New Era In Mail Delivery

...Much interest has been aroused by the inauguration on Monday, October 1st, of the new mail truck service. The C. N. A. truck which left Charlottetown at 8:55 A.M. arrived in Georgetown at 10:45 A.M. and the mail was open for delivery to the public at approximately 11:15 A.M.

This is an advance in delivery of mail of many hours, but meant a two-hour delay in the delivery of the Guardian, compared to the arrangements in effect during the past few weeks.

As near as the writer can recall, it is twenty years or more since Georgetown had anything but an evening mail delivery. At one time, over twenty years ago, a train arrived here at noon and a mail delivery was made between 12:30 noon and 1:00 P.M.

For years the general habit has been for citizens, including box-holders and those who receive their mail by General Delivery, to converge on the post office in the early evening and there to await the opening of the mail.

New School Being Erected At Murray River

The progressive community of Murray River is at present erecting a new school to replace the old one which has been in use for over sixty years. Realizing that the old building has long ago served its purpose, the trustee board felt it imperative that a new one be constructed.

The new school is adjacent to the old one, but of modern lines completely, of the Southport school type. The building is 100 feet long and 26 1/2 feet wide, with three classrooms and basement. It will be heated by an electric oil furnace, and will also have running water and indoor plumbing.

Water will be supplied by grades one to three, four to seven, and eight to ten. The total cost will be approximately \$20,000.00.

Large spacious grounds surround the school, and this is being leveled by bulldozer and maintainer. It will later be landscaped and lawn seeded. Mr. William White-way, contractor, expects to have the school completed for occupation in about six weeks.
