

Mary Lea Tops At Rifle Shoot

One of Canada's leading female rifle shots, Mary MacLennan Lea of Murray Harbour, is the first Island marksman to register a perfect 100 score with all ten shots within the "X" ring at this week's shoot conducted by the Murray Harbour Indoor Rifle Club, April 19.

With this being the second last shoot of the 1961-62 indoor season, competition among the local sharpshooters is at a fever pitch, with the top scorers running things right down to the wire in the race for the Burns Trophy donated to the club by Byron Burns, Charlottetown jeweller.

Up this year for the first time, the coveted trophy will go to the marksman who attains the highest average over the season. Due to her years of experience and her continual high calibre of shooting Mary Lea has declared herself ineligible for the trophy.

Six shooters are closest to the top and it will have to go down to next week's shoot before any one of them is a safe

declared the winner of the Trophy. They are: Jim Gordon; William J. Harris; Bruce Gormley; Fred C. White; Randall Richards; and John Gossie. At the present time the odds appear to be in favor of Jim Gordon.

A newcomer to the shooting game, who is making all the club members look to their laurels, is Gary Gormley son of Bruce Gormley, who on his second time out registered a creditable 88.

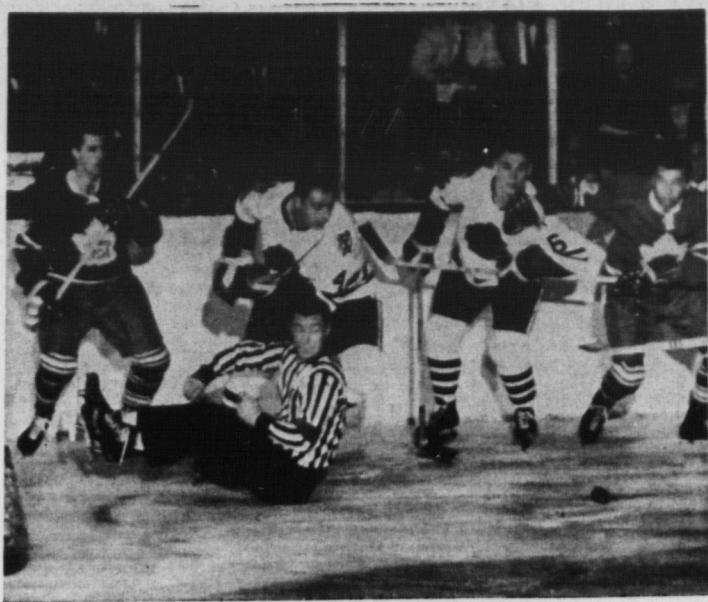

Ortiz Batters Champion And Grabs World Crown

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Old age and Carlos Ortiz caught up with lightweight champion Joe Brown Saturday as the New Yorker wrestled the world crown from the 35-year-old veteran of 115 ring engagements. Ortiz won a unanimous 15-round decision.

The new champion and Brown from Houston, Tex., each weighed 134 1/2.

A crowd of more than 7,000 in Las Vegas Convention Centre and a television audience saw the 25-year-old bull from New York completely outclass Brown.

At the end of the 15th, Brown

was dripping blood from the corner of his left eye. As he stood hopelessly beaten, the brash New Yorker was jumping for glee in his corner. Ortiz knew he had the title sewed up.

Most ringfighters gave Brown only one round, the fourth. Ortiz did just what he had promised before the fight. He stayed on top of Brown all the way, seldom letting the hard-hitting champion get set to throw a lethal punch with either hand.

OPENS CUT
Ortiz, scoring consistently

with a left jab, slit open Brown's eye in the first round. It bled throughout the evening.

There were no knockdowns.

Referee Frankie Van of Los Angeles scored it 74-50, judge Dave Zenoff of Las Vegas had it 74-66, and judge Bud Traynor of Reno called it 74-58, all for Ortiz.

This was the 41st bout for Ortiz, a native of Puerto Rico and a longtime resident of New York.

And this was the unprecedented 12th title defence for old Joe—and for the first time, he failed.

Columbia Getting Ready For Its Summer Campaign

NEW YORK (AP)—The sleek 12-metre yacht Columbia glides into the water next weekend and thus begins the long summer campaign aimed at successfully defending the America's Cup.

These other boats—Weatherly, Easterner and an unnamed mystery entry being built in Boston—shortly will follow Columbia down the ways and join in battling for the right to meet Australia's Gretel in the 111-year-old international sea-racing spectacle off Newport, R.I., in September.

"We're delighted with Columbia," said the new owner, Paul Shields, New York investment broker. "We have done everything in our power to put her in the finest racing shape.

