days you have to go out and look for Prince Charming. He will never know you are even alive if you sit at home.

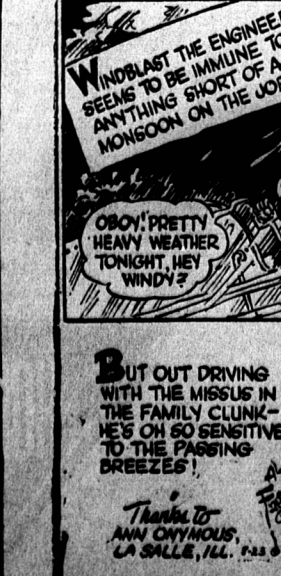

Shirley let her lids droop over her long eyes. She opened them slowly to look up at him. "I see, she said.

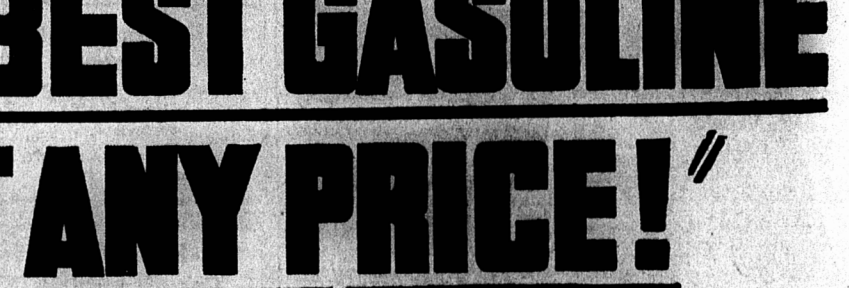
