## Winnipeg Streak is Halted As Rangers Whip Montreal

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Rangers, rallying after a shocking first-period brawl, ended a string of nine games without a victory with a 4-2 National Hockey League triumph over Montreal Canadiens Sunday night.

Ralph Backstrom put the Canadiens ahead 1-0 in the first period but moments later a six-man brawl broke out involving three players from each team — Terry Harper, Gil Tremblay and Jean-Guy Talbot of Montreal and Jim Neilson, Haddix and Larry Chan of New York. Jean Beaulieu added the final goal for the Canadiens with five seconds to play in the third period. It was his 11th of the season.

Jacques Plante, in his second game after additional rest for his ailing left shoulder, came back with seven saves. Charlie Hodge, the Montreal goalie, made 22.

## Windsor Leafs Bomb Hapless Halifax Tartans

WINDSOR, N.S. (CP) — Halifax Tartans took another beating Saturday, this time at the hands of Windsor Maple Leafs to the tune of 15-2 as Windsor's Jacques Allard continued to set a fast scoring pace in the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League. Allard scored four times Saturday, three in the first period and one in the second.

# Royals Slip Monro to Hawks 5-4 in Contest At Forum

Sandy's Parkdale Royals proved Saturday night that the brand of hockey played on the Island is at least equal to the hockey played in the Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League when they defeated the visiting Monro Hawks 5-4 in an exhibition match held at the Charlottetown Forum.

The Royals although outplayed during the later stages of the game were never headed as they picked up their goals early in the game and then held on to a late Monro drive.

The play in the first period was fairly even but the Royals controlled the play quite a lot during the first ten minutes and had the edge in the second and third periods.

Angie Carroll picked up the Royals' first marker at the 4:50 mark on a neat play. Buck Whitlock passed the puck to defenceman Ernest Reeves at the point and Reeves let up with a blazing slap-shot that Carroll deflected into the net.

Three minutes later Carroll and winger Jim MacLeod broke in over the Hawks line and the puck went to Carroll who deked out the defenceman and passed the water to MacLeod who ripped it into the net from left-hand corner of the net from about ten feet out. During the course of the period the Hawks have some very good chances but those opposing goalies Donnie Prizzell and Laurin were equal to the occasion.

The second period produced the best play of the evening as the Hawks dominated the contest for the best part of the period. The Hawks continually stormed over the Royals blue line only to be stopped by the brilliant goal-tending of Prizzell.

Oscar Gaudet, one of the best players in the Nova Scotia League and veteran Shermie White, was stopped five times by Prizzell on what looked like sure goals. One of his shots hit the post but Prizzell made sprawling saves on the other four, once when Gaudet was in the air, once when he was on a breakaway.

On another occasion, McGonigal with only one second remaining in the period to take the high flying Hawks to within one goal of the leading Royals' shot rebound to put the winners two goals ahead.

Sian Kelly of Gerry Katz combined a few minutes later with Pearson catching the up-per leg shot of the Hawks and Oscar Gaudet who had been frustrated all night lifted the puck over the leading Prizzell to put the Hawks back into the game.
