In your opening sentence you say, "Taking the story at face value, assuming for the sake of discussion," etc., hence I wonder: Do you by any chance doubt that this sort of things goes on amongst otherwise law abiding respectable people?

If so, you should visit Florida Arizona or any other of the sunshine havens for the elderly.

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### CANADIAN NATIONAL EXHIBITION SCHOLARSHIP

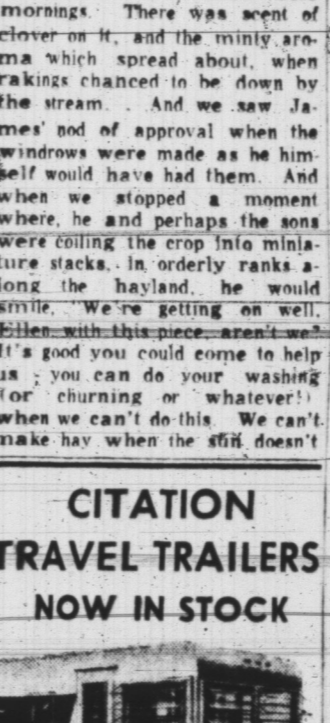
