

# PM Plans To Go It Alone At Commonwealth Talks

OTTAWA (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker has indicated he intends to "go it alone" with the backing of his minority government when he attends September's Commonwealth prime ministers' conference.

He described as without foundation two reports predicting he would take a Social Credit member into his cabinet and summon Parliament in August to get a vote of confidence before the London conference, called to discuss Britain's bid to join the European Common Market.

Parliament will be summoned in September as planned, he said. There had never been any suggestion of seeking a coalition with the Social Credit party which won 26 surprise victories in Quebec province and four in Western Canada in the June 18 general election.

It is expected Parliament will be called together late in September—Thursday, Sept. 27 has been mentioned—soon after the prime minister's return from London. The conference opens Sept. 18 and is expected to last a week or 10 days.

**NO FOUNDATION**  
Mr. Diefenbaker, speaking to reporters outside his office before he flew to Cardston, Alta., to deliver tonight his first major public speech since the election, said there is no foundation for speculating on a Social Credit-Conservative coalition.

Real Casault, deputy leader of the Social Credit party, earlier dismissed suggestions of a coalition. In Rouyn, Que., Mr. Casault summed up his attitude to the coming session as "no operative, yes, coalition, never."

Because the Conservatives alone, now with 116 members, lack an over-all majority in the Commons, Mr. Diefenbaker and his cabinet need the support of any one of the three other groups in the Commons to win any House votes. The Liberals have 99 members and the NDP 19.

One additional member is to be elected—in Stormont's deferred voting July 16. Mr. Diefenbaker has said nothing recently about the forthcoming prime ministers' conference. He said during the election campaign he is satisfied with Prime Minister Macmillan's repeated assurances that Britain will seek by every means possible to preserve Commonwealth interests in British markets.

Until final terms of Britain's E.C.M. entry are known, the Canadian government is unlikely now to take a strong stand. The

minority government will have confidence in the support of at least one of the opposition parties whatever view it does express at the Commonwealth talks sources say.

# Coyne Ruckus Is Recalled In Testimony To Commission

OTTAWA (CP)—When should the finance minister instruct the governor of the Bank of Canada what to do?

Only when the minister knows that the governor won't do it and will resign instead, J. T. Bryden of Toronto replied, in effect, to the royal commission on banking and finance here.

Backgrounding this suggested route to resignation is the government's inability by law to fire a governor—only Parliament can do that—along with the oft-stated principle that in any dispute with the governor, the government's will must eventually prevail.

Mr. Bryden, a former Bank of Canada director, is vice-president and general manager of North American Life Assurance Company and was chief spokesman Tuesday for the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association, appearing before the commission for the second day.

**NAMES NO ONE**  
His theoretical, non-named statements came exactly a year from the day when James E. Coyne first appeared before a Senate committee on July 15, 1961, in a bid to vindicate himself in the face of a proposed government bill in Parliament to fire him.

Less than an hour after the Liberal-dominated Senate killed the Conservative government's bill, Mr. Coyne resigned. But for more than three months he was in a running battle with Finance Minister Fleming and the government over monetary policy.

This is what several organizations in briefs to the royal commission have referred to as "the unhappy events of 1961."

Mr. Coyne seldom is mentioned by name. He wasn't named in Tuesday's discussion, either.

Mr. Bryden, who last year cited ill health in resigning from the central bank board of directors a few months before Mr. Coyne, said Tuesday the insurance officers association feels that the government must take ultimate responsibility for monetary policy.

But he stressed the word "ultimate."

Should state views such policy always should be

initiated and implemented by the central bank, with wide latitude, he said. But if the government disagreed with bank policy it should state its views in a directive to the bank.

If the governor feels that the government's directive is inconsistent with the bank's statutory objectives in regulating credit and currency, Mr. Bryden added, the governor "should feel called upon to resign"—leaving off public debate of the issue.
