Coal Is Being Shipped Premier Shaw Advised

Premier Walter R. Shaw has been advised by Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, Montreal, that carloads of domestic coal will be shipped to five island dealers this week.

Yesterday, the premier telephoned the coal sales division of Doxco to find out what types of coal are not available in this province.

He was told by coal sales superintendent Alister Macdonald that a breakdown of coal machinery in Cape Breton, miners on holiday and the fact that there was no stockpile of coal contributed to the shortage here.

In a telegram to the premier yesterday Mr. Macdonald said domestic coal will be shipped this week. "Please be assured," said Mr. Macdonald, "that your position is being closely followed during this time of a very heavy demand for coal from all areas."

Power Failure In Kings County

SOURIS — The town of Souris experienced a power failure yesterday between 10:05 and 11:30 a.m.

It is believed the failure was caused by trouble at the Maritime Electric plant in Charlottetown.

Sections of southern Kings County had several interruptions in electric power Monday, the longest lasting an hour or more. Officials of Maritime Electric in Charlottetown said the trouble was in the area between Knox Pond, Victoria Cross and the Murray River road, but they did not know the exact cause.

Public Impatience Growing Rector Tells Rotary Club

Public impatience with the religious order which saw conflict, even war, between Catholics and Protestants in the past is growing, members of the Charlottetown Rotary Club were told Monday at their regular luncheon meeting.

Rev. William Simpson, rector of St. Dunstan's Basilica Parish, told Rotarians that a divided Christianity "is a great scandal of our time".

For too long he said "we have grown accustomed to the division, we have been content to withdraw to the suburb of reality".

"Lately and happily there is growing impatience with this old religious order where Catholics and Protestants engaged in war, where those who were supposed to be brothers in Christ took up arms in endless bloodshed, and that in the name of 'religion'".

A change had to come, he said and it came with the Ecumenical Council called by Pope John XXIII and continued by Pope Paul VI.

PERSONAL VIEWS
Father Simpson made it clear to the Rotarians that the views he was expressing were his own personal opinions. "What I say is not going to commit the Bishop or pope to change their views or ways".

The speaker said Pope John "contributed in no small way" to the changing world climate. His timing of the council was perfect. "As he said opening the council, 'a new day is dawning, a new era is upon us'".

Father Simpson said the primary purposes of the council which include, "letting in a little fresh air," "inner renewal," "sources of inspiration," "religious freedom," authority in the church and the role of the

laity," will help to prepare "for the secondary purpose that of ecumenism—the union of separate brothers."

IS PROMISING
Father Simpson said there is a danger that too much will be expected from the council, but noted these "promising developments": the presence of non-Catholic observers at the council; presence of Catholic observers at Protestant council meetings; the sharing in biblical research; the possibility of a noticeable thaw in the cold war.

The speaker said people should not underestimate the magnitude of the job. Many obstacles remain and will remain for some time. "It is not easy to heal the wounds of centuries".

son to be happy with the progress to date and hopeful for the future, realizing that the journey of 1,000 miles begins with one step in the field of ecumenism, that the step has been taken and the long journey to a united witness has begun so that we may be one and the world may believe, which was and still is the prayer of Christ.
