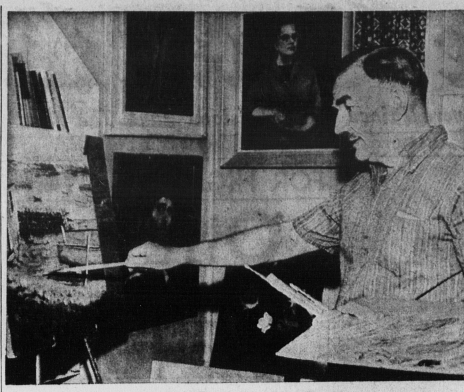
OLDEST CITIZENS

Following a demonstration by the Crapaud Majorettes at the sports center various sporting events were held on the grounds.

At the sports center from five until seven a band concert by the R.C.A. Band from Halifax was held along with a bean supper. The big day for Crapaud finished with a mammoth dance at the sports center.

The parade opened up at Egglewood High School and wound through the streets of the village and up to the arena. It was led by an RCMP patrol car and an RCMP motorcycle. During the parade from various vantage points film and sound recordings from the National Film Board were showing the various activities and events. Jehovah's Witnesses Hold Giant Convention In N.S.

The large number of New Glasgow citizens that attended the public Bible lecture presented by Jehovah's Witnesses at the stadium on Sunday afternoon made the audience one of the largest religious assemblies seen here for a long time.

Entitled "Peace Among Men of Good Will" or Armageddon - Which? The address was given by a spokesman to the four-day convention during which delegates from 27 congregations of Jehovah's Witnesses heard a message built around the theme: "Fruitfulness of the Spirit".

The speaker was Grant Sauter, secretary-treasurer of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, Brooklyn, New York.

Hundreds of witnesses have studied, worked and eaten together for four days. The stadium enjoyed an atmosphere rarely felt in a religious assembly; neither solemn nor sad, the happiness of the busy people demonstrated that religion is something that can be lived continually, not put on for just one day a week.

The theme of the assembly was taken from the 22nd verse of the fifth chapter of the book of Galatians where it states that a person blessed with God's spirit would display in his life: love, joy, peace, long-suffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness and self-control. Each quality was explained by talk and demonstrated to show the delegates how they can apply them in their homes, congregations and house-to-house ministry.

Mr. Sauter's address centered around the angelic message given to the shepherds long ago: "Peace on earth among men of good will." In all of Man's history," he said, "there have actually been very few years when the world has enjoyed total peace.

"Although national heads today are still dressing a thermo-nuclear Armageddon, they are overlooking the fact," he said, "that the battle message in chapter 16 of the last book of the Bible does not refer to an international conflict, but a war between good and evil."

Police, Judges Killing Demanded By Rioters

NEW YORK (AP)—A Puerto Rican detective said Monday he attended a secret Harlem meeting at the height of racial riots last week and heard calls for the slaying of police and judges.

Det. John Rivera told a state supreme court hearing on an injunction against demonstrators in Harlem, predominantly-Negro section of Manhattan, that the violence was urged by William Epton, head of the Harlem Defense Council.

He said Epton, a self-described Communist, told the meeting "the state must be smashed" and warned "we're going to have to kill cops and judges."

The quotes were recorded by Rivera as he infiltrated the meeting to gain information for police use in nipping violence before it began.

Portions of the tape recording were played back at the hearing.

Meanwhile, the police department began increasing its Negro force in Harlem in compliance with a promise made last week by Mayor Robert F. Wagner in an effort to halt bloody racial rioting.

REPLACE OFFICERS

Five Negro sergeants replaced five white members of the same rank in Harlem assignments. Similar moves were under consideration for the predominantly-Negro Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn.

Rioting and looting plagued both areas last week, causing one death, hundreds of injuries and arrests and property damage above \$1,000,000.

As the two Negro communities returned to normal Monday, the state supreme court continued in effect a ban

Two Week Mission Concludes

ALBERTON—A two-week mission in the Sacred Heart Parish, Alberton, concluded Sunday afternoon with sermon and benediction.

The first week of the mission was for women and girls, with the second for men and boys.

Redemptorist Father Michael MacIsaac and Edward Gillan conducted the exercises.

The program during the two weeks included two masses each morning followed by instruction in the evening. The sermon and benediction of the blessed sacrament with prayer and vespers marked the suffering of Christ.

This is referred to as the "old-fashioned" mission, embodying sermons on the great eternal truths, created an opportunity for spiritual stock-taking. Great emphasis placed on the sacrifice of the eucharist, the sacraments of penance and communion.

There was a full attendance of parishioners during both weeks.
