LARGE EEL.—The Pioneer says that Mr. Hubert Compton, of St. Eleanor, caught a very large eel in the Platte River a short time ago. The eel measured three feet five inches long, and girthed nine inches, the weight being five and a quarter pounds.

HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.—A young man named Anthony McPhee, while unloading refuse at J. Murphy's mill, near Rogersville, N. B., a day or two ago, fell into the furnace used for burning the refuse. The trolley loaded with refuse fell on top of him, burying him in the fire and burning him to death. He was a nephew of section foreman McPhee, and about 16 years old.

LARGE CATCHES.—The St. John Sun of Saturday says: The catch of shad and gaspereaux in the harbor continues large. Many of the shad taken are very large, weighing eight pounds or more. A 28 pound salmon was taken in the harbor yesterday. The gaspereaux catch up river has been large. James Patterson yesterday received 60 barrels from Lower Jemseg and Gagetown.

STRANGE POISONING CASE.—A strange and fatal case of poisoning occurred at Campbellton, N. B., on Saturday. The victim is a 10-year old lad named Whitney Sawyer. It seems that Sawyer and some other boys obtained some kind of liquor, supposed to be gin, in a bottle, and it is supposed that from the contents partaken the boy died on Sunday. The town is very much excited over the affair.

STRUCK BY THE TRAIN.—On Friday last, says the Agriculturist, a cow belonging to Mr. James Seaman, of Summerside, was struck by the accommodation train from the west and so severely injured that she was at once killed to put her out of suffering. A cow belonging to Mr. Fredk. Macdonald, of the same place, was also struck by the same train, at the same crossing, and considerably injured.

JOHN L. AGAIN.—It is stated that John L. Sullivan has agreed to accept the offer of the New Virginia Club of a purse of \$20,000 to a finish fight between himself and Jackson, and \$10,000 for a battle with McAuliffe. If Sullivan's re-trial in Mississippi results in his imprisonment, the above agreement is to be cancelled. Sullivan said he would not engage in a bar-knuckle fight.

CATTLE AND HORSES.—The Summerside Pioneer reports that Mr. Charles McNutt, of Kensington, shipped nineteen very fine cattle on Thursday morning last for Leaman & Co., of Halifax. On Friday morning two fine horses were taken by Mr. Hanson for St. John, and on Saturday Messrs. Avar and Drummond shipped 23 handsome fat heifers, fifteen of which were fed by Mr. John Dickie, of Bay View, which averaged between 100 and 120 lbs. Messrs. Keeis and Kane also shipped 23 on the same morning.

HILLSBOROUGH PARK.—The committee in charge of these beautiful grounds have not been unmindful of Arbor day. They purchased from Gay & Son fifty fine trees of different kinds, Mountain Ash, Horse Chestnut, etc., which they have planted in the place of the trees destroyed last year. They also purchased liberal subscriptions are made by the property owners around the park and its vicinity, to add very much to the improvements already made as far as possible. All they ask of the civic authorities is, that they instruct the Police to visit the park occasionally between the hours of four and seven o'clock in the afternoon.

ROYALTY IN CANADA.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT AT REGINA.

REGINA, N. W. T., May 26. The royal special train arrived here at 3.45 a. m., and an informal reception was held at 7.30, at which the Lieutenant Governor and several prominent citizens were presented to their Royal Highnesses. The morning was very fine, and their Highnesses remained on the platform for about half an hour in conversation with the gentlemen presented to them. Then the special train moved off amid loud cheers, and the strains of God Save the Queen.

The St. John Stabbing Affray.

ST. JOHN, May 27. About 5.30 o'clock this morning officers Robert Hamilton and G. H. Laskey arrested Gray and Watson at the Suspension Bridge. On both men knives were found. On Gray was found a large jack-knife, and on opening it all doubts were removed as to what kind of a knife committed the murder. Blood was plainly to be seen on the point of it. Watson claimed the knife, and said he gave it to Gray after they left Torrie's. On their way to the central station Watson remarked it was an accident. Officer Laskey asked him what he meant and Watson told him the deed was done. He said Torrie invited him and Gray to the house, and that when they went there they were refused admittance. Gray asked for a drink and someone struck him. Watson had a knife in his hand and he struck Torrie with it. Watson said "It was me that done it, and it's no use to lie about it."

Naval Appropriation Bill.

WASHINGTON, May 26. In the Senate to-day, Senator Blair offered an amendment to the Naval Appropriation Bill, that the provision to construct three heavily armoured battle ships be not available until the government of Great Britain shall have been requested by the President to withdraw all her naval forces from American waters and dismantle her naval stations in North and South America and adjacent Islands, and shall have declined, or neglected for one year to do so. Senator Cockerell's amendment, to strike out the provision for the three battle ships, was not agreed to. An item was inserted, appropriating \$200,000 for a dry dock at Port Royal, S. C. The bill then passed.

Rykert's Election.

TORONTO, May 26. It is reported that Charles J. Rykert will accept his re-election in Lincoln as a vindication, and will resign at once. The result of the election created a great deal of talk. A Lincoln Reformer writes to the Mail, declaring that the Liberals had no organization, and that many failed to come out and vote for their candidate. Not more than one-half of the votes of the constituency was polled, and Rykert was elected by about one-quarter of the electors. A very large body of the Conservatives either voted against Rykert or remained away from the polls.

The Royal Society.

OTTAWA, May 26. The Royal Society opened its annual session here to-day.

The Imperial institute of which the Prince of Wales is president, has added thirty-five to its governing body to be selected from India and the colonies. Of this number Canada will nominate ten two each from Ontario and Quebec one from each of the other provinces and one from each of the territories. The local government have been asked to make the nomination.
