

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

MONTREAL, July 6.

A young man of about 22 years of age, named Marsolais, residing in the parish of L'Assomption, was found on Sunday afternoon, upon the return of his father and mother from a walk, suspended with a rope around his neck. During their absence, he had clothed himself in a gown and other articles belonging to his mother, and then hung himself. The inquest which is being held will probably reveal the cause for the suicide.

TORONTO, July 6.

Mr. N. F. Davin, counsel for the prisoner Bennett, under sentence of death for the murder of Hon. George Brown, has got up a petition, asking for a reprieve, and it is understood it has secured the names of a great many prominent citizens, amongst whom are leading members of the bar. It is also understood that Judge Cameron, before whom the case was tried, is making a special report of it, to be forwarded to the Minister of Justice.

The Globe this morning contains the following special cablegram dated London, July 5th: The Agents General of the Canadian and Australian Colonies have held one of two preliminary meetings to promote a movement for the purpose of establishing close relations between the Colonies and Mother Country. The chief objects will be to direct emigration to the Colonies to organize measures for defense and to arrange an intercolonial tariff designed to promote the interests of the whole Empire. The movement has just been initiated but the details of the plan of operations have not yet been agreed upon.

NEW YORK, July 6.

A tornado demolished a portion of the penitentiary of Columbia, S. C., yesterday, and several convicts were hurt by jumping from windows—two fatally.

There were 30 powder and pistol accidents in this city yesterday, 10 in Brooklyn and 6 in Jersey City; 4 deaths by drowning in the harbor while bathing, and 8 small fires from fireworks.

TROY MILLS, Iowa, July 6.

During the celebration on Monday the Marshal of the town slapped a man's face for insulting a woman. A fight ensued and several hundred took part. Four persons were fatally wounded and thirty seriously.

DETROIT, July 6.

St. Julian trotted against time here, on Monday, two heats in 2.16 and 2.16.

BRYANT, Iowa, July 6.

Last evening, Hugh Hanna, farmer, attempted to cross a submerged bridge over a stream near his home, in a wagon with his wife and five children. The current swept the wagon from the bridge and all, except Mrs. Hanna, were drowned.

LONDON, July 6.

In the Commons on Monday night the debate on Mr. Forster's Irish relief bill was resumed.

Lord Churchill said he had no hesitation in saying that the distress did not warrant the bill. There was also much fraud and imposture.

Mr. Gladstone said the greater part of the opposition to the bill was a revival of old smoldering hostility to the land act. The bill must be judged from the standpoint of the land act, which created for the tenant an interest in the land and improved the value of the land. He thought it interfered with property (!) Evictions were lamentably increasing, and it was necessary to establish a large number of police to enforce peace. Such a state of things nearly approached the danger of civil war, and it was necessary to take some measures to prevent a serious crisis. The best means to combat the anti-rent agitation was to remove the justification for agitation.

Mr. Chaplin's amendment to reject the bill was defeated by a vote of 235 to 217, and the bill was read a second time without division.

In the Lords, in the evening, the Elementary Education Bill, rendering school attendance compulsory throughout the country, was read a second time without division.

The correspondent of the Times at Constantinople says: If the Powers restrict themselves to a mere friendly recommendation, the Porte will easily find means for indefinitely delaying its solution without giving its refusal, but if the decisions of the Conference are accompanied by anything in the nature of a threat or ultimatum some decided policy may be adopted. What this policy will be it would be hazardous to predict, but I may say that among the influential personages two plans are recommended. One consists of openly defying the will of Europe, in the hope that the powers will be able to agree upon the means of compulsion, and the other consists of simply protesting or in effecting to comply, but, at the same time, stirring up energetic resistance against the Albanians. Both parties counsel resistance in some form, and they differ merely as to what form the resistance shall take.

LONDON, July 6.

Serious explosions in the gas main supplying to Telfordham Court Road, London, occurred last night, causing large fixtures in several parts of the various streets, wrecking fronts of the houses and causing great damage. Two persons were killed and 30 injured and 400 houses damaged.

Bradlaugh, yesterday, was served at the entrance of the Commons with another writ for voting on the Irish distress bill on Saturday.

The King of Greece has left London for Paris.

ROME, July 6.

The Pope on Sunday gave an audience to the sacred orators who came on pilgrimage from all parts of the world.
