Canada Has Not Replied

WASHINGTON, May 29.—No reply has been received by the United States Government to its note forwarded to the Canadian Government in which willingness to commence negotiations looking to a treaty relative to the proposed St. Lawrence Ship Canal project was expressed.

It is expected however, that the Dominion will commence the negotiations on the treaty at a time deemed expedient by the Canadian Government.

Advocates of the waterway plan in the United States Congress are pleased that the State Department has acted while the opposition believing that there will be a treaty, is getting ready to fight the project.

The real hope of defeating the waterways plan are centred by the opposition largely in the senate, where a two thirds vote is needed for ratification. Those hostile to the waterways are already taking steps to muster the 33 votes needed to head off ratification. Opponents in the House are laying plans to fight the project.

It is believed that with the Harding administration recommending the waterways, the Senate and House will act favorably.

NEW RESIDENT WELCOMED.

FREDERICTON, May 29.—H. D. Doble, former member of the Prince Edward Island legislature has arrived here with his wife and family and his son and his family from Arlington, Prince County, P. E. I.

Mr. Doble has purchased the Harry Bailey property of South Devon from J. A. Gillis, who moved there several years ago from Sussex and has since resided there. It is understood that the purchase price is between \$8,000 and \$9,000 the property including about 60 acres of land, and the new owners will take possession by June 1st.

The Bailey property is for Mr. Doble's married son while Mr. Doble and the rest of his family had planned to occupy the Hanford Dumphy and to engage in orcharding on a large scale, but because of the destruction by fire of the house on that property, which was one of the largest and finest in York county, there is some possibility of his changing arrangements. Mr. Doble some months ago made an offer of \$25,000 to the New Brunswick and British Company for their fruit farms at Springhill, but it was then held at a somewhat higher figure and has since been sold to Frank Noble.

Jesse W. Murray, of Prince Edward Island, has purchased the Burt Manzer property in South Devon, on the Marysville road, and is also purchasing thirty acres of interval land. Mr. Murray sold his farm in Prince Edward Island to come here to engage in market gardening and has paid about \$4,000 for his new properties. Mr. Murray's father, now an octogenarian, and mother will reside at South Devon with their son and his family.

With James Cullerton and his family, who recently purchased a farm property, this makes three families of thirty-five people who have removed from Prince Edward Island to take up farms in York county.

Church Of England Not Started By King

GARDEN CITY, N. Y., May 29.—A committee of five Episcopal clergymen and laymen to urge that Public School pupils in New York City be not instructed that Henry VIII. started the Church of England has been appointed by the convention of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Long Island. The committee was instructed to put its plea before the superintendent of schools, the Board of Education, and the committee on revision of history text books.

The convention held that there was confusion in the minds of pupils between the start of the Christian Church of England, which they said was in the fourth century, and the split between the Church of Rome and the Church of England at the time of Henry VIII.

Rev. Frederic Stevens, of St. Marks in Brooklyn, who introduced the resolution which resulted in the committee said: "I recently asked a confirmation class of 16, 'Who started the Church of England?' Five of them, all Public School

pupils, replied 'Henry VIII.' "The Church of England was started, probably about 310 A. D., by disciples who followed the teachings of St. Paul."

ABBE DELORME CASE COMES UP NEXT MONTH.

MONTREAL, May 27. Cases to the number of 178 are up for hearing at the forthcoming June term of the Court of King's Bench here.

They include that of Rev. Father Adelarde Delorme, charged with the murder of his half-brother, Raoul Delorme, the 24-year-old Ottawa College student whose body was found in a field in January. The term will probably open June 1st, and should the Delorme case trial be ordered, it will not proceed until late in the term.

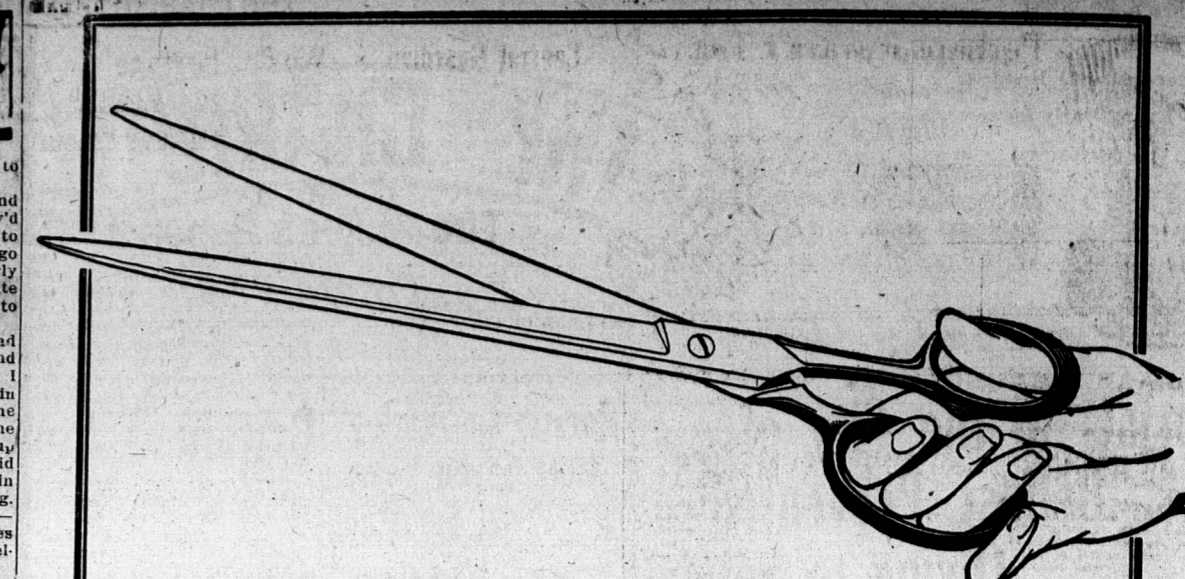
