

Anniversary Items.

THURSDAY, Oct. 2.—Arago, the French physicist and astronomer, breathed his last on this day, in 1853. His researches in polarized light were published 1819. In magnetism and electricity, 1820-26, "Astronomic Populaire," 1834, and chemical action of light, 1833.

He was a member of the Provisional Government of France (May 1848), and refused to take the oath to Louis Napoleon, Dec. 1851.

Pleading for Divorce.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

The petition of the Grand Duke of Hesse for a divorce from Mme. Kalomine, will be heard by seven judges of the Supreme Court at Darmstadt on October 18th. Mme. Kalomine will oppose the petition. Truth says that Queen Victoria desires the divorce be granted, so as to enable the Grand Duke to marry the Duchess of Albany.

The Cholera.

ROME, Oct. 1.

Reports of the cholera in Italy for the past twenty-four hours show a total of 433 cases and 197 deaths, against 421 cases and 229 deaths for the preceding twenty-four hours. The total reported to-day include 136 cases and 57 deaths in Naples, and 52 cases and 30 deaths in Geneva.

Railway Collision.

DENVER, COL., Oct. 1.

The out going Leadville express train on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, collided with the incoming Salt Lake train last night, near Aiqua. About thirty passengers were injured, but none fatally.

Activity at Woolwich.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

The authorities at Woolwich are displaying much activity in forwarding war material to Hong Kong. Six hundred tons shot, shell and ordnance were shipped thence to-day.

Hard Up.

DUBLIN, Oct. 1.

At a meeting of the Irish National League held here yesterday, it transpired that the League was hard up, and that subscriptions from America had ceased.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.

Hamilton F. Busby stated this morning that the "Wind S" would attempt to beat the record on the 15th inst.

The Nile Rising.

CAIRO, Oct. 1.

The Nile is rising, which will be of advantage to the expedition to Khartoum.

LONDON, Oct. 1.

Cable connections between China and England are interrupted.
