### METHODIST CONFERENCE.

FREDERICTON, June 28.—The dominion government is to be memorialized not to mix up the prohibition plebiscite vote with any other matter.

At the Conference on Saturday, G. A. Ross, a probationer, who had been previously recommended to attend college, was placed at the disposal of the stationing committee to be sent to a circuit if so needed.

Children's day was fixed for the first Sabbath in September.

The membership of the church shows an increase of over 300.

The Epworth League committee reported 81 Young People's Societies with 3,284 members, who raised for various purposes \$1,571.

The sustentation reports show an increase of \$2,384.

Rev. Job Shenton moved a resolution that some central city or town be fixed as the permanent meeting place of the annual conference. After some discussion it was resolved to refer the matter to a committee of five to report at the next conference.

On motion of Dr. Wilson a vote of thanks was passed to Senator Lewin for his donation of \$250 to the sustentation fund.

The secretary of the statistical committee submitted the report on church membership: 1,422 were added to the membership during the year, while 1,121 have removed or died. The total membership is now 13,027, a net gain for the year of 338. The rite of baptism was administered to 1,198 persons.

Another Chinese giant has been discovered. Like his predecessor, his name is Chang, and he lives at Yunnan Foo, in China, where two cycling tours from the West came across him recently. Chang is 7 feet 9 inches high.

### COLONIAL KINGS.

That is the Way the Canadian and Other Premiers Were Regarded.

The Toronto World publishes a letter under the date of Manchester, on the subject of the recent tour through England and Scotland of the Colonial Premiers.

The tour, it says, was a magnificent success. The letter continues: "Any thought that the Premiers would be regarded by the Great British public simply as a species of curious beings on exhibition for a week, for any fear that the tour would be in any sense a farce was dissipated by the hearty cheers at Liverpool and completely demolished by the spontaneous and sympathetic greetings met ever where. The trip immediately appeared in its true light. Never before in the history of nations has been witnessed a parallel spectacle, a spectacle of eleven uncrowned kings from distant outposts of the Empire, returning to lay at the foot of the throne the allegiance of the peoples represented. Imperial Rome has heard the tramp of the triumphal marches, but those marches signified war and bloodshed, not peace and law.

It was the high festival of imperialism; the worship of the imperialistic idea. The people bowed down before it. They shouted for it, they prayed for it. Four noble cities showed their hospitality on its behalf. The eleven pro-consuls of Imperial Britain swept through two Kingdoms amid a storm of patriotic enthusiasm. Their presence brought home to Englishmen in a way as never before, the work done by the Anglo-Saxon race beyond the seas. The sovereigns of the colonies stood for all that is good and lasting in English institutions, laws and civilization. They showed in themselves the colonizing power of England and the adaptability of the English race and its customs to strange environment. They represented the peaceful culmination of a work commenced in blood by Drake, Raleigh, Wolf and Nelson. And the noblest Roman of them all, was our own Wilfred Laurier. Head and shoulders above the others, was the way a prominent Australian put it to me.

The Canadian Premier's appearance and manner, his fluent delivery and his personal magnetism created the most intense interest. Again the fact that he represented not one colony but a vast confederation of eight colonies. On the whole tour only one man could bear comparison with the Canadian, and that was Lord Balfour, of Burleigh, the Secretary for Scotland. At Edinburgh Mr. Laurier's speech was especially happy, and his allusion to the ancient alliance of Scotland with his own race roused the enthusiasm of the citizens of "Auld Reekie."
