SUPREME COURT.

The July term of the Supreme Court commenced at Georgetown on the 21st instant. The business was unusually light. There were no record cases on the docket, and only two appeals were tried.

John Hayden, who was convicted last January of stealing a horse from Mr. May, of Southport, was tried for taking similar liberties with a horse belonging to W. E. Clark, Esq., and sentenced to a further period of ten months imprisonment.

THE PARTY AT VERNON RIVER.—On Monday last, a Public Tea was held on the Chapel grounds, at Vernon River, for the purpose of raising funds in aid of the new Brick Parochial House. An immense concourse of people were assembled together—over 2000.

The Enterprising firm of Waddell and Wilson returned to town on Monday evening last from Souris, with 9000 cans (175 boxes) Lobsters, which they put up in fifteen days. These preserved lobsters are intended for the home market, where, we understand, those put up by them last year brought the highest prices.

MARRIAGE EXTRAORDINARY.—It is authoritatively announced, that at the termination of the present brief tour of the Tom Thumb troupe, the renowned Commodore Nutt (of twenty pounds), will lead to the altar the sweet little Minnie Warren (of twenty pounds).

We regret to say that Mr. Thomas Smith, of this City, late keeper of the Block House Light, met with a severe accident on Saturday last. In driving a load of hay into the barn of Mr. Benjamin Hearty, being on the top of the load his back came in contact with the beam, by which he received severe injury to the spine of the back.

It is with much regret we announce the fact that Mr. William Grant, of the firm of Grant, Romans & Co., was drowned at Roche's wharf in this city, on Wednesday evening. The body was discovered in the water yesterday morning. The deceased was an energetic business man, highly respected in this community.

Fifty persons died in New York city on Thursday from the effects of heat, and a large list of casualties not fatal are reported. Six persons died from the same cause in Brooklyn, three in Jersey City and eight in Newark. There were six deaths also at the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

Captain Frank Westaway, of the Brig Petrel, from P. E. Island, while lying at Boston, beat his wife in a terrible manner, inflicting injuries which will probably prove fatal. He was arrested and committed for trial.

Dr. Harris, the registrar of the board of health of St. John, reports that two hundred and fifty deaths have occurred as a direct effect of heat, in the Metropolitan district during the three days of last week.

News by Telegraph.

LONDON, July 23.—Lord Napier of Magdala yesterday received the freedom of the city and sword from the Corporation of London. The ceremony took place at Guildhall, and was witnessed by a large assemblage of ladies and gentlemen.

LONDON, July 23.—In the House of Lords this evening, Lord Shaftesbury asked if the Minister could give the House any information concerning the reported proposition of the Russian Government for the issue of explosive bullets. Earl Malmesbury said Her Majesty's Government were in receipt of a circular from the Government of the Czar, making a suggestion that all the Great Powers should unite in an agreement to abandon the use of explosive bullets in time of war.

LONDON, July 24 (even).—In the House of Commons to night the bribery bill was under consideration. Mr. Henry Fawcett moved that the clause providing that the election expenses be paid out of the local rates, and not by the candidates, which had been struck out, be restored to the bill.

LIVERPOOL, July 23.—Markets show little change. Flour 29s. 6d. The health of Archbishop Cullen has improved, and he is now considered out of danger. Mr. Bancroft, the American Minister, having concluded his negotiations at Carlsruhe, has gone to Baden. Another change has been made in the Portuguese Ministry.

LIVERPOOL, July 24.—Breadstuffs and markets quiet. A despatch from Shanghai reports that the crew of the American vessel General Sherman, which was wrecked in the Chinese waters, have been benched by the natives where they landed.—The great Annual Volunteer Review takes place on Saturday, on Wimbledon Common. As in former years, the day will be closed and business generally be suspended.—Reports of the harvest from all parts of the country show the yield of grain crops to be quite equal to the annual average. The harvest reports from Russia are unfavorable. The grain crops throughout the whole empire have turned out bad, the yield being unusually small and poor.

PARIS, July 23.—The Proprietor of the International, a weekly journal published in London, has just been tried before one of the courts of this city for libel and sentenced to pay a fine of three thousand francs, and to four months imprisonment.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Gold closed at 431. Congress so far distrusts President Johnson that instead of adjourning until December, it will probably take a recess until the latter part of September. Wm. P. Howland was sworn into office on Wednesday, at Toronto, as Lieut. Governor of Ontario. A Havana letter of the 18th instant says:—'During several days the Cholera has been decreasing, and the panic produced by the sudden and fierce attack has passed away. The worst form of Yellow Fever has, however, made its appearance.'

NEW YORK, July 25.—Baltimore was deluged with a tremendous rainstorm yesterday, which partially submerged a considerable portion of the city. Causing damage to the amount of three millions of dollars, and loss of several lives by drowning. The report states that the Granite Mills near Baltimore were carried away, and sixty lives lost. Dr. Owen's entire family, except himself, perished.

NEWS BY LAST NIGHT'S MAIL.

Sir John A. McDonald and Sir Etienne Cartier are about to visit Halifax on a mission of conciliation. We hope the "mission" will do them much good. A plot to blow up some of the fortifications of Rome is reported by telegram of the 27th to have been discovered.

The weather throughout Great Britain is reported favorable to the crops. The Norwegian expedition, which left Norway on the 7th of May last, on an expedition to the North Pole, was spoken in lat 72; all on board were well.

LONDON, July 26.—The grand annual encampment of Volunteers at Wimbledon, was brought to a close yesterday. The Prizes for skill in marksmanship were awarded by Lord Napier of Magdala, who also reviewed the Volunteers. The Prince of Wales, Prince Alfred, and Longfellow, the American Poet, were among the distinguished persons present, while immense crowds of the nobility and people generally were in attendance. Gen. Napier was repeatedly cheered. There were about ten thousand men in line at the Review, and they presented a very fine appearance.
