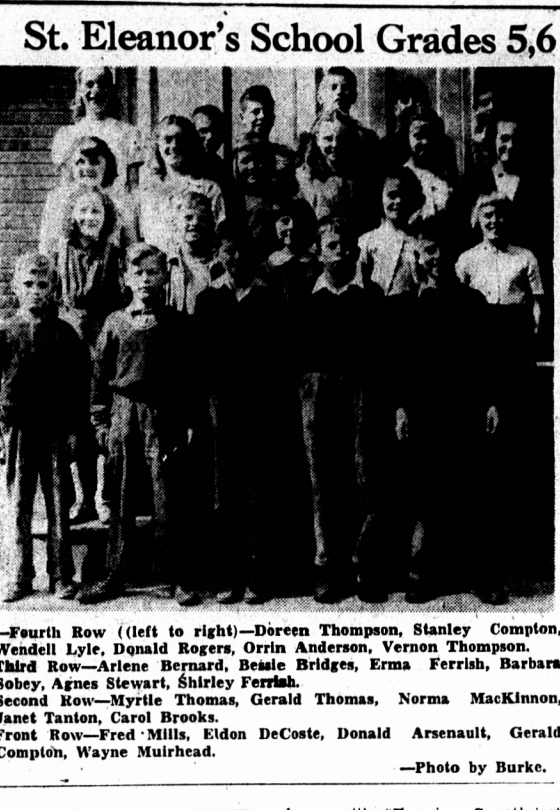
Mrs. W.F. Cooke and family have returned from New Glasgow where they have been spending the last two weeks visiting her mother.
