floor of the Commons. Despite this sound record, Mr. MacNaught is faced with extremely strong competition for the Fisheries Portfolio in event of Mr. Mayhew accepting an appointment to the Senate. Counter-claims for the Fisheries post have already been entered on behalf of James Sinclair, M.P. for Coast-Caplano, E. C. parliamentarian, assistant to Finance Minister Abbott, and T. G. W. Ashbourne, M.P. for Grand Falls-White Bay, Newfoundland. Immensity of the fishing industry in both British Columbia and Newfoundland makes for powerful pressure from these sections to have a Fisheries Minister either from the far east or the far west.

A more probable post for Mr. MacNaught is that of Secretary of State, now held by F. Gordon Bradley of Newfoundland. Mr. Bradley's health leaves much to be desired. It is strongly hinted that he will accept a Newfoundland vacancy in the Senate.

The Secretary of State does not fix civil service salaries but has much to do with matters such as working conditions, classifications, hours, holidays and other conditions of government employment. Also, as was demonstrated by Health Minister Paul Martin, the Secretaryship of State is a powerful rung up which to climb to one of the larger and heavy-spending departments of government.
