Congratulations are in order today to the A.J. McAdam-coached Saint Dunstan's University hockeyists who walked off with the Island Intermediate A Hockey Championship on Monday night at the Charlottetown Forum when they sent the Summerside Crystals down to a 10-4 defeat before the largest crowd to witness an intermediate clash this season, and take the best of three series in two straight games over their Western opponents.

Winning the opening game by a 6-4 margin, which although started at Summerside last Saturday night, had to be completed here Monday before the second game got underway, the Saints pressed the issue in the remaining nine minutes and fifty seconds of play of the third period of the first game to keep a 6-4 lead intact, and except for some outstanding work by Bill Sprague in the Summerside cage, might have improved further on their count. The reason for the carryover of play in the first game was due to a section of the promenade collapsing at Crystal Rink midway in the third period which prevented the game from being continued at the time.

Although the score would indicate that the second game was a lopsided contest, it was anything but that for two periods, when the Crystals came through with a heads-up performance to battle the Saints to a 2-2 draw at the end of the first session, and 4-4 at the end of the second in one of the closest and fastest contests we have witnessed in intermediate play this year.

\$150 For Each Player At Stake In Game Tonight

TORONTO, March 21 — (CP) — A stake of \$150 for each player rides on tomorrow night's National Hockey League battle here between Montreal Canadiens and Toronto Maple Leafs.

That's the difference between the \$500 the League pays to each player on the team finishing second in the standings and the \$350 that goes to members of the third-place club.

Right now the two clubs are even in points, with 72 apiece. The Leafs have a 30 to 27 edge in victories, which count as the deciding factor in the event of a tie on points when the 70-game schedule winds up this week-end.

So the team which wins tomorrow night's game will be in a commanding position for the stretch run. The Leafs play the fifth-place Boston Bruins here Saturday night and the fourth-place New York Rangers at New York Sunday. The Canadiens are at home Saturday to the last-place Chicago Black Hawks and tangle Sunday night with the Bruins at Boston.

Detroit Red Wings have already copped the major share of the cash for the scheduled season run. They got \$1,000 apiece for finishing first. New York's fourth place is worth \$150 to each of the Rangers.

Aside from the second place money angle, there may be another thought in the minds of both teams. The club which winds up third goes against the tough Red Wings in the Stanley Cup semi-final and the second place team tackles the Rangers. A fellow can be excused for thinking that it would be preferable to meet the Rangers—although that reasoning may be a fallacy. The Rangers can play it mighty tough too.

That's what the man said Monday night at Odessa, Tex. and the public has been wondering about for many months.

Will Louis try to regain the world's heavyweight boxing crown from Ezzard Charles?

Paunchy Joe, who still can punch at 227 pounds, has been touring and collecting folding green for his exhibitions almost since June 25, 1948, when he announced his retirement with "tonight was my last fight."

That was immediately after he knocked out Jersey Joe Walcott. Since then his comeback has been on the verbal merry-go-round of now-he-said-it-and-now-he-didn't for almost two years.

Louis knocked out Jersey Joe Walcott June 25, 1948, at Yankee Stadium, and retired as the undefeated heavyweight champion with these words:

"Tonight was my last fight." He meant actual fights, not exhibitions.
