

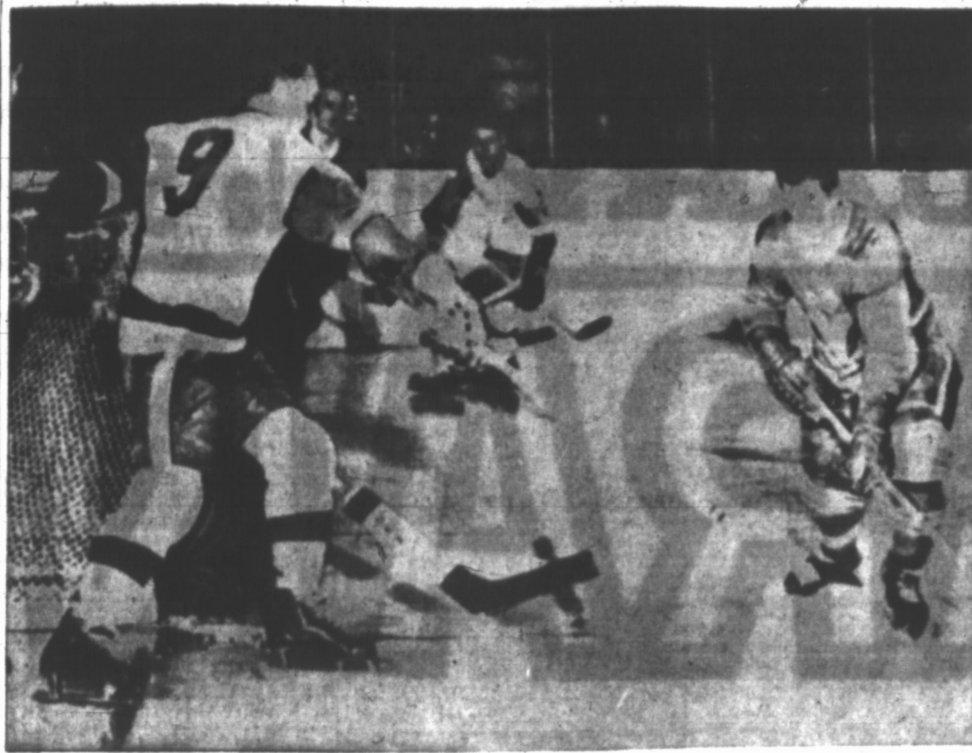

Crothers Equals Record In Run Saturday Night

BOSTON (CP-AP) — Bill Crothers, Canada's male Athlete of the Year, equalled the meet record of 1:10 flat Saturday night in winning the 600-yard run of the Boston Knights of Columbus Games. Crothers, 300 metres silver medalist in the 1964 Olympics, led Olan Cassell of Nutley, N.J., by about five yards. Lieut. Francis Tomco of Quantico Marines placed third. Crothers had won the 1,000-yard run three years in a row in this meet. Ray Tucker, 17, of Hamilton, Ont., the latest Canadian schoolboy sensation, came from behind on the final straight-away and won the 1,000-yard event in 2:12. Tucker, who holds the Canadian high school outdoor record of 2:12.9 in the 1,000 yards, and the Canadian high school outdoor record of 1:51.7 for the 800, beat John Dunkleberg of North Carolina Track Club by about two yards. Dave Ellis of Toronto took the lead with four laps to go and held off a closing rush by Vic Zwolak of Wilmington, Del., in winning the two-mile run in 8:52.2. Mike Wiggs of England was third behind Ellis, a former Englishman, in 8:53.7. Jim Irons of Toronto placed third in the one-mile event, won by Joe Lynch of Georgetown in 4:06. Irons' time was 4:10.1. NEW GLASGOW (CP) — League-leading New Glasgow Rangers pulled more ahead of the pack in the Maritime Senior Hockey League Saturday night, dropping Halifax Schooners 5-2 before a hometown crowd of 1,000 fans. Playing-coach Fleming Mackell blasted two goals past Halifax goalie Don Mason, whose work appeared to be the best defence the Schooners could put up. Reg Asselin, Ralph Cameron and Mackell gave Rangers a 3-0 lead after the first 20 minutes which Jim O'Brien cut to 3-1 before the start of the third period. HENRY SCORES HAT TRICK

Rangers Trip Red Wings; Leafs Topple Boston 3-1

DETROIT (AP) — Camille Henry scored three goals Sunday night, one in each period on penalty-produced plays, a New York Rangers whipped Detroit Red Wings 4-2 in a National Hockey League game. The Red Wings scored the opener on a steer-in by Floyd Smith at 2:16 of the first period, but Henry evened it with his 16th goal of the season at 9:55 and then put the Rangers ahead for keeps at 6:54 of the second period. Henry scored his first goal five seconds after a penalty to Alex Delvecchio elapsed with the Rangers still in power-play formation. Wing goalie Roger Crozier made two big saves earlier, but then Henry was all alone at the corner and banged in Phil Goyette's pass. Henry fired his 17th goal on another Goyette setup with Gary Bergman in the penalty box. Goyette sped around defenceman Al Langlois and passed out to Henry who was alone in front. Donnie Marshall made it 3-1 at 10:05 with his 19th goal, beating Crozier on his glove side from 40 feet after the Wings lost the puck at the Ranger blue line and were slow getting back. Paul Henderson got it back 40 seconds later for Detroit. But Henry wrapped up the Rangers second straight victory at 4:52 of the final period with Bill Gadsby in the box. Again it was Goyette on the setup and again Henry was uncovered as he snapped in his 18th goal. The victory, only the second against Detroit in eight games, moved the fifth-place Rangers within six points of the Wings. Marcel Paille was a last-minute substitution in goal for the Rangers. Horton, playing up front because injuries have thinned Toronto's roster, got the Leafs off to a flying start with two goals in the first period. He has six goals since leaving the blue line corps two weeks ago. Dave Keon pushed Toronto ahead 3-0 in the second period on a lead power play and rearguard Ted Green connected for Boston in the finale, ruining Johnny Bower's shutout bid at 8:19. The victory enabled the streaking Leafs to stay within reach of the NHL pace-setters, Chicago and Montreal. Toronto has lost only one of its last nine games, a 4-2 setback suffered against Detroit Saturday night. Horton's first goal was tainted. Bruins goalie Ed Johnston actually stopped the shot, but his celebrating attempt carried in on Green and Horton was credited with the tally. ROCHFORD SCORES WINNER

Provost Scores Two As Habs Edge Hawks

CHICAGO (AP) — Montreal Canadiens exploded for three goals in the final 10 minutes of play to defeat Chicago Black Hawks 4-2 here Sunday night in a national Hockey League game. The victory pulled the Canadiens into first place in the NHL. They had been tied with Chicago, which lost its second home game in two nights. Chicago took a 2-1 lead at 3:29 of the final period on a goal by Eric Nesterenko but Claude Larose scored for Canadiens while Chicago's Chico Maki was serving a penalty at 11:51. Leon Rochefort, who had been called up from Quebec of the American League, won the game with his first NHL goal of the year after Jim Roberts had stolen the puck from a Hawk in Chicago ice. Canadiens' final goal came with 10 seconds to go and was scored by Claude Provost into an empty net, the Hawks having pulled goalie Denis DeJordy in favor of a sixth skater.
