MacKenney Nets Winner

Bruins Send Montreal To First Defeat Of Season

MONTREAL (CP)—Don MacKenney's goal at 18:28 of a blistering third period Thursday night pulled out a 3-2 win for Boston Bruins over Montreal Canadiens in the opening game of the National Hockey League season.

Canadiens overcame a two-goal deficit in the final period themselves, with the crowd of 13,555 in a continual uproar, but MacKenney settled the issue with a whistling shot as both teams battled all out for the decision.

The Bruins' victory lifted them into second place in the standing, while the first-place Canadiens had their margin trimmed to two points.

Boston took the lead in the first period on Vic Stasiuk's goal at 18:01 and went two up at 9:52 of the middle period when Doug Mohs counted on a deflected shot.

MONTREAL DRIVE

Up to that point the fast-skating Bruins had outplayed Canadiens by a good margin, keeping the Montrealers off balance and letting them seldom get organized for a consistent offensive.

It was a different story in the final session when Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard counted at 2:56 and Dollard St. Laurent tied the score at 7:15.

From there on it was a battle royal and goalie Terry Sawchuk was brilliant in the Boston nets.

Amherst Ramblers Dump Hawks 3-1 In Opener

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP)—Amherst Ramblers fired two first period goals and added another in the second Thursday to drop the Maritime champion Moncton Hawks 3-1 in an opening game of the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League season.

Hank Therrien and Dave Kiley scored in the opening frame for the Ramblers, who wound up in the cellar of the four-team loop last year. Former Charlottetown Islander Cooper Leyte added an insurance tally in the middle frame.

The Hawks' only goal was potted by Lorne Hennessy.

Fiery Nick Pidsodny, who drew a major penalty in the second after tangle with Ramblers' playing coach Lou Kiley, kicked out 35 Amherst shots while Paul Leclerc was called on for 16 saves.

Twenty-seven penalties including four majors were dished out in the hard-hitting game.

Bud Smith In Dilemma; Can't Identify Manager

CINCINNATI (AP)—The financial troubles which often plague a boxing champion moved in on lightweight title holder Bud Smith Thursday.

He appeared before the Cincinnati Boxing Commission to collect a check for \$9,000 this afternoon with a big smile on his face. He was happy, because he had squeaked out a victory over challenger Jimmy Carter Wednesday night in 15 bruising rounds.

The smile became a bit frozen, however, when sheriff's deputies delivered a court order attaching \$6,000 of the Cincinnati's guarantee from promoter Sam Becker.

The attachment followed a suit filed earlier in the day by John Joiner, Cincinnati, who claims he is Smith's manager.

SMITH DIDN'T KNOW

Smith said before the fight he did not know just who were his managers. That statement was made to the commission when he was asked the status of Carmine Graziano and Tony Ferrente, who had been acting as his co-managers.

Ferrente and Graziano are under investigation by the boxing commission in Pennsylvania because of alleged associations with undesirable characters.

It then was decided to make out the check for the Carter fight to Smith.

Joiner claimed Smith signed a five-year contract with him in 1950. Graziano was in Smith's corner Wednesday night.

Steeplechase At Belmont Park

NEW YORK (AP)—Jumpers take over the spotlight today at Belmont Park with 11 horses entered in the \$50,000-added Tembaud steeplechase in U.S. racing annals.

Two five-year-old chestnut geldings, Neel and Shipboard, are expected to battle it out for the top prize in what should be a spectacular 2 1/2-mile duel over 16 stiff fences.

Neel, owned by Mrs. Ogden Phipps, carries highweight of 167 pounds, while Mrs. Marion du Pont's Shipboard has 166.

Harris Out As Gen. Manager Of San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Bucky Harris was eliminated as a candidate for general manager of San Diego's Pacific Coast League baseball club, The Union said Thursday, because he wanted a three-year contract.

Ralph Kiner, 32, former National League home-run king, was given the job Tuesday on a one-year contract, at a reported pay of \$25,000.

Ski Meet Dates Are Announced

PORT ARTHUR (CP)—Senior Canadian downhill and slalom ski championships will be in Collingwood, Ont., Feb. 10 and 11, Mike Guzzell, technical chairman of the Canadian Amateur Ski Association, said Thursday.

Senior jumping will be at Midland, Ont. Feb. 25. Junior four-way championships will be in Port Arthur Feb. 25 and 26, the same days the senior cross-country event is at Sudbury.

Ski Shortage In Norway

OSLO (AP)—Norway, the cradle of modern skiing, is facing a serious shortage of skis this season.

Modern skis are made from hickory, which Norway imports from the United States exclusively. Due to depleted Norwegian dollar reserves, the import quota for hickory has been cut drastically.

Several ski manufacturers may be forced to close down their plants for long periods, according to Helge Weyerwang of the Norwegian Ski Manufacturers Association.

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Lindsay's Goal Gives Wings Tie With Hawks

DETROIT (CP)—Captain Ted Lindsay fired in the equalizer at 4:06 of the final period Thursday night to give the National Hockey League champion Detroit Red Wings a 2-2 tie with Chicago Black Hawks.

