I did not see at the time (in fact I don't yet understand) how the County Clerk can be mixed up with the liquor license business, until I remembered that the County Clerk is also License Inspector, and performs the duties of both positions in the County Court office.

I make this brief statement by way of protest, under the hope that the attention of the proper authorities (whether local or

Dominion) may be called to what seems, and really is, a great nuisance—that is to say, the combining the administration of the County Court Act and the Liquor License Act by the same official in the one office.

Why should the License Inspector be required to use the County Court room as his head-quarters, when the Dominion Government, with its big surplus, is bound to pay the expenses of an office for its own officials?

Western Notes.

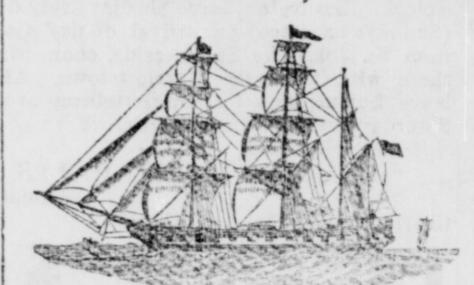
(From the Pioneer.)

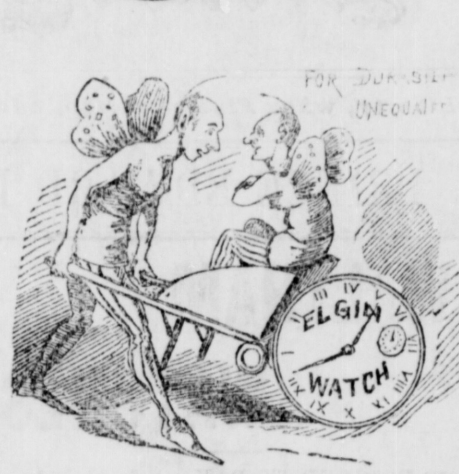
