T. B. Convalescent Home Opened Today In Montague

Today marked the official opening of the new T.B. convalescent home in Montague, to which the public was cordially invited.

Under the management of Miss Jean Macdonald, R.N., the convalescent home is situated in the heart of the town and many will recognize it as the Macdonald home, which is a very familiar landmark in this town.

The house was owned and built over ninety years by Augustine C. Macdonald, who was born in Panmure Island, in 1837.

In 1855, when 18 years of age, Mr. Macdonald moved to Montague, at which time there were only four houses, owned by John Annear, Martin Lambert, John Lemon, and Mr. Watson.

A few years after moving here he began a general store in the part of his home, and later located on the present site where Stewart and Beck's now stands. He was also an extensive dealer in shipping and exporting of produce.

For several years Mr. Macdonald was a member of the local Legislature, and for twenty-five years was a member of the Federal House of Commons. In 1915 he was elected Lieut.-Governor of P.E.I., but died before his term was ended, when 82 years of age, Mr. Macdonald passed away.

Mr. Macdonald was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. Macdonald of Panmure Island. He married Mary Macdonald, to which union were born seven children, Frank, Ernest, Louis, Florrie (Mrs. D. J. Stoile), Mrs. Winnifred Bagnall, Helen and Josephine, who married Dr. A. J. MacDonald, Peter, known as Dr. Roddy of St. Peters, P.E.I., who, in his 93rd year, is the oldest practising doctor in Canada.

Louis in Montague and Florrie in Vermont are the only two surviving members of the family.

It is worthy of note that Mr. Macdonald's brother, Andrew, A. of Charlottetown, was one of the Fathers of Confederation and also at one time Lieut.-Governor of P. E. I.

Miss Macdonald, owner of the convalescent home, is the daughter of Mr. Louis Macdonald and the late Mrs. Macdonald. For three years Miss Macdonald taught in the Montague Memorial High

School, and later trained at the Ottawa Civic Hospital of which she is a graduate nurse. Miss Macdonald has nursed in Ottawa, Toronto, New Jersey, Moncton, Bermuda, and P. E. I. She has now begun the T.B. convalescent home in Montague, which will accommodate 10 patients, and which will undoubtedly prove an asset to the community.

Miss Macdonald is to be highly commended for her initiative and enterprise in undertaking such a large project which has taken many weeks to bring to fulfillment, and the residents of the community wish her every success in her new work.

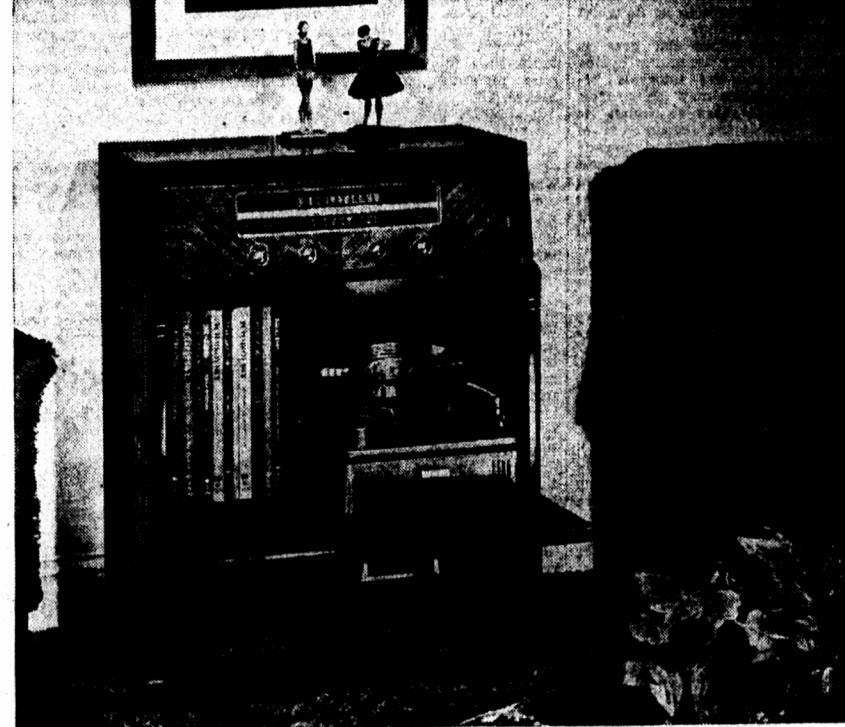