Lindsay scored the tying marker after Bill Dineen had reduced a 2-0 Chicago lead in the second period.

The Black Hawks had gone out front on goals by Red Sullivan and Harry Watson.

Thursday night's tie, coupled with the earlier victory, gave the Hawks as many points against Detroit as they were able to compile over all of last season when they were able to muster only one win and one tie in 14 starts.

Sullivan in the first period and Watson in the second both slipped through the Detroit defence for 15-footers. It was the third goal of the season for each.

DINEEN LEADS OFF

Dineen broke the ice for Detroit at 17:45 of the second frame with his first tally of the season. Lindsay tied it after carrying the puck 60 feet and beating two Chicago players before lining home a 15-footer.

The goal was Lindsay's fifth this season and the 26th of his career, within a single goal of matching the life-time total of Montreal's Aurel Joliat, highest scoring left-winger in hockey history.

Collins Resigns From Phillies

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Eddie Collins, Jr., son of one of baseball's all-time greats, Thursday resigned as assistant general manager, he said, he was placed in the position of endorsing policies he disapproved.

Collins joined the Phillies as assistant farm director in 1947 and was named assistant general manager last Dec. 19.

Actually, his resignation was the result of a policy conflict with general manager Roy Hampey.

Collins, whose dad, Edward Trobridge Collins, Sr., is in the Hall of Fame, said his decision to quit was not sudden. He said it had been building up over the last summer.

Marciano Wins Athletic Award

NEW YORK (AP)—Rocky Marciano won the "professional athlete of the month" award for September, it was announced Thursday.

The heavyweight champion easily outvoted Johnny Podres, and Duke Snider of the Brooklyn Dodgers in the poll of sports writers and broadcasters.

Marciano thus became the first former winner to qualify for a second shot at the "professional athlete of the year" award.

Art Ballem Elected Pres. Of Volleyball League

Art Ballem was elected president of the City Volleyball League at a meeting held at the Y.M.C.A. last night.

Ballem succeeded George Andrew, the retiring president who had held the post since the league was formed 3 years ago.

Other officers elected were vice-president, Alfred Coody; secretary, George Andrew; treasurer, Ron Atkinson.

During the well attended meeting it was decided that all business firms or community clubs wishing to enter teams in the league must have their entries in to the executive not later than October 28th and should have a representative at the next meeting being held on Thursday October 27th.

It was suggested that the league get underway on October 31st but nothing definite could be decided on that question until the number of teams participating in the league is definitely known. It is expected that there will be eight and possibly more teams registering.

Also there was discussion with Maritime Volleyball conference to be held here next March or April. More definite plans will be laid at a meeting of the league executive to be held soon.

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Expect Canada's Largest Crowd

Mad Scramble Is On For Grey Cup Game Tickets

TORONTO (CP)—East and West, the mad scramble is on for tickets for the Grey Cup game that this year will attract the largest crowd ever to watch a football game in Canada.

The plea, "where can I get a couple of Grey Cup tickets," is rising volume every day with the country's greatest sports classic little more than a month away. The clamor is even strong in the east even though the game has been shifted from Toronto Vancouver's Empire Stadium.

Close to 40,000 fans are expected to jam the country's largest stadium for the final Nov. 26. There'll be seating capacity for 31,520 and 8,000 standing-room tickets will be sold. The previous high crowd figure was 29,503 set at Empire Stadium last Sept. 10 in a regularly scheduled Western Interprovincial Football Union game.

EXPECT SELL-OUT

The fans across the country won't get a crack at the standing-room spaces. They all will be distributed in Vancouver.

Harry McBrien, Canadian Rugby Union secretary and in charge of the annual ticket-distribution headache, said Thursday: "I expect every seat to be sold and every standing-room space to be taken."

The tickets will be divided on the same basis as last year with a slight difference. The Big Four League, the Western Interprovincial Football Union and the CRU will each get 30 per cent with the other 10 per cent going to the Ontario Rugby Football Union.

The difference is that this year 5,000 of the CRU block go to the west and 1,000 to the east—the opposite to when the game was played in Toronto.

The Big Four and WIFU will give each club a certain number of tickets and then wait for a further distribution until after the league playoffs determine which clubs will be in the east-west final. The champions will get the most tickets and the other teams a lesser amount depending on how they finish.

Capitals Edge St. John 2-1 On Campbell's Marker

FREDERICTON (CP)—Playing coach Hughie Campbell fired home a goal midway through the third period to give Fredericton Capitals a 2-1 comeback over Saint John Beavers in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League Thursday.

It was opening game of the season for both clubs.

The Beavers, making their first start in senior hockey after a year's layoff, grabbed the lead in the first period when Frank Kuzma teamed with Wally Kullman and Sid Puddicombe at the 17:37 mark.

The second period was scoreless with Fredericton tying the game in the first 20 seconds of the third. Bob Legere finished off the three-way play from Dough McPhee and Bill McDonough.

Eight penalties were called, including majors to Bill McDonough and Val Palladino in the opening minutes of play.
