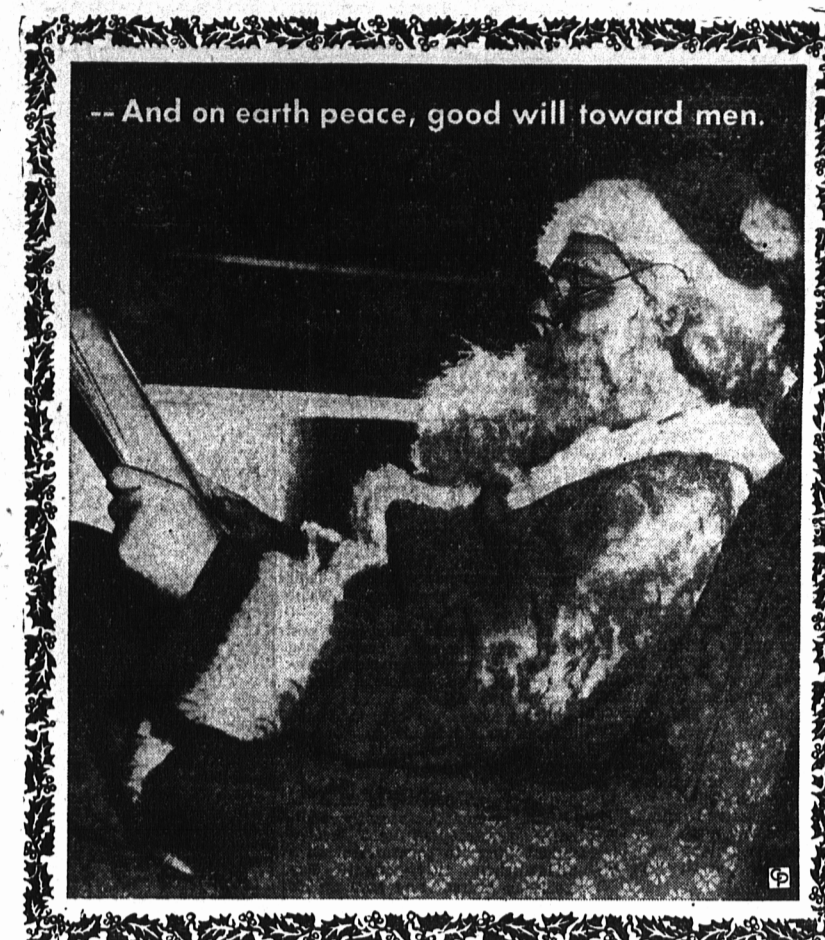
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Christmas Touch To Bank Windows

The Charlottetown banking institutions have not been remiss in joining the business firms as they dressed their windows and establishments in keeping with the holiday season.

The four large windows of the Canadian Bank of Commerce facing south each carry two huge red candles with top lighting effects that give a very natural appearance. At the base of each there is a village scene in miniature on a base of synthetic snow, freely interspersed with small spruce trees. The manager's office is also nicely decorated with a large and well arranged woods scene as the centre of attraction.

At the Bank of Nova Scotia a huge Christmas tree is placed at the left of the entrance, which is well illuminated and attractively decorated. At the rear centre the sentiment of the management is expressed in a decorated streamer reading "Season's Greetings". Each teller's location is fronted by a series of miniature spruce trees on a snow base which is higher and richer in color than the miniature spruce trees.

The Bank of Montreal has a nicely balanced and decorated tree at the right of the entrance. Here as elsewhere the dominating decoration is spruce and red effects which are carried throughout the banking room and definitely add to its bright and cheerful appearance.

The Provincial Bank of Canada is also fittingly decorated throughout, the main window and customers alcove being dominated by a large Christmas Tree suitably provided with lights and ornaments.

At the Royal Bank of Canada the entire wall area, except for the front entrance, has been decorated with a band of evergreen 12 inches wide with a centre of spaced coloured lights extending to the door. At the extreme end from the door an arch has been decorated with evergreen and lights still dominating and a snow effect at the base, which is unusually decorative. The public space towards the rear is taken up by a large Christmas tree containing a profusion of lights and other decorations in keeping with the season.

