Mr. LEMUEL ARTHUR, of the firm of Arthur & Tombs, arrived home from Boston last night, where he has been doing business in Island produce during the past summer.

Over \$70,000 were paid out last month in wages by the different coal and railway companies in the vicinity of New Glasgow, N. S.

The "Northern Light" left Georgetown, at the usual time this morning, but was obliged to return, on account of the thick showstorm. She will not leave again until to-morrow morning.

The brig "Servian," owned by Messrs Welsh & Owen, arrived at Queenstown on the 7th inst., 21 days from Crapaud. The cable reports a loss of sails, which indicates that the vessel had a rough passage.

WHERE THE MONEY GOES.—The City Treasurer forwarded to England yesterday, \$95,000 for the payment of one-half year's interest due in London by the city.—*Quebec Chronicle.*

CATTLE SHIPMENTS.—The steamer "Quebec," of the Dominion line, which sailed from Halifax on the 6th from Glasgow, G. E., took 176 head of cattle from New Brunswick shipped at Richmond, and valued at \$12,260.

"THE Halifax County Agricultural Society" has had its annual meeting, and has decided to "take immediate steps to increase the membership of the Society," and will endeavor to have the Dominion Exhibition of 1881 held in Halifax. The venerable Sir Wm. Young is the Society's President.

THE St. John's Nfld. Register of the 3rd inst. reports that the schr. "Emeline" put into Burin on Wednesday last in a disabled condition. Her bowsprit was carried away, and all her sails shattered; she sustained these damages while out in one of the recent gales. She was bound from Harbor Grace to Charlottetown. Her Captain has telegraphed to the latter port to her owners, stating that it is his intention to winter in Burin.

WRECK OF THE SCHOONER CETEWAY.—We learn from Captain Crozier, of the schr. "Lillian Burke," that the schr. "Cetewaye," owned by Captain English, of this city, was at Canoe when he was there, she being in a disabled condition, from injuries received in a heavy breeze of wind, while sailing between Charlottetown and Canoe. The "Cetewaye" had her sails torn a good deal and had her deck load, consisting of pork, potatoes, hay, carrots, &c., washed overboard. As the damages sustained by the schooner are not serious we may expect her along in a day or two.—*St. John Register, 3rd inst.*

THE tea and entertainment at the "Auld Kirk" last evening was, in every respect, a pleasant and highly creditable affair. The tea, which was laid on the table at six o'clock, was partaken of and reishied by a very large number, and the entertainment, although some of the best named performers on the programme rendered themselves conspicuous by their absence, was quite interesting. Among the sentimental solos we might mention the "Grave Digger" by Mr. D. M. Reid, who is blind, and who sang and played the accompaniment to his song with remarkably good taste. ## NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

LONDON, Dec. 7. The death is announced of the Right Honorable Sir James William Colville, in his 70th year.—Hanlan is staying in Dublin.—Laycock did good work on the River yesterday.—The loss to the Russian Revenue by the abolition of the tax on salt will be covered by an increase in duty on foreign and manufactured goods and the imposition of an Income Tax.—Mr. Parnell received two threatening letters during his stay in Waterford, one of which accuses him of destroying the country to benefit his own pocket.—A despatch from Dublin to the Times says "Boycotting" is now also used to compel unwilling persons to join the Land League and subscribe money thereto. A Dublin gentleman who has a few acres of land on the borders of this county, has received a letter, warning him that he must join the Land League before Saturday, or take the consequences. The most recent development in Boycotting is in the country towns, where the shopkeepers, and even pedlars, are required to produce tickets showing that they are members of the League or they will not buy or sell. Even Orangemen in some places are obliged to join the League or lose their business, property or lives. The organization becomes really more perfect in its minute details. The accumulation of arms in the country is regarded with much apprehension. One house here supplies 250 revolvers weekly to different parts of the country.—Crowds of people were collected at the corners of the streets to witness the entry of the first battalion of the Coldstream Guards into Dublin to-day, but there was no manifestation of feeling.—Mr. Clare Sewell Read, who went to America recently to enquire into American agriculture, in addressing the Farmers Club in London, said he would not fear American competition in wheat twenty five years hence as exhaustion of land would ensue in that time, and the cost of production would increase. But in regard to beef, there were serious prospects of competition from the vast herds of cattle in the far West.

PARIS, Dec. 7. Ex-Queen Isabella has ordered her bankers to invest largely in Panama Canal Shares.—Prince Hohenlohe, German Ambassador here, has congratulated M. De Lesseps on the financial success of the enterprise.—The death is announced of Gen. Peffeye, inventor of the Metrailleuse.—The International Exhibition of Electricity will open 1st August 1881, and will close 15th November following.—Germany has signified its intention to participate.

LONDON, Dec. 6. There was an immense Land League demonstration at Waterford yesterday. Mr. Parnell was presented with an address of welcome by the Corporation. The procession, which included various societies with horsemen, escorted Mr. Parnell to the place of meeting. Houses and shops were decorated with flags and the streets triumphantly arched. Four hundred police, 200 infantry and 100 cavalry were drafted for the town. The speeches were of the usual character.
