

Cherry Valley W.I. Annual Meeting

It was moved by Mrs. Sterling Ings, seconded by Mrs. John MacIsaac, that a vote of thanks be extended to the retiring officers. Collection amounted to \$172. Mrs. Monty MacLeod invited the members to her home for the December meeting, roll call to be answered by an exchange of Christmas gifts.

The meeting closed with "The Queen", and a delicious lunch was served by the hostess.

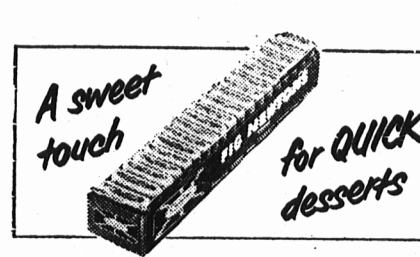

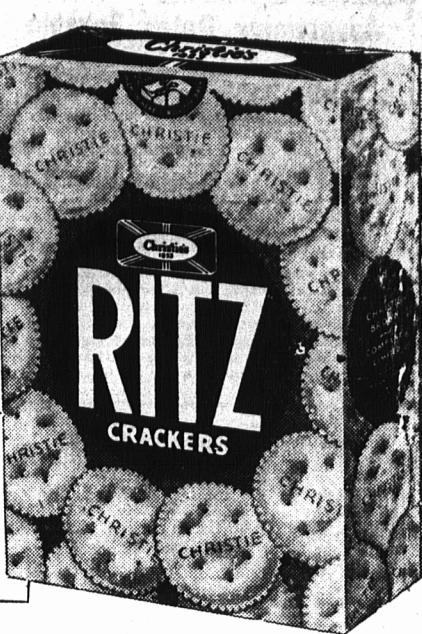
How long this lasted, Marchant could not have said; nor did he ever know exactly when the suspicion awoke in his mind that he