"We have reshaped her keel, we have resurfaced her bottom. We have a new 90-foot aluminum mast. We have made some minor changes on the deck and bought acres of new sails.

"On top of this, we think we have assembled a crew of the finest eager young sailors it's possible to get. We know we have a tough summer ahead of us, but we are confident."

DEFEATED BRITAIN
The Columbia, which trounced Great Britain's Sceptre in four straight races in 1958 as the property of a syndicate headed by Henry Sears, is being given the final touches in a yard at Mamaroneck, N.Y.

The trim, 69-foot racer will be launched Friday or Saturday and almost immediately will begin a series of preliminary maneuvers against a trial horse—the Nyala, a 25-year-old 12-metre boat chartered from Gerald Ford, New York yachtsman.

Shields' nephew, Cornelius Shields, Jr., a 28-year-old dinghy sailing champion, will serve as skipper of the Columbia. Olin Stephens, the boat's famous designer, will be navigator.

"Cornelius Shields, Sr., will

be at the helm of Nyala in some of our test races," Paul Shields said. "We may shift crews around for experimenting purposes. We'll check our gibs and spinners. We'll spend hours of practice daily, perfecting sail-handling and concentrating on tactics."

The Australian challenger, Gretel, build in secrecy in Sydney, was scheduled to get its first competitive test Sunday or Monday in a 35-mile race against Vim, a U.S. boat which the Australians chartered as a guinea pig.

It was Vim which provided the toughest competition for Columbia in 1958 trials. If Gretel can beat or hold her own

against the U.S. craft then she will establish herself as an opponent to be reckoned with.

The United States fifth of the America's Cup, an unassuming old urn originally valued at no more than \$500, in a race around the Isle of Wight in 1851. Since then more than \$35,000,000 has been spent in challenges, but the cup never has been budged from its glass case at the New York Yacht Club.

The series reached its climax of interest back in the golden era (1920s and 1930s) when Sir Thomas Lipton and T. O. M. Sopwith challenged Harold G. Vanderbilt with majestic J-boats, twice the size of the present 12-metre craft. But the Americans never lost.

The race in 1958 was the first since 1937 when Vanderbilt's \$1,000,000 Ranger won four straight from Sopwith's Endeavor II.

The best four-of-seven race series for the America's Cup is scheduled to begin Sept. 15 off Newport, R.I., scene of many a spectacular race and a dashed British hope.

Hamilton Scores 8-1 Victory Over Quebec Citadels

HAMILTON (CP)—Hamilton Red Wings moved to within one game of a berth in the Memorial Cup finals Sunday by trouncing Quebec Citadels 8-1.

The victory was Wings' third straight in the Eastern Canada final. The fourth game will be played here Tuesday night and the fifth, if necessary, also in Hamilton Wednesday night.

The winner will meet the survivor of the Western Canada final between Edmonton Oil Kings and Brandon Wheat Kings.

Maple Leafs Are Champs After Victory In Chicago

CHICAGO (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs defeated Chicago Black Hawks 2-1 Sunday night with late third-period goals to win the Stanley Cup for the eighth time in the team's history.

It was the first cup win for Leafs in 11 years. They won the best-of-seven series 4-2.

Leafs, who outplayed and outskated the defending cup champions throughout most of the suspense-filled game, spotted Hawks a goal midway through the final 20 minutes and then whipped in a pair in less than four minutes.

The winning goal was scored by Dick Duff 14:14 with Chicago's Eric Nesterenko sitting out a holding penalty.

The big crowd, that hollered and screamed when Bobby Hull put Hawks in front 1-0 at 8:56 of the third period, hardly let out a whoop or a hoier as Clarence Campbell, National Hockey League president, presented the cup to captain George Armstrong at centre-ice post-game ceremonies.

Leafs, forechecking fiercely, rarely gave Chicago breathing space to mount any sort of a sustained offensive. It was curtains for Hawks when Duff came up with his clutch goal.

They pulled Hull out of the nets with 58 seconds of the game remaining and would-be Chicago snipers were checked almost into the ice by Leafs who held out as the final seconds ticked off.

The drive for the winning goal was started by defenseman Tim Horton who carried the puck from his own rear-guard spot into Chicago territory.

He whipped a shot into a huddle of players scrambling around in front of the Chicago goal and the puck deflected over to Duff who was alone 10 feet in front of the net. He wheeled around and drilled the puck into the left corner.

Horton received an assist on the play along with Armstrong. It gave him 12 for the post-season series when Leafs beat New York Rangers in six games and Hawks in six. That tied him with Hawks' Pierre Plote with 12 assists each as the leading point-scoring defenceman in Stanley Cup history, each with 15 points.

Plote got his 15 in 1961 against Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings.

Local Marksmen Make 100 Scores In Rifle Shoot
