NEW YORK, May 21—St. Louis Cardinals snapped New York Giants' winning streak at nine games and bounded back into the National League lead today as they defeated Bill Terry's men 4-2 to square the two-game series here. The victory gave the Cards a half-game advantage over the Giants.

For eight innings the game was a tight pitching duel between Paul Dean, seeking his third victory of the season, and Al Smith, who was after his fourth triumph, but in the ninth Cardinals opened up.
Roy Henshaw, midge southpaw, held Dodgers to seven hits as Chicago Cubs squared the two-game series with 4-0 victory at Brooklyn.
A six run rally in the ninth, climaxed by Jensen's home run with two men on base, gave Pittsburgh a 7-4 victory over Phillies before 1,800 fans at Philadelphia.
Syl Johnson allowed the Pirates only four hits for the first eight innings, but was relieved by Jorgens after Paul Waner, Vaughan and Suhr hit safely with none out in the ninth.
Bill Urbanek poked out a timely ninth inning double at Boston to provide Red Sox with a 2-2 triumph over Athletics in the eighth.

Says Better Coaching Won Olympic Title

WINNIPEG, May 21—England won the Olympic hockey championship because its team was better coached than Canada's in the opinion of Ale. Archer, Winnipeg puck-chaser who played on Great Britain's victorious squad. But Canada, he said upon his arrival home from England, should never have lost the championship. 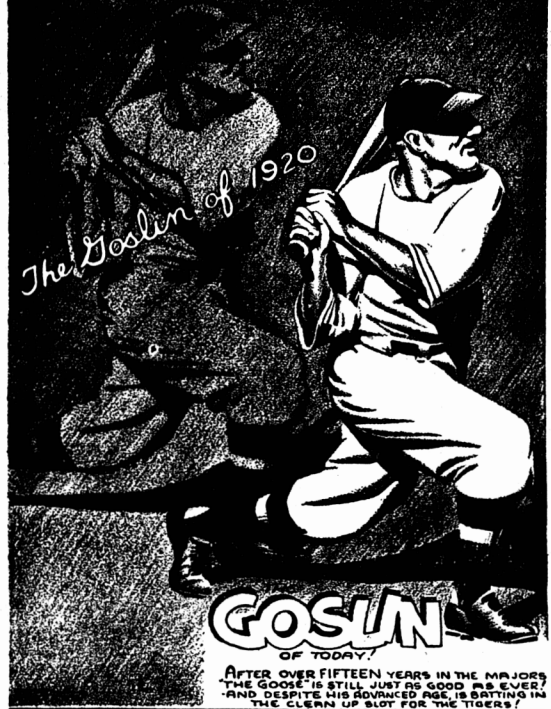
Upsets Feature French Tennis Tournament

PARIS, May 21—Upsets continued to play in the French tennis courts tennis doubles championships today.
The biggest reversal occurred in the women's competition which saw the 1935 championship combination of left-handed Kay Stammers and Peggy Scriven of England knocked out in the second round by Simone Lubane and Edith Bellard of France, by 6-2, 6-4.

It was a bad day all around for Miss Scriven, one of Great Britain's better known internationalists. Playing with her compatriot, C. R. D. Tuckey, she dropped a third round mixed doubles encounter to Frau Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling of Denmark and Germany, and Antoine Gentien of France, by 6-2, 5-7, 6-3.
Frau Sperling, winner of the 1935 French singles championship, however, was herself the victim of an upset. She and her partner, Countess de la Valdeine, the former Lily Alvarez of Spain, dropped a 6-2, 5-7, 6-2 quarter-final match to Nelly Adamsen and Jeanne Demeulemeester of Belgium.
Mrs. Dorothy Andrus of New York and Charles Hare of England were eliminated in a third rounder by Marie-Louise Horn and Karl Lund of Germany, 6-3, 8-10, 6-3, while Anne Page of Philadelphia and Wilma Patterson, another American, bowed to the Polish champion, Jadwiga Jedzejowska, and Jacques Brugnon of France, 6-1, 6-2.
All of the quarter-final brackets in the men's doubles competition were filled without any upsets although the veteran Jean Borotra and Marcel Bernard gave the gallery some anxious moments before they vanquished Frederick Mercier and Pierre Leconte of Switzerland, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2, 6-3. NEW YORK, May 21—Gene Sarazen, the little guy they're always afraid of when the shooting starts for heavy money in golf, came down from his Connecticut farm today to play in the metropolitan and to warn his rivals that he expects to be not in the approaching United States open show at Baltusrol.
"And why not Sarazen?" he asked as he finished naming his 10 choices, headed by Walter Hagen, for the open. "The Romans are going to town this year all the way from Addis Ababa to Yankee Stadium."
"I figure 290 will win it. Baltusrol is distinctly of the British type. You don't have to be so straight off the tees but you've got to be accurate with your shots to the pin. Each green has scores of undulations and if you're 40 feet wide of the pin it'll be tough to get down with two putts."
Sarazen's picks, in order, were Hagen, Harry Cooper, John Revolta, Ray Mangrum, Jimmy Thomson, Horton Smith, Paul Runyan, Bobby Cruickshank, Denny Shute, and MacDonald Smith. The Hagen pick was meant seriously. Gene thinks the old master has one more open coming his way.

