A HABES CORPUS ISSUED.—To-day an application was made to Judge Hodgson for a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of Charles Slato now in Queen's County Jail. Slato was one of the witnesses in the Larzer case, and was committed to jail on a charge of drunkenness. He states that the charge of drunkenness was a put up job to get him to jail, and asks to be discharged. Judge Hodgson granted the writ, and Slato will come before His Lordship to-morrow at the Judge's Chambers.

THE DIFFERENCE.—The Halifax Herald says: A young lady—known as such—was detected the other day stealing from a dry goods store on Granville street. She departed with the goods and no attempt was made to stop her. The following day, however, a note was sent to the woman requesting her to send the money for the articles she had taken from the store, and which she had neglected to pay for. One hour after the note was sent the money was forthcoming. The same firm are now proceeding against an alleged shop lifter at the police court.

POLICE COURT.—This morning, James Egan, 18 years of age, for being drunk and out after hours, was fined \$10 or 20 days. Ewen Law, for assaulting Isaac Gill on the 9th inst., was fined \$1 or 4 days. John Bell (laborer), charged with being drunk and disorderly on the 15th, was remanded to jail until May 22, pending the apprehension of some 23 other young men implicated in the same disturbance. Patrick Gormley, for allowing a malicious dog to run at large, was fined 5 cents and costs, and was ordered to have the dog destroyed or removed from the city within 24 hours.

DISRESSING ACCIDENT.—A most distressing accident happened to Miss Esther Harvie, of Hantsport, N. S., recently. Miss Harvie was knitting, and thoughtlessly began probing her ear with one of the needles. Just at that moment a young girl accidentally ran against Miss Harvie's elbow, driving the needle deep into the interior of the ear. Intense agony and vomiting succeeded the withdrawal of the needle, with no appearance of abatement for some days. No hope of her recovery is entertained.

THE MARKET.—The market to-day was rather poorly attended, with prices little changed from last report. Eggs, in moderate supply, were selling at from 11 to 12 cents per dozen. Butter (fresh) in fair supply, was selling at 21 to 22 cents per lb., and butter (tub) from 19 to 20 cents per lb. Fowl, rather scarce, were selling at from 50 to 55 cents per pair. Outside—Hay in good supply was selling at from 70 to 75 cents per cwt. Potatoes, wholesale, were in good supply and sold at from 38 to 40 cents per bushel; potatoes, retail, were selling at from 45 to 50 cents per bushel. Oats, in poor supply, were selling at from 34 to 35 cents per bush. Flax, in plentiful supply, sold at from 8 to 9 cents per dozen. Lobsters in fair supply, sold at 3, 4 and 5 cents each.

OBITUARY.—We hear with regret of the death of Dr. D. C. McKay, of Summerside, which occurred at his residence in that town, about half-past seven o'clock this morning. He had been ailing for some time past, and about a week ago an operation was performed which, however, did not benefit him very much. Dr. McKay was a man who was well known and deservedly esteemed and respected. His bereaved relatives have the sympathy of all.

The death is announced to-day of Martha, wife of John Henry Gates, Esq., and daughter of the late Theophilus Chappell, Esq. The deceased lady was in delicate health for some time past. Her loss will be deeply felt by her bereaved husband and family and a wide circle of relatives and friends.

LONDON, May 16. John Redmond says the newly revived story about the reconciliation of the Irish parties is absolutely untrue. "There have been absolutely no negotiations between Mr. McCarthy and myself," said he, "and there is not the remotest idea of a reunion. Our position is quite unchanged."

Encountered Heavy Weather.

BOSTON, May 16. The British brig Sarah Wallace, from St. John for New Haven, with a cargo of piling, was spoken May 14th thirty-five miles southeast from Thatcher's Island. She had lost her foremast, foretop-gallant sail and royal sail.

John L. Sullivan Arrested.

BANGOR, Me., May 16. John L. Sullivan was arrested here last night on a warrant sworn out in Biddeford for an assault upon M. L. Lizotte, lawyer of Biddeford, committed on the train last night. Sullivan offered no resistance, and was taken to the County jail.

Another Steamer Lost.

HALIFAX, May 16. The steamer Havana, owned by Pickford and Black, is a total loss in Burgess Harbor, Newfoundland. The ship was valued at \$40,000 and was insured for \$33,500.

Steamer Ashore.

OTTAWA, May 16. The Hamburg Line steamer Wandrahan is ashore at Apple Island, 120 miles below Quebec. There are 700 passengers on board.