Expenditures on defence and defence production accounted for approximately half of the outlays. The expenditures totalled \$1,035,797,000 compared with \$705,092,000, an increase of \$330,705,000, or approximately 50 per cent.

However, the defence expenditures still are running below the monthly average of \$177,100,000 for which Parliament has made provision.

Payments to Provinces

Federal payments to the provinces under tax-rental agreements amounted to \$181,992,000 compared with \$72,087,000 in the first eight months of the last fiscal year. Nine provinces—all except Quebec—now have agreements with the Federal Government, compared with eight a year ago.

Expenditures on the publicly-owned CBC, largely as a result of the inauguration of television, totalled \$5,027,000 compared with \$2,344,000 a year ago.

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Sharp Red Attack Is Beaten Back

SEOUL, Dec. 24 — (Wednesday) — (AP) — Allied artillery firing in roaring barrages chopped up a Chinese Communist battalion attack on the western front in the pre-dawn hours today.

But before the Allied big guns routed an estimated 750 Reds, UN troops and Communists fought a bloody, hand-to-hand action in the frozen bunker and trench outposts of T-Bone Ridge.

"Reports from the division holding T-Bone Ridge said our artillery almost completely destroyed the first wave of Chinese," an Eighth Army staff officer said.

For days, Chinese loudspeakers along the front have blared propaganda messages to Allied troops saying the Communist would be in Seoul by Christmas.

But there has been no sign of the huge troop movements and hot attacks in battalion and regiment size which would be required to test out defences before such a major attack.

In the air war, the air force said, one Red Mig jet was shot down.

FLYING CALVES

MELBOURNE, Australia — (CP) — An airways freighter is soon to make the longest airlift of cattle ever recorded. It will carry 20 calves from Karachi to New Guinea, a distance of 6,000 miles.

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Sharp Request To Mount Allison

SACKVILLE, N.B., Dec. 23 — President W. T. Ross Flemington has announced that Mount Allison University has been left \$375,000 by the will of the late Herbert S. Sharp, of Summerside, P.E.I., a retired businessman and old student of Mount Allison Academy, Class of 1889. Mr. Sharp and his father before him were engaged in the oyster export trade at Malpeque Bay, P.E.I.

In his will Mr. Sharp says "having regard to the fine educational facilities and cultural advantages afforded by Mount Allison University and its splendid record of achievement in the field of education through the years; to the long tradition of Christian culture that has characterized it throughout its history, and desirous that this tradition should prove an inspiration to, and be perpetuated by young men and young women of character and promise I am moved by these considerations to make the following bequest."

Scholarship Fund

He then instructed that the money to be used to establish a scholarship fund to be known as the Hubert S. Sharp Scholarship Fund. The scholarships shall be \$500 each, tenable from one to four years, as may be determined by the regents of the university. These scholarships are open to students of the three Maritime Provinces in any of the courses in Arts, Science, Home Economics, Education, Fine Arts and Music.

"The elements I wish to be taken into consideration," said Mr. Sharp, "choosing each participant are those spiritual qualities that best express themselves in exemplary character, personality, a strong sense of obligation and high ideals of service, together with the ability to cope with the necessary academic demands, application to study and lack of sufficient funds to attend university without the aid of the scholarship."

The will provided for a committee of selection consisting of the president of the university, the deans of the Faculties of Arts and Science and the chairman and secretary of the P.E.I. Presbytery of the United Church of Canada.

President Flemington in expressing appreciation of this very generous provision for scholarships stated that about 25 scholarships per year would be provided from this fund and said it would be of great encouragement to the young people of the Maritime Provinces.

It will be recalled, Dr. Flemington added, that about four years ago Mr. Sharp gave the Mount Allison School of Fine Arts a very valuable Romney painting.

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No Irregularities In Trading Shares Of Empire Oils

MONTREAL, Dec. 23 — (CP) — The Curb Market announced today an investigation into trading in shares of Empire Oils and Minerals, Inc., has disclosed no irregularities or infractions or trading regulations.

The market launched its investigation Dec. 3 after the stock plunged \$2.50 to an all-time low of \$1.55 on turnover of 109,900 shares in a single session. Trading was suspended for a time but the suspension later was lifted. Jacques Forget, curb chairman, said today in a statement the market's inquiry "showed that there had been no organized short-selling of these shares or so-called 'bear raid' carried out."