MAMARONECK, N. Y., May 21—Gene Sarazen, a golfing country gentleman from Brookfield Centre, Conn., came to town today and shot a 69 to tie the competitive record of the Quaker Ridge Golf Course and lead the field in the first round of the Metropolitan open golf championship.

Experimenting with his game in preparation for the United States open at Baltusrol next month, Sarazen was in the bunkers and the tall-grass all the way around, but he putted magnificently, sinking a footer on the final green for a birdie to take the lead away from Henry Picard, the tall professional from Hershey, Pa., who is defending the title.
In third place, one shot back of Picard, were three outstanding professionals, Paul Runyan, White Plains, N. Y., Byron Nelson, Ridgewood, N. J., and Craig Wood, New York, and one shot back of these was Willie MacFarlane, who won the Metropolitan title two years ago at Winged Foot.

Binns Scores Technical K.O. Over Amherst Boxer; Fine Card Staged At S'side

Bennie Binns, hard-hitting Charlottetown middleweight last night scored a technical knockout over Vic Trenholm of Amherst, Nova Scotia in the main event of a boxing card staged in the Crystal Rink, Summerside and promoted by Eric A. Harris, well-known sportsman of the western capital.
The card was enthusiastically received by a large crowd and it is expected that before the season ends many more bouts will be staged.
Binns while winning rather handily did not have matters easy by any means. Trenholm appeared to have a slight edge in boxing skill but the Charlottetown boy was by far the heavier puncher. Binns won the first two rounds by narrow margins with the third session being declared a draw. The fourth went to the winner again as he continually made his opponent miss but Trenholm captured the fifth heat easily. Coming back furiously Binns landed smashing blows throughout the sixth heat but again the round was Trenholm's as he sent the Charlottetown boy to the canvas with a smashing right hand wallop. Trenholm however could not come out for the seventh round on account of an injured left hand caused when one of Binns' hard smashes landed on it in the preceding heat.
The first bout to be called was between two local youths, Phil Dadds and Sonny Peters. These two were very popular with the crowd and during the two rounds which they battled slugging was evident at all times. The judges decision was a draw.
The second event brought together young Trainer and Tommy Thompson both of Summerside. This bout probably exhibited a little more science than the preceding but also showed much slugging from performers. It also ended in a draw. The first preliminary bout saw McCormick of Souris take a decision from Oxford of Georgetown. The bout went the full five rounds and was one of the highlights of the evening. Both opened cautiously in the first and this was continued into the second though it was not so marked. At this stage Oxford seemed to have a slight edge over his rival. Round three produced some heavy punching and McCormick was beginning to show more power than the Georgetown boy. McCormick continued his powerful punches to the body in

the fourth, brought Oxford to the canvas early in the fifth and had things pretty much his own way to the end of the fight. As referee Ryan raised his glove the decision seemed popular with the crowd.
The next three preliminaries on the card ended abruptly in the first round and did not appear very popular with the customers especially the last two. In the first Johnny Shaw of Charlottetown disposed of Tiger Pasha when he gave his opponent a bad nose with several straight lefts followed by a hard right.
Referee Ches. Garrett called the semifinal off in the second round when the two contestants Jimmy Donovan and LeClair both of Charlottetown did not seem to be playing the game.
